<b>doc</b>	The United States federal department that promotes and administers domestic and foreign trade (including management of the census and the patent office); created in 1913. <i>I felt so bad I went to see my <b>doctor</b>.</i>
<b>making love</b>	An attribute that must be met or complied with and that fits a person for something.
<b>mercantilism</b>	The economic theory that trade generates wealth and is stimulated by the accumulation of profitable balances, which a government should encourage by means of protectionism.
<b>sex act</b>	The properties that distinguish organisms on the basis of their reproductive roles.
<b>sexual intercourse</b>	Communication between individuals.
<b>sexual relations</b>	The principle that an act done at a later time is deemed by law to have occurred at an earlier time.
<b><u>trade</u></b>	A trade wind. <i>Players can demand a <b>trade</b> after five years of service.</i>
<b>trading</b>	Buying or selling securities or commodities. <i><b>Trading</b> profits leapt.</i>
<b><u>traffic</u></b>	The messages or signals transmitted through a communications system. <i>Europe s air <b>traffic</b>.</i>
<b>trafficking</b>	Buying and selling; especially illicit trade.

- commercial** Connected with or engaged in or sponsored by or used in commerce or commercial enterprises.

- dealing** Business relations or transactions.

- deficit** The amount by which something, especially a sum of money, is too small.  
*An annual operating **deficit**.*
- emporium** A large retail store organized into departments offering a variety of merchandise; commonly part of a retail chain.

<b>exchange</b>	Exchange contracts. <i>He <b>exchanged</b> a concerned glance with Stephen.</i>
<b>export</b>	Of a high standard suitable for export. <i>Nearly all the bananas produced were <b>exported</b> to Britain.</i>
<b>exporter</b>	A person or group spreading or introducing ideas and beliefs to another country. <i>Brazil is the world s largest producer and <b>exporter</b> of sugar.</i>
<b>huckster</b>	A person who writes radio or tv advertisements. <i>He was <b>huckstering</b> a video.</i>
<b>importer</b>	A person who introduces an idea from a different place or context. <i>People in underdeveloped regions have become clever <b>importers</b> of new knowledge.</i>
<b>market</b>	A stock market. <i>The product was <b>marketed</b> under the name aspirin.</i>
<b>mercantile</b>	Of or relating to the economic system of mercantilism. <i>The shift of wealth to the <b>mercantile</b> classes.</i>
<b>mercantilism</b>	The economic theory that trade generates wealth and is stimulated by the accumulation of profitable balances, which a government should encourage by means of protectionism.
<b>merchandise</b>	Branded products used to promote a film, pop group, etc., or linked to a fictional character; merchandising. <i>The official <b>merchandise</b> for the film.</i>
<b>merchant</b>	In historical contexts relating to merchants or commerce. <i>A <b>merchant</b> seaman.</i>
<b>negotiator</b>	A person who conducts negotiations. <i>US trade <b>negotiators</b>.</i>
<b>peddle</b>	Sell (an illegal drug or stolen item). <i>He was arrested after trying to <b>peddle</b> guns.</i>
<b>protectionism</b>	The policy of imposing duties or quotas on imports in order to protect home industries from overseas competition.
<b>salesman</b>	A man salesperson. <i>An insurance <b>salesman</b>.</i>
<b>salesperson</b>	A person employed to represent a business and to sell its merchandise (as to customers in a store or to customers who are visited).
<b>sell</b>	Sell all of one s stock of something. <i>What we want is to go out of here quiet and talk this show up and <b>sell</b> the rest of the town.</i>

<b>seller</b>	Someone who promotes or exchanges goods or services for money. <i>Street <b>sellers</b> of newspapers flowers etc.</i>
<b>shopkeeper</b>	The owner and manager of a shop.
<b>swap</b>	Give (one thing) and receive something else in exchange. <i>I was wondering if you d like to <b>swap</b> with me.</i>
<b>trade</b>	A trade wind. <i>I had no further <b>trade</b> with him.</i>
<b>trader</b>	A person who buys and sells goods, currency, or shares.
<b>transact</b>	Conduct business. <i><b>Transact</b> with foreign governments.</i>
<b>undersell</b>	Sell cheaper than one's competition. <i>We can equal or <b>undersell</b> mail order.</i>
<b>vend</b>	Offer (small items) for sale, either from a stall or from a slot machine. <i>There was a man <b>vending</b> sticky cakes and ices.</i>
