<b>equivalent</b>	Belonging to the same equivalence class. <i>A wish that was <b>equivalent</b> to a command.</i>
<b>in the same class as</b>	Holding office.
<b>in the same league as</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>like</b>	Equal in amount or value. <i>They looked utterly <b>alike</b>.</i>
<b>near</b>	Located on the nearside of a vehicle. <i>Walking in these shoes is the <b>nearest</b> thing to floating on air.</i>
<b>of the same standard as</b>	Equal in amount or value.
<b>on a level with</b>	Of the score in a contest.
<b>on an equal footing with</b>	Having the same quantity, value, or measure as another.
<b><u>parallel</u></b>	Involving the simultaneous performance of operations. <i><b>Parallel</b> lines never converge.</i>
<b><u>proportional</u></b>	(of a variable quantity) having a constant ratio to another quantity. <i>The punishment ought to be <b>proportional</b> to the crime.</i>
<b>proportionate</b>	Exhibiting equivalence or correspondence among constituents of an entity or between different entities. <i><b>Proportionate</b> representation of a minority group.</i>
<b>related</b>	Connected by kinship, common origin, or marriage. <i>Painting and the <b>related</b> arts.</i>
<b>similar</b>	Having the same or similar characteristics. <i>They wore <b>similar</b> coats.</i>

<b>alike</b>	(of two or more people or things) similar to each other. <i>All politicians are <b>alike</b>.</i>
<b><u>analogous</u></b>	(of organs) performing a similar function but having a different evolutionary origin, such as the wings of insects and birds. <i>Salmon roe is marketed as <b>analogous</b> to caviar.</i>
<b>analogy</b>	The religious belief that between creature and creator no similarity can be found so great but that the dissimilarity is always greater any analogy between God and humans will always be inadequate. <i>The models show by <b>analogy</b> how matter is built up.</i>
<b>as</b>	A United States territory on the eastern part of the island of Samoa. <i>Birds were singing and the child sang <b>as</b> sweetly.</i>
<b>assonance</b>	The repetition of similar vowels in the stressed syllables of successive words. <i>Alliterative <b>assonances</b> such as fail and fall are very common in Old English poetry.</i>
<b>compare</b>	Examine and note the similarities or differences of. <i>Beyond <b>compare</b>.</i>
<b><u>congruent</u></b>	(of figures) identical in form; coinciding exactly when superimposed. <i>The rules may not be <b>congruent</b> with the requirements of the law.</i>
<b>corresponding</b>	Accompanying. <i>A number of <b>corresponding</b> diagonal points.</i>
<b><u>ditto</u></b>	The same thing again used in lists and accounts and often indicated by a ditto mark under the word or figure to be repeated. <i>The next speaker <b>dittoed</b> her argument.</i>
<b>equal</b>	Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. <i>1 litre is roughly <b>equal</b> to 1 quart.</i>
<b><u>equate</u></b>	Be equivalent or parallel, in mathematics. <i>You cannot <b>equate</b> success in financial matters with greed.</i>
<b>equivalent</b>	The atomic weight of an element that has the same combining capacity as a given weight of another element; the standard is 8 for oxygen. <i>The French <b>equivalent</b> of the Bank of England.</i>
<b><u>homogeneous</u></b>	Consisting of parts all of the same kind. <i>A <b>homogeneous</b> society.</i>
<b><u>identical</u></b>	Coinciding exactly when superimposed. <i><b>Identical</b> twins are monovular.</i>
<b>indistinguishable</b>	Not capable of being distinguished or differentiated. <i>They wore <b>indistinguishable</b> hats.</i>

<b>like</b>	Conforming in every respect. <i>The <b>like</b> period of the preceding year.</i>
<b>liken</b>	Point out the resemblance of someone or something to. <i>Racism is <b>likened</b> to a contagious disease.</i>
<b>likeness</b>	Picture consisting of a graphic image of a person or thing. <i>Humans are described as being made in God's <b>likeness</b>.</i>
<b>quasi</b>	Having some resemblance. <i>A <b>quasi</b> success.</i>
<b><u>resemblance</u></b>	A way in which two or more things are alike. <i>The physical <b>resemblances</b> between humans and apes.</i>
<b>similar</b>	A person or thing similar to another. <i>Problems <b>similar</b> to mine.</i>
<b>similarity</b>	The quality of being similar. <i>The <b>similarity</b> of symptoms makes them hard to diagnose.</i>
<b>similarly</b>	Used to indicate a similarity between two facts or events. <i>A <b>similarly</b> priced property.</i>
<b>similitude</b>	Similarity in appearance or character or nature between persons or things. <i>Conrad uses a range of constructions which express or imply <b>similitude</b>.</i>
<b>symmetrical</b>	Made up of exactly similar parts facing each other or around an axis; showing symmetry. <i>The shape of a hill smooth and <b>symmetrical</b>.</i>
<b>synonymous</b>	(of words) meaning the same or nearly the same. <i>His deeds had made his name <b>synonymous</b> with victory.</i>
<b><u>tantamount</u></b>	Equivalent in seriousness to; virtually the same as. <i>His statement was <b>tantamount</b> to an admission of guilt.</i>
<b><u>twin</u></b>	A twin engined aircraft. <i>There was a bruise on his cheek a <b>twin</b> to the one on mine.</i>
<b>undersell</b>	Promote or value (something) insufficiently. <i>She feels she was <b>underselling</b> herself by putting her disability high on her CV.</i>
