<b><u>inception</u></b>	The establishment or starting point of an institution or activity. <i>She has been on the board since its <b>inception</b> two years ago.</i>
<b><u>initiation</u></b>	The act of starting something for the first time; introducing something new. <i>Rituals of <b>initiation</b>.</i>
<b>kickoff</b>	A start given to contestants. <i>I was there with my parents at the <b>kickoff</b>.</i>
<b>launch</b>	An act or instance of launching something. <i>The <b>launch</b> of a new campaign against drinking and driving.</i>
<b><u>offset</u></b>	The amount or distance by which something is out of line. <i>They produced banknotes by <b>offset</b>.</i>
<b><u>onset</u></b>	(military) an offensive against an enemy (using weapons). <i>The <b>onset</b> of winter.</i>
<b>opening</b>	The act of opening something. <i>The ray of light revealed his cautious <b>opening</b> of the door.</i>
<b><u>origin</u></b>	A fixed point from which coordinates are measured. <i>A voice that betrays his Welsh <b>origins</b>.</i>
<b>outset</b>	The time at which something is supposed to begin. <i>The project was flawed from the <b>outset</b>.</i>
<b>showtime</b>	Used to signal the beginning of an event or process that is expected to be dramatic, decisive, or otherwise significant. <i>It was five minutes to <b>showtime</b> and a huge roar went up from the audience.</i>
<b>start</b>	The act of starting something. <i>They got an early <b>start</b>.</i>
<b>starting point</b>	A turn to be a starter (in a game at the beginning).
<b>starting time</b>	A turn to be a starter (in a game at the beginning).

<b>inchoate</b>	(of an offence, such as incitement or conspiracy) anticipating or preparatory to a further criminal act. <i>A still <b>inchoate</b> democracy.</i>
<b>inchoative</b>	An inchoative verb. <i><b>Inchoative</b> stages.</i>
<b><u>incipient</u></b>	(of a person) developing into a specified type or role. <i>An <b>incipient</b> black eye.</i>
<b>initial</b>	Mark or sign a document with one's initials in order to authorize or validate it. <i>Took the <b>initial</b> step toward reconciliation.</i>
