### Definitions of "Communion" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “communion” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *(Christianity) a group of Christians with a common religious faith who practice the same rites.*
- *A relationship of recognition and acceptance between Christian Churches or denominations, or between individual Christians or Christian communities and a Church.*
- *The smallest administrative district of several European countries.*
- *The sharing or exchanging of intimate thoughts and feelings, especially on a mental or spiritual level.*
- *A body of people or families living together and sharing everything.*
- *Sharing thoughts and feelings.*
- *The service of Christian worship at which bread and wine are consecrated and shared.*
- *The consecrated bread and wine administered and received at Communion.*
- *The act of participating in the celebration of the Eucharist.*

- *Shared participation in a mental or spiritual experience.*
- *A group of Christian communities or Churches which recognize one another's ministries or that of a central authority.*

<b>community</b>	A similarity or identity. <i>A <b>community</b> of nuns.</i>
<b><u>concord</u></b>	Agreement between words in gender, number, case, person, or any other grammatical category which affects the forms of the words. <i>A <b>concord</b> was to be drawn up.</i>
<b>connection</b>	A connecting shape. <i><b>Connection</b> to the internet.</i>
<b>empathy</b>	Understanding and entering into another's feelings.
<b>eucharist</b>	A Christian sacrament commemorating the Last Supper by consecrating bread and wine.
<b>fellow feeling</b>	An informal form of address for a man.
<b>fellowship</b>	A group of people meeting to pursue a shared interest or aim. <i>A <b>fellowship</b> in mathematics.</i>
<b><u>friendship</u></b>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>Because of the <b>friendship</b> between our countries we had a very frank exchange.</i>
<b><u>harmony</u></b>	The state of being in agreement or concord. <i>Man and machine in perfect <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>holy communion</b>	A sacred place of pilgrimage.
<b>kinship</b>	(anthropology) relatedness or connection by blood or marriage or adoption. <i>Anthropology s <b>kinship</b> with the humanities.</i>
<b>lord's supper</b>	A light evening meal; served in early evening if dinner is at midday or served late in the evening at bedtime.
<b>manduction</b>	The act of participating in the celebration of the Eucharist.
<b><u>mass</u></b>	A large body of matter with no definite shape. <i>The sun broke out from behind a <b>mass</b> of clouds.</i>
<b>rapport</b>	A relationship of mutual understanding or trust and agreement between people. <i>She had an instant <b>rapport</b> with animals.</i>

**sacramental  
manduction**

The act of participating in the celebration of the Eucharist.

**sharing**

Sharing thoughts and feelings.

*The **sharing** of electrons creates molecules.*

sympathy

The state or fact of responding in a way similar or corresponding to an action elsewhere.

*The special **sympathy** between the two boys was obvious to all.*

togetherness

The state of being close to another person or other people.

*The sense of family **togetherness** was strong and excluded neighbours.*

**understanding**

An informal or unspoken agreement or arrangement.

*A child of sufficient intelligence and **understanding**.*

unity

Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action.

*They speak of the three parts as a **unity**.*

*The scientific **community**.*

<b>district</b>	A division of a county or region that elects its own councillors. <i>A <b>district</b> health authority.</i>
<b>farming</b>	Relating to farming or agriculture. <i><b>Farming</b> communities.</i>
<b>hamlet</b>	A settlement smaller than a town.
<b>idyll</b>	An episode of such pastoral or romantic charm as to qualify as the subject of a poetic idyll. <i>The rural <b>idyll</b> remains strongly evocative in most industrialized societies.</i>
<b>local</b>	Of or belonging to or characteristic of a particular locality or neighborhood. <i>Migration can regulate the <b>local</b> density of animals.</i>
<b>localization</b>	A determination of the place where something is. <i>The tug of war between the forces of globalization and <b>localization</b>.</i>
<b>lombard</b>	A member of a Germanic people who invaded northern Italy in the 6th century.
<b>municipal</b>	Of or relating to the government of a municipality J L kuntz. <i>National and <b>municipal</b> elections.</i>
<b>municipality</b>	The governing body of a municipality. <i>Voters in each <b>municipality</b> choose between four candidates.</i>
<b>neighbour</b>	A person who lives (or is located) near another. <i>Love thy <b>neighbour</b> as thyself.</i>
<b>outlying</b>	Relatively far from a center or middle. <i><b>Outlying</b> settlements.</i>
<b>outskirts</b>	Outlying areas (as of a city or town). <i>They mingled in the <b>outskirts</b> of the crowd.</i>
<b>parish</b>	The smallest unit of local government, constituted only in rural areas. <i>A <b>parish</b> councillor.</i>
<b>peasant</b>	One of a (chiefly European) class of agricultural laborers. <i><b>Peasants</b> left the farms to work in industry.</i>
<b>provincial</b>	(in Canada) sporting contests held between teams representing the country's administrative divisions. <i>Deeply <b>provincial</b> and conformist.</i>
<b>regional</b>	Relating to the regions of a country rather than the capital. <i><b>Regional</b> and local needs.</i>
<b>rural</b>	Of or relating to the countryside as opposed to the city. <i>Large <b>rural</b> households.</i>
<b>rustic</b>	Lacking the sophistication of the city; backward and provincial. <i>A <b>rustic</b> oak bench.</i>

**slum**

Spend time at a lower socio-economic level than one's own, motivated by curiosity or desire for adventure; usage considered condescending and insensitive.

*He moved from a two room **slum** into a local authority house.*

**suburban**

Of or characteristic of a suburb.

**Suburban** life.

**town**

The permanent residents of a university town.

*A rift between the city's **town** and gown.*

**village**

A self contained district or community within a town or city regarded as having features characteristic of village life.

*Pretty fishing **villages**.*

**villager**

One who has lived in a village most of their life.

*Angry **villagers** have been forced to leave flooded areas.*
