### Definitions of "Comeback" as a noun

- *A quick reply to a critical remark.*
- *A return by a well-known person, especially an entertainer or sports player, to the activity in which they have formerly been successful.*
- *Return by a celebrity to some previously successful activity.*
- *A return to fashion of an item, activity, or style.*
- *The opportunity to seek redress.*
- *A sheep bred from cross-bred and pure-bred parents for both wool and meat.*
- *A quick reply to a question or remark (especially a witty or critical one).*

**compensation**     The action or process of awarding compensation.  
*The grey streets of London were small **compensation** for the loss of her beloved Africa.*

<b>counter</b>	A worktop. <i>The <b>counter</b> tells you how many pictures you have taken.</i>
<b>damages</b>	The amount of money needed to purchase something. An act of compensation for actual loss or damage or for trouble and annoyance.
<b>indemnification</b>	<i>Whistleblower protection is <b>indemnification</b> for individuals who are dismissed as a result of reporting a violation.</i>
<b>indemnity</b>	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>A deed of <b>indemnity</b>.</i>
<b>rally</b>	A large gathering of people intended to arouse enthusiasm. <i>A <b>rally</b> of more than three strokes was a rarity.</i>
<b>rebound</b>	The act of securing possession of the rebounding basketball after a missed shot. <i>They revealed a big <b>rebound</b> in profits for last year.</i>
<b>recompense</b>	The act of compensating for service or loss or injury. <i>Adequate <b>recompense</b> for workers who lose their jobs.</i>
<b>recovery</b>	The action of taking a vehicle or aircraft that has broken down or crashed to a place for repair. <i>A team of salvage experts to ensure the <b>recovery</b> of family possessions.</i>
<b>rejoinder</b>	A pleading made by a defendant in response to the plaintiff's replication. <i>It brought a sharp <b>rejoinder</b> from the teacher.</i>
<b>reparation</b>	The action of repairing something. <i>The old hall was pulled down to avoid the cost of <b>reparation</b>.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	An amount of money paid back. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<b>replication</b>	The repetition of an experiment in order to test the validity of its conclusion. <i>On its own <b>replication</b> does not validate a theory derived from experimental results.</i>
<b>restitution</b>	The restoration of something to its original state. <i>He was ordered to pay 6 000 in <b>restitution</b>.</i>
<b>resurgence</b>	An increase or revival after a period of little activity, popularity, or occurrence. <i>A <b>resurgence</b> of interest in religion.</i>
<b>retaliation</b>	The action of returning a military attack; counter-attack. <i>She rejected as preposterous any suggestion that she had acted in <b>retaliation</b>.</i>

<b>retort</b>	A quick reply to a question or remark (especially a witty or critical one). <i>She opened her mouth to make a suitably cutting <b>retort</b>.</i>
<b>return</b>	A good rate of return. <i>On his <b>return</b> from Australia we gave him a welcoming party.</i>
<b>revival</b>	An improvement in the condition, strength, or fortunes of someone or something. <i>Cross country skiing is enjoying a <b>revival</b>.</i>
<b>riposte</b>	A quick reply to a question or remark (especially a witty or critical one).
<b>sally</b>	A sudden charge out of a besieged place against the enemy; a sortie. <i>The garrison there made a <b>sally</b> against us.</i>
<b>upturn</b>	An upward movement or trend as in business activity. <i>An <b>upturn</b> in the economy.</i>
