### Definitions of "Communal" as an adjective

- *Relating to or done by a community.*
- *(of conflict) between different communities, especially those having different religions or ethnic origins.*

- *Shared by all members of a community; for common use.*

<b>joint</b>	Affecting or involving two or more. <i><b>Joint</b> ownership.</i>
<b><u>mass</u></b>	Formed of separate units gathered into a mass or whole. <i>The film has <b>mass</b> appeal.</i>
<b><u>public</u></b>	Of or involved in the affairs of the community, especially in government or entertainment. <i>Performers and members of royal families are <b>public</b> figures.</i>
<b>shared</b>	Distributed in portions (often equal) on the basis of a plan or purpose. <i>Two <b>shared</b> valence electrons forming a bond between adjacent nuclei.</i>
<b>social</b>	(of a mammal) living together in groups, typically in a hierarchical system with complex communication. <i>A human being is a <b>social</b> animal.</i>
<b><u>societal</u></b>	Relating to society or social relations. <i><b>Societal</b> change.</i>
<b><u>united</u></b>	Of or relating to two people who are married to each other. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>

- alliance** A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim.  
*Divisions within the **alliance**.*
- ally** A state formally cooperating with another for a military or other purpose.

- association** A connection or cooperative link between people or organizations.  
*He developed a close **association** with the university.*

<b>confederacy</b>	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. <i>The Yakuza is a secret <b>confederacy</b> of criminal fraternities.</i>
<b>confederation</b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>Canada became a <b>confederation</b> in 1867.</i>
<b>congruity</b>	The quality of agreeing; being suitable and appropriate.
<b>consolidate</b>	Combine (a number of financial accounts or funds) into a single overall account or set of accounts. <i>The first phase of the project is to <b>consolidate</b> the outside walls.</i>
<b>consort</b>	A ship sailing in company with another. <i>It did not <b>consort</b> with his idea of scientific government.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	The action or process of working together to the same end. <i>Economic <b>cooperation</b>.</i>
<b>friendship</b>	The emotions or conduct of friends; the state of being friends. <i>Because of the <b>friendship</b> between our countries we had a very frank exchange.</i>
<b>fusion</b>	Correction of an unstable part of the spine by joining two or more vertebrae; usually done surgically but sometimes done by traction or immobilization. <i>A <b>fusion</b> reactor.</i>
<b>harmony</b>	Agreement of opinions. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	Formed or united into a whole. <i>A more closely <b>integrated</b> economic and political system.</i>
<b>intelligence</b>	Military or political information. <i>The gathering of <b>intelligence</b>.</i>
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>The two roads <b>join</b> here.</i>
<b>joint</b>	Fit as if by joints. <i>A burger <b>joint</b>.</i>
<b>mutual</b>	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>We were introduced by a <b>mutual</b> friend.</i>
<b>production</b>	The process of or management involved in making a film, play, or record. <i>A <b>production</b> model.</i>
<b>reunify</b>	Unify again, as of a country. <i>Will Korea <b>reunify</b>.</i>

<b>synthesis</b>	The combination of components or elements to form a connected whole. <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
<b>together</b>	(of a couple) married or in a sexual relationship. <i>She s really <b>together</b>.</i>
<b>tripartite</b>	Consisting of three parts. <i>A <b>tripartite</b> classification.</i>
<b>unification</b>	The act of making or becoming a single unit. <i>The costs of German <b>unification</b>.</i>
<u><b>unified</b></u>	Operating as a unit. <i>A <b>unified</b> system of national education.</i>
<u><b>union</b></u>	A trade union. <i>Their <b>union</b> had not been blessed with children.</i>
<u><b>united</b></u>	Characterized by unity; being or joined into a single entity. <i>Women acting together in a <b>united</b> way.</i>
<u><b>unity</b></u>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>The repeated phrase gives the piece <b>unity</b> and cohesion.</i>
