Commitments as a Noun

Definitions of "Commitments" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “commitments” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action.*
- *The official act of consigning a person to confinement (as in a prison or mental hospital).*
- *An engagement by contract involving financial obligation.*
- *The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose.*
- *A message that makes a pledge.*



Synonyms of "Commitments" as a noun (6 Words)

<u>allegiance</u>	The loyalty that citizens owe to their country (or subjects to their sovereign). <i>Those wishing to receive citizenship must swear allegiance to the republic.</i>
committal	The burial of a dead body. <i>His committal to prison.</i>
committedness	The trait of sincere and steadfast fixity of purpose.
consignment	Goods carried by a large vehicle. <i>A consignment of drugs.</i>
<u>dedication</u>	A ceremony in which something (as a building) is dedicated to some goal or purpose. <i>His dedication to his duties.</i>
loyalty	The quality of being loyal. <i>They felt no loyalty to a losing team.</i>



Usage Examples of "Commitments" as a noun

- *A man of energy and commitment.*
- *His long commitment to public service.*
- *His business commitments took him to London.*



Associations of "Commitments" (30 Words)

<u>accord</u>	Go together. <i>The government and the rebels are in accord on one point.</i>
<u>adherence</u>	Faithful support for a cause or political party or religion. <i>Observing the adherence of the seeds to clothing prompted the development of Velcro.</i>
<u>allegiance</u>	Loyalty or commitment to a superior or to a group or cause. <i>A complex pattern of cross party allegiances.</i>
assurance	A positive declaration intended to give confidence; a promise. <i>The President s assurances were not respected.</i>
betroth	Formally engage (someone) to be married. <i>In no time I shall be betrothed to Isabel.</i>
consecrate	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. <i>He was consecrated bishop of York.</i>
<u>covenant</u>	Enter into a covenant or formal agreement. <i>The company have covenanted 1 000 a year to the Law Library.</i>
decision	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>The burden of decision was his.</i>
<u>dedication</u>	The action of dedicating a church or other building. <i>The dedication of a new city church.</i>

<u>devotion</u>	(usually plural) religious observance or prayers (usually spoken silently). <i>His devotion to duty never wavered.</i>
encyclical	A papal letter sent to all bishops of the Roman Catholic Church. <i>An encyclical letter.</i>
faithfulness	The quality of being faithful. <i>Faithfulness in marriage.</i>
fealty	The loyalty that citizens owe to their country (or subjects to their sovereign). <i>A property for which she did fealty.</i>
fidelity	The degree of exactness with which something is copied or reproduced. <i>The 1949 recording provides reasonable fidelity.</i>
guarantee	Stand behind and guarantee the quality accuracy or condition of. <i>The cooker is guaranteed for five years.</i>
irrevocable	Incapable of being retracted or revoked- Shakespeare. <i>Firm and irrevocable is my doom.</i>
<u>keep</u>	Keep in a certain state position or activity. <i>Keep my job for me while I give birth.</i>
loyalty	The act of binding yourself (intellectually or emotionally) to a course of action. <i>They felt no loyalty to a losing team.</i>
<u>manifesto</u>	A public declaration of intentions (as issued by a political party or government). <i>A manifesto for gay liberation.</i>
oath	A commitment to tell the truth especially in a court of law to lie under oath is to become subject to prosecution for perjury. <i>He was muttering foul oaths.</i>
<u>pact</u>	A formal agreement between individuals or parties. <i>The country negotiated a trade pact with the US.</i>
<u>pledge</u>	Bind or secure by a pledge. <i>I was pledged to silence.</i>
promise	Make a promise or commitment. <i>He showed great promise even as a junior officer.</i>
renege	The mistake of not following suit when able to do so. <i>There s one of them anyhow that didn t renege him.</i>
<u>seriousness</u>	The quality of arousing fear or distress. <i>A lack of solemnity is not necessarily a lack of seriousness.</i>
<u>sincerity</u>	The trait of being serious- Robert Rice. <i>The simple sincerity of folk songs.</i>

- treaty** A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states.
*The two Presidents signed a ten year **treaty** of solidarity.*
- troth** Truth.
*A token of **troth**.*
- vouch** Summon a vouchee into court to warrant or defend a title.
*I **vouch** for the quality of my products.*
- wholehearted** With unconditional and enthusiastic devotion.
*You have my **wholehearted** support.*
