- *The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose.*
- *The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action.*

Attachment or commitment to a person, cause, or belief.

*He moved to Avignon and won the **adherence** of the French king.*

[allegiance](#)

*Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear **allegiance** to the republic.*

The action of assiduously attending to the comfort or wishes of others; politeness or courtesy.

*Mary was particularly touched by Georgina's **attentiveness** to her during her recovery.*

bond

Criminal law money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial.

*He stooped over the trussed man and tested his **bonds**.*

burden	The central meaning or theme of a speech or literary work. <i>The tax burden on low wage earners.</i>
charge	The price charged for some article or service. <i>I get a real charge out of working hard.</i>
committal	The action of sending a person to prison or a psychiatric hospital. <i>The high level of committals.</i>
committedness	The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose.
consignment	The action of consigning or delivering something. <i>Levels of consignment are running below budget.</i>
dedication	The action of dedicating a church or other building. <i>His dedication to his duties.</i>
devotion	Feelings of ardent love. <i>His devotion to duty never wavered.</i>
duty	A payment levied on the transfer of property, for licences, and for the legal recognition of documents. <i>We must instill a sense of duty in our children.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful; fidelity. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
fidelity	Accuracy with which an electronic system reproduces the sound or image of its input signal. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable fidelity.</i>
liability	The state of being legally responsible for something. <i>She said the party had become a liability to green politics.</i>
loyalty	Feelings of allegiance. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i>
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He exploded with a mouthful of oaths.</i>
obligation	A written promise to repay a debt. <i>She didn't want to be under an obligation to him.</i>
pledge	A binding commitment to do or give or refrain from something. <i>Signed a pledge never to reveal the secret.</i>
pressure	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>He resigned due to pressure of work.</i>
promise	A declaration or assurance that one will do something or that a particular thing will happen. <i>What happened to all those firm promises of support.</i>

responsibility The state or fact of having a duty to deal with something or of having control over someone.

*We expect individuals to take on more **responsibility**.*

tie A strip of material worn round the collar and tied in a knot at the front with the ends hanging down typically forming part of a man's smart or formal outfit.

*He nailed the rafters together with a **tie** beam.*

vow A set of solemn promises committing one to a prescribed role, calling, or course of action, typically to marriage or a monastic career.

*They took **vows** of poverty.*



Usage Examples of "Commitment" as a noun

- *His long commitment to public service.*
- *With so many business commitments time for recreation was limited.*
- *A man of energy and commitment.*
- *I cannot make such a commitment at the moment.*

- *His business commitments took him to London.*
- *I could not fault my players for commitment.*
- *The company's commitment to quality.*

Give or grant someone (power, status, or recognition).
*A peace **accord**.*

adherence

The quality or process of sticking fast to an object or surface.
***Adherence** to a fat free diet.*

allegiance

The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action.
*Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear **allegiance** to the republic.*

assurance

A British term for some kinds of insurance.
*An **assurance** of help when needed.*

betroth	Give to in marriage. <i>In no time I shall be betrothed to Isabel.</i>
consecrate	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. <i>After the priest had consecrated the bread and wine it was immortal and divine.</i>
<u>covenant</u>	An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham Moses and David. <i>They covenanted with Judas for 30 pieces of silver.</i>
decision	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>The information was used as the basis for decision.</i>
<u>dedication</u>	A ceremony in which something (as a building) is dedicated to some goal or purpose. <i>His dedication to his duties.</i>
<u>devotion</u>	Commitment to some purpose. <i>Their devotion to each other was beautiful.</i>
encyclical	Intended for wide distribution. <i>An encyclical letter.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
fealty	A feudal tenant's or vassal's sworn loyalty to a lord. <i>A property for which she did fealty.</i>
fidelity	Accuracy with which an electronic system reproduces the sound or image of its input signal. <i>His fidelity to liberal ideals.</i>
guarantee	A thing serving as security for a guarantee. <i>A degree is no guarantee of a fast track career.</i>
irrevocable	Incapable of being retracted or revoked- Shakespeare. <i>An irrevocable step.</i>
<u>keep</u>	Keep under control keep in check. <i>The big fellow keeps a fish shop near the post office.</i>
loyalty	The quality of being loyal. <i>His extreme loyalty to the Crown.</i>
<u>manifesto</u>	A public declaration of intentions (as issued by a political party or government). <i>Manifesto commitments.</i>

oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>They took an oath of allegiance.</i>
<u>pact</u>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The country negotiated a trade pact with the US.</i>
<u>pledge</u>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I have no intention of giving you anything that could be held against me as a pledge.</i>
promise	Promise to undertake or give. <i>What happened to all those firm promises of support.</i>
renege	Go back on a promise, undertaking, or contract. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t renege him.</i>
<u>seriousness</u>	An earnest and sincere feeling. <i>He learned the seriousness of his illness.</i>
<u>sincerity</u>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice. <i>The simple sincerity of folk songs.</i>
<u>treaty</u>	A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year treaty of solidarity.</i>
troth	Truth. <i>A token of troth.</i>
<u>vouch</u>	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>The explosive used is of my own formulation and I can vouch for its efficiency.</i>
wholehearted	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>Gave wholehearted support to her candidacy.</i>
