along	In or into company with others. <i>He had brought along a friend of his.</i>
arrive	Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>The invitation arrived a few days later.</i>
back	The grounds of Cambridge colleges which back on to the River Cam. <i>The Press are on my back.</i>
backslide	Drop to a lower level, as in one’s morals or standards. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to backslide.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>I might be getting the flu.</i>
here	In or at this place where the speaker or writer is. <i>Here s a dish that is quick to make.</i>
immigrate	Come to live permanently in a foreign country. <i>Only few plants can immigrate to the island.</i>
landing	The act of coming down to the earth (or other surface). <i>We made a perfect landing at the airstrip.</i>
occur	To be found to exist. <i>It occurred to me that we should hire another secretary.</i>
reach	Reach a goal. <i>The water reached the doorstep.</i>
recover	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>He recovered his balance and sped on.</i>
recovery	(in rowing, cycling, or swimming) the action of returning the paddle, leg, or arm to its initial position ready to make a new stroke. <i>It is hoped that Lawrence can make a full recovery.</i>

recuperate	Regain or make up for. <i>Recuperate one's losses.</i>
recurring	Occurring again periodically or repeatedly. <i>Gratitude is a recurring theme in the book.</i>
reelect	Elect again.
regain	Come upon after searching; find the location of something that was missed or lost. <i>She regained control of herself.</i>
repay	Make repayment for or return something. <i>Most of his fortune had been spent repaying creditors.</i>
resilience	An occurrence of rebounding or springing back. <i>Nylon is excellent in wearability abrasion resistance and resilience.</i>
restitution	A sum of money paid in compensation for loss or injury. <i>Restitution of the damaged mucosa.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The altar paintings seem in need of restoration.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>Order was eventually restored by riot police.</i>
retrace	Go back over (the same route that one has just taken). <i>He began to retrace his steps to the station car park.</i>
retrieval	The act of regaining or saving something lost (or in danger of becoming lost). <i>Online information retrieval.</i>
retrieve	Reel or bring in a fishing line. <i>Train the dog to retrieve.</i>
return	The action of returning something. <i>He returned to his newspaper.</i>
revert	Go back to a previous state. <i>If interested kindly revert with your updated resume.</i>
staircase	A way of access (upward and downward) consisting of a set of steps. <i>He descended the broad staircase.</i>
trace	Discover traces of. <i>Police are trying to trace a white van seen in the area.</i>
track	An endless metal belt on which tracked vehicles move over the ground. <i>Track a missile.</i>
