## Commoner as a Noun

### Definitions of "Commoner" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “commoner” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *One of the ordinary or common people, as opposed to the aristocracy or to royalty.*
- *(at some British universities) an undergraduate who does not have a scholarship.*
- *A person who holds no title.*
- *A person who has a right over another's land, e.g. for pasturage or mineral extraction.*



## Synonyms of "Commoner" as a noun (9 Words)

<b>common man</b>	A piece of open land for recreational use in an urban area.
<b>common person</b>	A piece of open land for recreational use in an urban area.
<b>man in the street</b>	An adult male person who has a manly character (virile and courageous competent).
<b>person in the street</b>	A human body (usually including the clothing).
<b>proletarian</b>	A member of the working class (not necessarily employed). <i>They are true <b>proletarians</b>.</i>
<b>woman in the street</b>	A human female employed to do housework.
<b>worker</b>	An employee, especially one who does manual or non-executive work. <i>She s a good <b>worker</b>.</i>
<b>working person</b>	A mine or quarry that is being or has been worked.

A grammatical category used in the classification of pronouns, **working-class person** possessive determiners, and verb forms according to whether they indicate the speaker, the addressee, or a third party.

- *Commoners' centuries-old grazing rights.*
- *Cattle and ponies owned by the commoners.*

<b><u>bourgeois</u></b>	A bourgeois person. <i>These views will shock the <b>bourgeois</b> critics.</i>
<b>burgess</b>	English writer of satirical novels (1917-1993).
<b>burgher</b>	A member of the middle class. <i>The poem is not the sort of thing the sturdy <b>burghers</b> of Manchester would wish to read.</i>
<b><u>citizen</u></b>	An inhabitant of a particular town or city. <i>A British <b>citizen</b>.</i>
<b><u>civil</u></b>	Relating to civil law. <i><b>Civil</b> liberty.</i>
<b><u>civilian</u></b>	Relating to civilians. <i>Terrorists and soldiers have killed tens of thousands of <b>civilians</b>.</i>
<b>common</b>	Commonly encountered. <i>The two republics <b>common</b> border.</i>
<b>commons</b>	A class composed of persons lacking clerical or noble rank. <i>The mismanagement of a <b>commons</b>.</i>

<b>disfranchise</b>	Deprive of voting rights.
<b>habitual</b>	Regular; usual. <i>His <b>habitual</b> comment.</i>
<b>homespun</b>	Homespun cloth. <i><b>Homespun</b> philosophy.</i>
<b>layperson</b>	A non-ordained member of a Church. <i>His highly successful lectures were meant for an audience of <b>laypersons</b> interested in the natural sciences.</i>
<b>mediocre</b>	Moderate to inferior in quality. <i>They improved the quality from <b>mediocre</b> to above average.</i>
<b>nationality</b>	People having common origins or traditions and often comprising a nation. <i>Men of Spanish <b>nationality</b>.</i>
<b>nationwide</b>	Occurring or extending throughout a country or nation. <i>The event aroused <b>nationwide</b> interest.</i>
<b>nonentity</b>	Non-existence. <i>A political <b>nonentity</b>.</i>
<b>norm</b>	Adjust something to conform to a norm. <i>Strikes were the <b>norm</b>.</i>
<b>normal</b>	Conforming with or constituting a norm or standard or level or type or social norm not abnormal. <i>Until her accident Louise had been a perfectly <b>normal</b> little girl.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	A penny-farthing bicycle. <i>She seemed very <b>ordinary</b>.</i>
<b><u>park</u></b>	A gear position that acts as a parking brake. <i>The house is set in its own <b>park</b>.</i>
<b><u>plebeian</u></b>	One of the common people. <i>His square <b>plebeian</b> nose.</i>
<b>populous</b>	Densely populated. <i>The <b>populous</b> city of Shanghai.</i>
<b><u>prevail</u></b>	Be larger in number, quantity, power, status or importance. <i>She was <b>prevailed</b> upon to give an account of her work.</i>
<b><u>prevalent</u></b>	Widespread in a particular area or at a particular time. <i>The social ills <b>prevalent</b> in society today.</i>
<b>resident</b>	A bird, butterfly, or other animal of a species that does not migrate. <i><b>Resident</b> farm workers.</i>
<b>suburban</b>	Of or characteristic of a suburb. <i><b>Suburban</b> life.</i>



**tribune** A popular leader; a champion of people's rights.

**unimpressive** Evoking no admiration or respect; not striking.  
*Her early academic record was **unimpressive**.*

**usual** Commonly encountered.  
*Came at the **usual** time.*
