<b>fine</b>	Characterized by elegance or refinement or accomplishment. <i>Dinner and the movies had been <b>fine</b>.</i>
<b>honourable</b>	Used as a title for certain high officials, the children of certain ranks of the nobility, and MPs. <i>This is the only <b>honourable</b> course.</i>
<b>laudable</b>	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i><b>Laudable</b> motives of improving housing conditions.</i>
<b>meritorious</b>	Deserving reward or praise. <i><b>Meritorious</b> conduct.</i>
<b>notable</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>A <b>notable</b> historian.</i>
<b>noteworthy</b>	Worthy of notice. <i><b>Noteworthy</b> features.</i>
<b>praiseworthy</b>	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>The government's <b>praiseworthy</b> efforts.</i>
<b>respectable</b>	(of a person's appearance, clothes, or behaviour) decent or presentable. <i>A <b>respectable</b> sum.</i>
<b>sterling</b>	(of a person or their work or qualities) excellent or valuable. <i>This organization does <b>sterling</b> work for youngsters.</i>
<b>worthy</b>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i><b>Worthy</b> but tedious advice.</i>

<u><b>eulogy</b></u>	A formal expression of praise. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<u><b>extol</b></u>	Praise enthusiastically. <i>He <b>extolled</b> the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
<u><b>flatter</b></u>	(of a colour or a style of clothing) cause (someone) to appear to the best advantage. <i>Don t <b>flatter</b> yourself I wasn t doing it for your benefit.</i>
<b>gutsy</b>	Having or showing courage, determination, and spirit. <i>The <b>gutsy</b> intensity of her musical involvement.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	Praise and honour received for an achievement. <i><b>Kudos</b> to everyone who put the event together.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise (a person or their achievements) highly. <i>All glory <b>laud</b> and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i>
<b>laudable</b>	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i><b>Laudable</b> though the aim might be the results have been criticized.</i>
<b>laudatory</b>	Full of or giving praise. <i>Enthusiastic and <b>laudatory</b> articles.</i>

<b>meritorious</b>	(of an action or claim) likely to succeed on the merits of the case. <i><b>Meritorious</b> conduct.</i>
<b>panegyric</b>	A formal expression of praise. <i>A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
