<u><b>comrade</b></u>	A fellow soldier or member of the armed forces. <i>An old college <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<u><b>confederate</b></u>	Someone who assists in a plot. <i>Where was his <b>confederate</b> the girl who had stolen Richard s wallet.</i>
<u><b>consort</b></u>	A wife, husband, or companion, in particular the spouse of a reigning monarch. <i>Queen Victoria and her <b>consort</b> Prince Albert.</i>
<u><b>counterpart</b></u>	A duplicate copy. <i>The minister held talks with his French <b>counterpart</b>.</i>
<b>equerry</b>	An officer of the household of a prince or noble who had charge over the stables. <i>He became <b>equerry</b> to the Duke of Kent.</i>
<u><b>familiar</b></u>	A friend who is frequently in the company of another. <i>Her <b>familiars</b> were her two little griffons that nested in her skirts.</i>
<u><b>fellow</b></u>	A member of the governing body in some universities. <i>He was elected a <b>fellow</b> of the American Physiological Association.</i>
<b>fellow traveler</b>	A person who is member of one's class or profession.
<b>fellow traveller</b>	A boy or man.
<b>guide</b>	A thing that helps someone to form an opinion or make a decision or calculation. <i>A comprehensive <b>guide</b> to British hotels and restaurants.</i>

<b>helper</b>	<p>A person who contributes to the fulfillment of a need or furtherance of an effort or purpose.</p> <p><i>We rely on volunteer <b>helpers</b>.</i></p>
<b>instruction book</b>	A message describing how something is to be done.
<b>lady in waiting</b>	A woman of the peerage in Britain.
<b><u>manual</u></b>	<p>A vehicle with manual transmission.</p> <p><i>A computer <b>manual</b>.</i></p>
