Definitions of "Communal" as an adjective

- *For or by a group rather than individuals.*
- *Relating to or done by a community.*
- *(of conflict) between different communities, especially those having different religions or ethnic origins.*
- *For or by a group rather than individuals- Paul Roche.*
- *Shared by all members of a community; for common use.*

- common** Commonly encountered.

- cooperative** Willing to be of assistance.

joint	Affecting or involving two or more. <i>Joint ownership.</i>
<u>mass</u>	Formed of separate units gathered into a mass or whole. <i>The film has mass appeal.</i>
<u>public</u>	Of or involved in the affairs of the community, especially in government or entertainment. <i>Performers and members of royal families are public figures.</i>
shared	Distributed in portions (often equal) on the basis of a plan or purpose. <i>Two shared valence electrons forming a bond between adjacent nuclei.</i>
social	(of a mammal) living together in groups, typically in a hierarchical system with complex communication. <i>A human being is a social animal.</i>
<u>societal</u>	Relating to society or social relations. <i>Societal change.</i>
<u>united</u>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a united front.</i>

- *Communal pride in impressive local buildings.*

- alliance** A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim.
*Divisions within the **alliance**.*
- ally** A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose.
*He was forced to dismiss his closest political **ally**.*
- association** A connection or cooperative link between people or organizations.
*He developed a close **association** with the university.*
- coalescing** Growing together, fusing.
- collaboration** Something produced in collaboration with someone.
*He wrote a book in **collaboration** with his son.*
- combine** Combine so as to form a whole mix.
*These forces **combined** with others.*

confederacy	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. <i>The Yakuza is a secret confederacy of criminal fraternities.</i>
confederation	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a confederation in 1867.</i>
congruity	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.
consolidate	Combine (a number of financial accounts or funds) into a single overall account or set of accounts. <i>The first phase of the project is to consolidate the outside walls.</i>
consort	A ship sailing in company with another. <i>It did not consort with his idea of scientific government.</i>
cooperation	The action or process of working together to the same end. <i>Economic cooperation.</i>
friendship	The emotions or conduct of friends; the state of being friends. <i>Because of the friendship between our countries we had a very frank exchange.</i>
fusion	Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization. <i>A fusion reactor.</i>
harmony	Agreement of opinions. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in harmony.</i>
integrated	Formed or united into a whole. <i>A more closely integrated economic and political system.</i>
intelligence	Military or political information. <i>The gathering of intelligence.</i>
join	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>The two roads join here.</i>
joint	Fit as if by joints. <i>A burger joint.</i>
mutual	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>We were introduced by a mutual friend.</i>
production	The process of or management involved in making a film, play, or record. <i>A production model.</i>
reunify	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea reunify.</i>

synthesis	The combination of components or elements to form a connected whole. <i>The synthesis of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
together	(of a couple) married or in a sexual relationship. <i>She s really together.</i>
tripartite	Consisting of three parts. <i>A tripartite classification.</i>
unification	The act of making or becoming a single unit. <i>The costs of German unification.</i>
<u>unified</u>	Operating as a unit. <i>A unified system of national education.</i>
<u>union</u>	A trade union. <i>Their union had not been blessed with children.</i>
<u>united</u>	Characterized by unity; being or joined into a single entity. <i>Women acting together in a united way.</i>
<u>unity</u>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>The repeated phrase gives the piece unity and cohesion.</i>
