<b><u>emphatic</u></b>	(of certain Arabic consonants) pronounced with both dental articulation and constriction of the pharynx. <i>An <b>emphatic</b> movement of his hand.</i>
<b>favourable</b>	Suggesting a good outcome. <i>Their demands rarely received a <b>favourable</b> response.</i>
<b>firm</b>	Marked by firm determination or resolution not shakable. <i>The bed should be reasonably <b>firm</b> but not too hard.</i>
<b><u>imperative</u></b>	Relating to verbs in the imperative mood. <i>Requests that grew more and more <b>imperative</b>.</i>
<b>imposing</b>	Grand and impressive in appearance. <i>The monarch's <b>imposing</b> presence.</i>
<b><u>impressive</u></b>	Making a strong or vivid impression. <i><b>Impressive</b> achievements in science.</i>
<b><u>insistent</u></b>	Demanding attention. <i>She was very <b>insistent</b> that I call her.</i>
<b><u>masterful</u></b>	Powerful and able to control others. <i><b>Masterful</b> technique.</i>
<b>more desirable</b>	Quantifier meaning greater in number.
<b>most desirable</b>	Quantifier meaning the greatest in number.
<b>overlooking</b>	Used of a height or viewpoint. <i>The balcony <b>overlooking</b> the ballroom.</i>
<b>powerful</b>	Of a person possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful. <i>Computers are now more compact and <b>powerful</b>.</i>
<b><u>preferable</u></b>	More desirable or suitable. <i>Lower interest rates were <b>preferable</b> to higher ones.</i>
<b>prominent</b>	Situated so as to catch the attention; noticeable. <i>The new housing estates are <b>prominent</b> landmarks.</i>
<b>superior</b>	Of high or superior quality or performance. <i>That girl was frightfully <b>superior</b>.</i>

<b>bureaucratic</b>	Of or relating to or resembling a bureaucrat or bureaucracy. <i>Well established <b>bureaucratic</b> procedures.</i>
<b>cavalier</b>	A small spaniel of a breed with a long snout. <i>Anne was irritated by his <b>cavalier</b> attitude.</i>
<b>chief</b>	The upper third of the field. <i>The <b>chief</b> of police.</i>

<u><b>dogmatic</b></u>	Of or pertaining to or characteristic of a doctrine or code of beliefs accepted as authoritative. <i>She was not tempted to be <b>dogmatic</b> about what she believed.</i>
<u><b>dominance</b></u>	The predominance of one or more species in a plant or animal community. <i>The worldwide <b>dominance</b> of Hollywood.</i>
<b>dominant</b>	Denoting the predominant species in a plant or animal community. <i>This disorder is inherited as a <b>dominant</b>.</i>
<b>domineering</b>	Asserting one's will over another in an arrogant way. <i>How can I do my job with a <b>domineering</b> boss yelling in my ear.</i>
<b>govern</b>	Require to be in a certain grammatical case, voice, or mood. <i>Most transitive verbs <b>govern</b> the accusative case in German.</i>
<u><b>governing</b></u>	The act of governing exercising authority. <i><b>Governing</b> bodies.</i>
<u><b>government</b></u>	The study of government of states and other political units. <i>Tyrannical <b>government</b>.</i>
<b>imperious</b>	Arrogant and domineering. <i>His <b>imperious</b> demands.</i>
<b>leading</b>	Having the leading position or higher score in a contest. <i>The <b>leading</b> edge of technology.</i>
<b>manage</b>	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>There was more stress and anxiety than he could <b>manage</b>.</i>

<b>oligarchy</b>	Government by an oligarchy. <i>The big cities were notoriously in the hands of the <b>oligarchy</b> of local businessmen.</i>
<b>oligopoly</b>	A state of limited competition, in which a market is shared by a small number of producers or sellers.
<u><b>oppressive</b></u>	Weighing heavily on the mind or spirits. <i>An <b>oppressive</b> dictatorship.</i>
<u><b>paramount</b></u>	Having supreme power. <i>The interests of the child are of <b>paramount</b> importance.</i>
