<b>again</b>	Anew. <i>It was great to meet old friends <b>again</b>.</i>
<b>along</b>	In or into company with others. <i>He had brought <b>along</b> a friend of his.</i>
<b>arrive</b>	Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>The invitation <b>arrived</b> a few days later.</i>
<b><a href="#">back</a></b>	The grounds of Cambridge colleges which back on to the River Cam. <i>The Press are on my <b>back</b>.</i>
<b>backslide</b>	Drop to a lower level, as in one’s morals or standards. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to <b>backslide</b>.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>I might be <b>getting</b> the flu.</i>
<b><a href="#">here</a></b>	In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i><b>Here</b> s a dish that is quick to make.</i>
<b>immigrate</b>	Come to live permanently in a foreign country. <i>Only few plants can <b>immigrate</b> to the island.</i>
<b>landing</b>	The act of coming down to the earth (or other surface). <i>We made a perfect <b>landing</b> at the airstrip.</i>
<b>occur</b>	To be found to exist. <i>It <b>occurred</b> to me that we should hire another secretary.</i>
<b>reach</b>	Reach a goal. <i>The water <b>reached</b> the doorstep.</i>
<b>recover</b>	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>He <b>recovered</b> his balance and sped on.</i>
<b>recovery</b>	(in rowing, cycling, or swimming) the action of returning the paddle, leg, or arm to its initial position ready to make a new stroke. <i>It is hoped that Lawrence can make a full <b>recovery</b>.</i>

<b>recuperate</b>	Regain or make up for. <i><b>Recuperate</b> one's losses.</i>
<b>recurring</b>	Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. <i>Gratitude is a <b>recurring</b> theme in the book.</i>
<b>reelect</b>	Elect again.
<b>regain</b>	Come upon after searching; find the location of something that was missed or lost. <i>She <b>regained</b> control of herself.</i>
<b>repay</b>	Make repayment for or return something. <i>Most of his fortune had been spent <b>repaying</b> creditors.</i>
<b>resilience</b>	An occurrence of rebounding or springing back. <i>Nylon is excellent in wearability abrasion resistance and <b>resilience</b>.</i>
<b>restitution</b>	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i><b>Restitution</b> of the damaged mucosa.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The altar paintings seem in need of <b>restoration</b>.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>Order was eventually <b>restored</b> by riot police.</i>
<b>retrace</b>	Go back over (the same route that one has just taken). <i>He began to <b>retrace</b> his steps to the station car park.</i>
<b>retrieval</b>	The act of regaining or saving something lost (or in danger of becoming lost). <i>Online information <b>retrieval</b>.</i>
<b>retrieve</b>	Reel or bring in a fishing line. <i>Train the dog to <b>retrieve</b>.</i>
<b>return</b>	The action of returning something. <i>He <b>returned</b> to his newspaper.</i>
<b>revert</b>	Go back to a previous state. <i>If interested kindly <b>revert</b> with your updated resume.</i>
<b>staircase</b>	A way of access (upward and downward) consisting of a set of steps. <i>He descended the broad <b>staircase</b>.</i>
<b>trace</b>	Discover traces of. <i>Police are trying to <b>trace</b> a white van seen in the area.</i>
<b>track</b>	An endless metal belt on which tracked vehicles move over the ground. <i><b>Track</b> a missile.</i>
