- *Perpetrate or carry out (a mistake, crime, or immoral act).*
- *Send (a person or case) for trial in a higher court.*
- *Resolve to remain in a long-term emotional relationship with (someone).*
- *Consign (someone) officially to prison, especially on remand.*
- *Be in a long-term emotional relationship with (someone).*
- *Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause.*
- *Perform an act, usually with a negative connotation.*

- *Be dedicated to (something).*
- *Pledge or bind (a person or an organization) to a certain course or policy.*
- *Refer (a parliamentary or legislative bill) to a committee.*
- *Transfer something to (a state or place where it can be kept or preserved).*
- *Cause to be admitted; of persons to an institution.*

<b>charge</b>	Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>The committee was <b>charged</b> with reshaping the educational system.</i>
<b>confide</b>	Reveal in private tell confidentially. <i>He <b>confided</b> in friends that he and his wife planned to separate.</i>
<b>confine</b>	Deprive of freedom take into confinement. <i>He was <b>confined</b> to bed for four days with a bad dose of flu.</i>
<b>consecrate</b>	Render holy by means of religious rites. <i>After the priest had <b>consecrated</b> the bread and wine it was immortal and divine.</i>
<b>consign</b>	Send (goods) by a public carrier. <i>He <b>consigned</b> three paintings to Sotheby s.</i>
<b>dedicate</b>	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. <i>The parish church is <b>dedicated</b> to St Paul.</i>
<b>deliver</b>	Deliver a speech oration or idea. <i>He had been able to <b>deliver</b> votes in huge numbers.</i>
<b>devote</b>	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. <i>I wanted to <b>devote</b> more time to my family.</i>
<b>do</b>	Get something done. <i>You must sit there and wait till I ve <b>done</b>.</i>
<b>effect</b>	Cause (something) to happen; bring about. <i>The prime minister <b>effected</b> many policy changes.</i>
<b>enact</b>	Act out (a role or play) on stage. <i>Legislation was <b>enacted</b> to attract international companies.</i>
<b>engage in</b>	Carry out or participate in an activity; be involved in.
<b>entrust</b>	Confer a trust upon. <i>You persuade people to <b>entrust</b> their savings to you.</i>
<b>execute</b>	Put in effect. <i>The skater <b>executed</b> a triple pirouette.</i>
<b>firm</b>	Fix (a plant) securely in the soil. <i>He believed house prices would <b>firm</b> by the end of the year.</i>
<b>give</b>	Give entirely to a specific person activity or cause. <i><b>Give</b> a yelp.</i>
<b>give over</b>	Give food to.

<b>hospitalize</b>	Admit into a hospital. <i>Mother had to be <b>hospitalized</b> because her blood pressure was too high.</i>
<b>institutionalise</b>	Cause to be admitted; of persons to an institution.
<b>institutionalize</b>	Cause to be admitted; of persons to an institution. <i>He was <b>institutionalized</b> in a school for the destitute.</i>
<b>intrust</b>	Confer a trust upon.
<b>invest</b>	Make an investment. <i>Fort Pulaski was <b>invested</b> and captured.</i>
<b>keen</b>	Express grief verbally.
<b>lock away</b>	Fasten with a lock.
<b>lock up</b>	Fasten with a lock.
<b>obligate</b>	Force somebody to do something. <i>The money must be <b>obligated</b> within 30 days.</i>
<b>perform</b>	Give a performance of something. <i>We <b>performed</b> a popular Gilbert and Sullivan opera.</i>
<b>perpetrate</b>	Perform an act, usually with a negative connotation. <i><b>Perpetrate</b> a crime.</i>
<b>place</b>	Place somebody in a particular situation or location. <i>They <b>place</b> a great deal of emphasis on positive thought.</i>
<b>pledge</b>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>Japan <b>pledged</b> 100 million in humanitarian aid.</i>
<b>pledged</b>	Promise solemnly and formally.
<b>practice</b>	Carry out or practice as of jobs and professions. <i><b>Practice</b> non violent resistance.</i>
<b>pull</b>	Cause to move by pulling. <i>He may be their best ever lineman he can run and <b>pull</b> with the best.</i>
<b>put</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location. <i>He was <b>put</b> in charge of civil defence.</i>

*The squatters had to **surrender** the building after the police moved in.*

To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true.

**trust**

Confer a trust upon.  
*They don't like to **trust** their money to anyone outside the family.*

<b>forgive</b>	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>I was willing to <b>forgive</b> all her faults for the sake of our friendship.</i>
<b>guilty</b>	Showing a sense of guilt- Eric Linklater. <i>A <b>guilty</b> secret.</i>
<b>indiscretion</b>	The trait of being injudicious. <i>Sexual <b>indiscretions</b>.</i>
<b>matricide</b>	A person who kills their mother. <i>A man suspected of <b>matricide</b>.</i>
<b>misdeed</b>	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior. <i>His past <b>misdeeds</b> were forgiven.</i>
<b>penance</b>	Impose a penance on. <i>He had done public <b>penance</b> for those hasty words.</i>
<b>penitence</b>	Remorse for your past conduct. <i>A public display of <b>penitence</b>.</i>

<b>penitent</b>	Feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentant. <i>A <b>penitent</b> expression.</i>
<b>penitential</b>	Showing or constituting penance. <i><b>Penitential</b> tears.</i>
<b>punish</b>	Impose a penalty on inflict punishment on. <i>Fraudulent acts would be <b>punished</b> by up to two years in prison.</i>
<b>regret</b>	Express with regret. <i>Any inconvenience to readers is <b>regretted</b>.</i>
<b>remorse</b>	Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed. <i>They were filled with <b>remorse</b> and shame.</i>
<b>remorseful</b>	Filled with remorse; sorry. <i>The defendant was <b>remorseful</b> for what he had done.</i>
<b>repent</b>	Feel remorse for; feel sorry for; be contrite about. <i>Marian came to <b>repent</b> her hasty judgement.</i>
<b>repentance</b>	Remorse for your past conduct. <i>Each person who turns to God in genuine <b>repentance</b> and faith will be saved.</i>
<b>repentant</b>	Feeling or expressing remorse for misdeeds. <i>He is truly <b>repentant</b> for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>
<b>rue</b>	(French) a street or road in France. <i>To his <b>rue</b> the error cost him the game.</i>
<b>sin</b>	Commit a sin. <i>The human capacity for <b>sin</b>.</i>
<b>sinner</b>	A person who sins (without repenting). <i>God forgives repentant <b>sinner</b>s.</i>
<b>votary</b>	A person, such as a monk or nun, who has made vows of dedication to religious service. <i>The cultured <b>votary</b> of science.</i>
