- *A friend who is frequently in the company of another.*
- *A traveler who accompanies you.*



Synonyms of "Companions" as a noun (6 Words)

- associate** A partner or companion in business or at work.
*The patient was asked to commit to memory a list of five paired **associates**.*
- comrade** A fellow soldier or member of the armed forces.
*You re right **comrade**.*
- familiar** A demon supposedly attending and obeying a witch, often said to assume the form of an animal.
*Her **familiars** were her two little griffons that nested in her skirts.*
- fellow** A man or boy.
*He was elected a **fellow** of the American Physiological Association.*
- fellow traveler** One of a pair.
- fellow traveller** One of a pair.

- *Be a companion to somebody.*



Synonyms of "Companions" as a verb (3 Words)

- accompany** Go or travel along with.
*The two sisters were to **accompany** us to London.*
- company** Associate with keep company with.
*These men which have **companied** with us all this time.*
- keep company** Retain possession of.



Associations of "Companions" (30 Words)

accompany	Perform an accompaniment to. <i>The two sisters were to accompany us to London.</i>
<u>acquaintance</u>	Acquaintances considered collectively. <i>I renewed my acquaintance with Herbert.</i>
associate	A friend who is frequently in the company of another. <i>An associate company.</i>
beau	A man who is the lover of a girl or young woman.
<u>brother</u>	A male associate or fellow member of an organization. <i>A Benedictine brother.</i>
<u>buddy</u>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>I m working on it buddy.</i>
cohabit	Coexist. <i>Mary is now cohabiting with Paul.</i>

colleague	A person who is member of one's class or profession. <i>The surgeon consulted his colleagues.</i>
companionship	The state of being with someone. <i>The love and companionship of marriage.</i>
compatriot	A fellow citizen or national of a country. <i>Stich defeated his compatriot Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<u>comrade</u>	Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement. <i>Greetings comrade.</i>
comradeship	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability. <i>His greatest joy came from comradeship with others in the team.</i>
<u>consort</u>	Agree or be in harmony with. <i>Queen Victoria and her consort Prince Albert.</i>
countryman	A man from your own country. <i>They trust a fellow countryman.</i>
<u>couple</u>	A pair who associate with one another. <i>Just a couple more questions.</i>
<u>crony</u>	A close friend or companion. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>
<u>dear</u>	A beloved person used as terms of endearment. <i>A dear little puppy.</i>
ex	A man who was formerly a certain woman's husband. <i>All his exes live in Texas.</i>
<u>fellow</u>	A thing of the same kind as or otherwise associated with another. <i>One eye was blue but its fellow was brown.</i>
folk	Folk music. <i>A mixture of folk and reggae.</i>
friend	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>He was my best friend at the university.</i>
<u>friendship</u>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>She formed close friendships with women.</i>
lad	A boy or young man (often as a form of address). <i>Come in lad and shut the door.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>Camels hate leaving their mates.</i>

neighbour	Live or be located as a neighbor. <i>Love thy neighbour as thyself.</i>
pal	A friend. <i>She palled up with some English chaps.</i>
partner	A person's partner in marriage. <i>How you doing partner.</i>
peer	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>The towers peer over the roofs.</i>
spouse	A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
workmate	A fellow worker.
