### Definitions of "Companions" as a noun

- *One paid to accompany or assist or live with another.*
- *A friend who is frequently in the company of another.*
- *A traveler who accompanies you.*

- fellow** A man or boy.  
*He was elected a **fellow** of the American Physiological Association.*
- fellow traveler** One of a pair.
- fellow traveller** One of a pair.

### Synonyms of "Companions" as a verb (3 Words)

- accompany** Go or travel along with.  
*The two sisters were to **accompany** us to London.*
- company** Associate with keep company with.  
*These men which have **companied** with us all this time.*
- keep company** Retain possession of.



## Associations of "Companions" (30 Words)

<b>accompany</b>	Perform an accompaniment to. <i>The two sisters were to <b>accompany</b> us to London.</i>
<b><u>acquaintance</u></b>	Acquaintances considered collectively. <i>I renewed my <b>acquaintance</b> with Herbert.</i>
<b>associate</b>	A friend who is frequently in the company of another. <i>An <b>associate</b> company.</i>
<b>beau</b>	A man who is the lover of a girl or young woman.
<b><u>brother</u></b>	A male associate or fellow member of an organization. <i>A Benedictine <b>brother</b>.</i>
<b><u>buddy</u></b>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>I m working on it <b>buddy</b>.</i>
<b>cohabit</b>	Coexist. <i>Mary is now <b>cohabiting</b> with Paul.</i>

<b>colleague</b>	A person who is member of one's class or profession. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b>companionship</b>	The state of being with someone. <i>The love and <b>companionship</b> of marriage.</i>
<b>compatriot</b>	A fellow citizen or national of a country. <i>Stich defeated his <b>compatriot</b> Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<u><a href="#">comrade</a></u>	Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement. <i>Greetings <b>comrade</b>.</i>
<b>comradeship</b>	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability. <i>His greatest joy came from <b>comradeship</b> with others in the team.</i>
<u><a href="#">consort</a></u>	Agree or be in harmony with. <i>Queen Victoria and her <b>consort</b> Prince Albert.</i>
<b>countryman</b>	A man from your own country. <i>They trust a fellow <b>countryman</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">couple</a></u>	A pair who associate with one another. <i>Just a <b>couple</b> more questions.</i>
<u><a href="#">crony</a></u>	A close friend or companion. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>
<u><a href="#">dear</a></u>	A beloved person used as terms of endearment. <i>A <b>dear</b> little puppy.</i>
<b>ex</b>	A man who was formerly a certain woman's husband. <i>All his <b>exes</b> live in Texas.</i>
<u><a href="#">fellow</a></u>	A thing of the same kind as or otherwise associated with another. <i>One eye was blue but its <b>fellow</b> was brown.</i>
<b>folk</b>	Folk music. <i>A mixture of <b>folk</b> and reggae.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>He was my best <b>friend</b> at the university.</i>
<u><a href="#">friendship</a></u>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>She formed close <b>friendships</b> with women.</i>
<b>lad</b>	A boy or young man (often as a form of address). <i>Come in <b>lad</b> and shut the door.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>Camels hate leaving their <b>mates</b>.</i>

<b>neighbour</b>	Live or be located as a neighbor. <i>Love thy <b>neighbour</b> as thyself.</i>
<b>pal</b>	A friend. <i>She <b>palled</b> up with some English chaps.</i>
<b>partner</b>	A person's partner in marriage. <i>How you doing <b>partner</b>.</i>
<b>peer</b>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>The towers <b>peer</b> over the roofs.</i>
<b>spouse</b>	A husband or wife, considered in relation to their partner.
<b>workmate</b>	A fellow worker.
