- *Return by a celebrity to some previously successful activity.*
- *A return to fashion of an item, activity, or style.*
- *The opportunity to seek redress.*
- *A sheep bred from cross-bred and pure-bred parents for both wool and meat.*
- *A quick reply to a question or remark (especially a witty or critical one).*

compensation The action or process of awarding compensation.
*The grey streets of London were small **compensation** for the loss of her beloved Africa.*

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| counter | A worktop. <i>The counter tells you how many pictures you have taken.</i> |
| damages | The amount of money needed to purchase something. An act of compensation for actual loss or damage or for trouble and annoyance. |
| indemnification | <i>Whistleblower protection is indemnification for individuals who are dismissed as a result of reporting a violation.</i> |
| indemnity | A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>A deed of indemnity.</i> |
| rally | A large gathering of people intended to arouse enthusiasm. <i>A rally of more than three strokes was a rarity.</i> |
| rebound | The act of securing possession of the rebounding basketball after a missed shot. <i>They revealed a big rebound in profits for last year.</i> |
| recompense | The act of compensating for service or loss or injury. <i>Adequate recompense for workers who lose their jobs.</i> |
| recovery | The action of taking a vehicle or aircraft that has broken down or crashed to a place for repair. <i>A team of salvage experts to ensure the recovery of family possessions.</i> |
| rejoinder | A pleading made by a defendant in response to the plaintiff's replication. <i>It brought a sharp rejoinder from the teacher.</i> |
| reparation | The action of repairing something. <i>The old hall was pulled down to avoid the cost of reparation.</i> |
| repayment | An amount of money paid back. <i>Minimum monthly repayments.</i> |
| replication | The repetition of an experiment in order to test the validity of its conclusion. <i>On its own replication does not validate a theory derived from experimental results.</i> |
| restitution | The restoration of something to its original state. <i>He was ordered to pay 6 000 in restitution.</i> |
| resurgence | An increase or revival after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. <i>A resurgence of interest in religion.</i> |
| retaliation | The action of returning a military attack; counter-attack. <i>She rejected as preposterous any suggestion that she had acted in retaliation.</i> |

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| retort | A quick reply to a question or remark (especially a witty or critical one). <i>She opened her mouth to make a suitably cutting retort.</i> |
| return | A good rate of return. <i>On his return from Australia we gave him a welcoming party.</i> |
| revival | An improvement in the condition, strength, or fortunes of someone or something. <i>Cross country skiing is enjoying a revival.</i> |
| riposte | A quick reply to a question or remark (especially a witty or critical one). |
| sally | A sudden charge out of a besieged place against the enemy; a sortie. <i>The garrison there made a sally against us.</i> |
| upturn | An upward movement or trend as in business activity. <i>An upturn in the economy.</i> |
