### adherence

Attachment or commitment to a person, cause, or belief.

*He moved to Avignon and won the **adherence** of the French king.*

### allegiance

Criminal law money that must be forfeited by the bondsman if an accused person fails to appear in court for trial.

*He stooped over the trussed man and tested his **bonds**.*

<b>burden</b>	The central meaning or theme of a speech or literary work. <i>The tax <b>burden</b> on low wage earners.</i>
<b>charge</b>	The price charged for some article or service. <i>I get a real <b>charge</b> out of working hard.</i>
<b>committal</b>	The action of sending a person to prison or a psychiatric hospital. <i>The high level of <b>committals</b>.</i>
<b>committedness</b>	The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose.
<b>consignment</b>	The action of consigning or delivering something. <i>Levels of <b>consignment</b> are running below budget.</i>
<b>dedication</b>	The action of dedicating a church or other building. <i>His <b>dedication</b> to his duties.</i>
<b>devotion</b>	Feelings of ardent love. <i>His <b>devotion</b> to duty never wavered.</i>
<b>duty</b>	A payment levied on the transfer of property, for licences, and for the legal recognition of documents. <i>We must instill a sense of <b>duty</b> in our children.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful; fidelity. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	Accuracy with which an electronic system reproduces the sound or image of its input signal. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable <b>fidelity</b>.</i>
<b>liability</b>	The state of being legally responsible for something. <i>She said the party had become a <b>liability</b> to green politics.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	Feelings of allegiance. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
<b>oath</b>	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He exploded with a mouthful of <b>oaths</b>.</i>
<b>obligation</b>	A written promise to repay a debt. <i>She didn't want to be under an <b>obligation</b> to him.</i>
<b>pledge</b>	A binding commitment to do or give or refrain from something. <i>Signed a <b>pledge</b> never to reveal the secret.</i>
<b>pressure</b>	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>He resigned due to <b>pressure</b> of work.</i>
<b>promise</b>	A declaration or assurance that one will do something or that a particular thing will happen. <i>What happened to all those firm <b>promises</b> of support.</i>

**responsibility** The state or fact of having a duty to deal with something or of having control over someone.

*We expect individuals to take on more **responsibility**.*

**tie** A strip of material worn round the collar and tied in a knot at the front with the ends hanging down typically forming part of a man's smart or formal outfit.

*He nailed the rafters together with a **tie** beam.*

**vow** A set of solemn promises committing one to a prescribed role, calling, or course of action, typically to marriage or a monastic career.

*They took **vows** of poverty.*

<b>betroth</b>	Give to in marriage. <i>In no time I shall be <b>betrothed</b> to Isabel.</i>
<b>consecrate</b>	Give entirely to a specific person, activity, or cause. <i>After the priest had <b>consecrated</b> the bread and wine it was immortal and divine.</i>
<u><b>covenant</b></u>	An agreement which brings about a relationship of commitment between God and his people The Jewish faith is based on the biblical covenants made with Abraham Moses and David. <i>They <b>covenanted</b> with Judas for 30 pieces of silver.</i>
<b>decision</b>	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>The information was used as the basis for <b>decision</b>.</i>
<u><b>dedication</b></u>	A ceremony in which something (as a building) is dedicated to some goal or purpose. <i>His <b>dedication</b> to his duties.</i>
<u><b>devotion</b></u>	Commitment to some purpose. <i>Their <b>devotion</b> to each other was beautiful.</i>
<b>encyclical</b>	Intended for wide distribution. <i>An <b>encyclical</b> letter.</i>
<b>faithfulness</b>	The quality of being faithful. <i><b>Faithfulness</b> in marriage.</i>
<b>fealty</b>	A feudal tenant's or vassal's sworn loyalty to a lord. <i>A property for which she did <b>fealty</b>.</i>
<b>fidelity</b>	Accuracy with which an electronic system reproduces the sound or image of its input signal. <i>His <b>fidelity</b> to liberal ideals.</i>
<b>guarantee</b>	A thing serving as security for a guarantee. <i>A degree is no <b>guarantee</b> of a fast track career.</i>
<b>irrevocable</b>	Incapable of being retracted or revoked- Shakespeare. <i>An <b>irrevocable</b> step.</i>
<u><b>keep</b></u>	Keep under control keep in check. <i>The big fellow <b>keeps</b> a fish shop near the post office.</i>
<b>loyalty</b>	The quality of being loyal. <i>His extreme <b>loyalty</b> to the Crown.</i>
<u><b>manifesto</b></u>	A public declaration of intentions (as issued by a political party or government). <i><b>Manifesto</b> commitments.</i>

<b>oath</b>	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>They took an <b>oath</b> of allegiance.</i>
<b><u>pact</u></b>	A written agreement between two states or sovereigns. <i>The country negotiated a trade <b>pact</b> with the US.</i>
<b><u>pledge</u></b>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I have no intention of giving you anything that could be held against me as a <b>pledge</b>.</i>
<b>promise</b>	Promise to undertake or give. <i>What happened to all those firm <b>promises</b> of support.</i>
<b>renege</b>	Go back on a promise, undertaking, or contract. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t <b>renege</b> him.</i>
<b><u>seriousness</u></b>	An earnest and sincere feeling. <i>He learned the <b>seriousness</b> of his illness.</i>
<b><u>sincerity</u></b>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice. <i>The simple <b>sincerity</b> of folk songs.</i>
<b><u>treaty</u></b>	A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>troth</b>	Truth. <i>A token of <b>troth</b>.</i>
<b><u>vouch</u></b>	Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title. <i>The explosive used is of my own formulation and I can <b>vouch</b> for its efficiency.</i>
<b>wholehearted</b>	Showing or characterized by complete sincerity and commitment. <i>Gave <b>wholehearted</b> support to her candidacy.</i>
