<u><a href="#">pretty</a></u>	Make pretty or attractive. <i>A <b>pretty</b> mess.</i>
<u><a href="#">quantifiable</a></u>	Able to be expressed or measured as a quantity. <i>The benefits are not easily <b>quantifiable</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">quantify</a></u>	Express or measure the quantity of. <i>It is impossible to <b>quantify</b> the extent of the black economy.</i>
<u><a href="#">relative</a></u>	A relative pronoun determiner or adverb. <i>She went down the steps into the <b>relative</b> darkness of the dining room.</i>
<u><a href="#">relatively</a></u>	In a relative manner; by comparison to something else. <i>They were very poor but <b>relatively</b> speaking they had been lucky.</i>

- touchstone** A standard or criterion by which something is judged or recognized.  
*They tend to regard grammar as the **touchstone** of all language performance.*
- twofold** By a factor of two.  
*A **twofold** increase in the risk.*
- unimpressive** Not capable of impressing.  
*He was a man of **unimpressive** appearance.*
- voltmeter** Meter that measures the potential difference between two points.
- weathercock** A weathervane in the form of a cockerel.  
*He sometimes has a problem with the boat **weathercocking** before she can gather way on a new tack.*
- yardstick** A measuring rod a yard long, typically divided into inches.  
*On what kind of **yardstick** is he basing his judgment.*
