- *Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others.*




Synonyms of "Compete" as a verb (39 Words)

approach	Come near or nearer to (someone or something) in distance or time. <i>His playing approaches that of Horowitz.</i>
<u>approximate</u>	Come close or be similar to something in quality, nature, or quantity. <i>Reality can be approximated by computational techniques.</i>
<u>battle</u>	Battle or contend against in or as if in a battle. <i>Firefighters battled a 9 800 acre brush fire.</i>
be a competitor	Happen, occur, take place.
be a contestant	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
be in the same class as	Be identical to; be someone or something.
be in the same league as	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
be involved	Represent, as of a character on stage.
be on a par with	Represent, as of a character on stage.
be the equal of	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.

challenge	Issue a challenge to. <i>A new way of life that would challenge them.</i>
clash	(of colours) appear discordant or ugly when placed close to each other. <i>The yellow shirt clashed with her purple skirt.</i>
come close to	Reach or enter a state, relation, condition, use, or position.
come near to	Exist or occur in a certain point in a series.
compare with	Consider or describe as similar, equal, or analogous.
<u>contend</u>	Come to terms with. <i>He contends that the judge was wrong.</i>
cross swords	Hinder or prevent (the efforts, plans, or desires) of.
<u>emulate</u>	Compete with successfully; approach or reach equality with. <i>This artist's drawings cannot emulate his water colors.</i>
<u>engage</u>	Engage or hire for work. <i>Engage aid help services or support.</i>
fight	Fight against or resist strongly. <i>General Hill fights his troops well.</i>
get involved	Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition.
go head to head	Be ranked or compare.
grapple	Succeed in doing, achieving, or producing (something) with the limited or inadequate means available. <i>He grappled the young man around the throat.</i>
jockey	Ride a racehorse as a professional jockey. <i>Both men will be jockeying for the two top jobs.</i>
keep pace with	Keep in a certain state, position, or activity.
keep up with	Keep under control; keep in check.
lock horns	Build locks in order to facilitate the navigation of vessels.
match	Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. <i>Try to match the colour scheme and graphics of your site to your business culture.</i>
match up to	Make correspond or harmonize.
participate	Have or possess (a particular quality). <i>Thousands participated in a nationwide strike.</i>
play	Make a disc music player or other device produce sounds or recorded images. <i>He plays the flute.</i>

rival	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>Nothing can rival cotton for durability.</i>
take part	Require as useful, just, or proper.
touch	Be relevant to. <i>He touched his toes to the horse s flanks.</i>
tussle	Make messy or untidy. <i>The demonstrators tussled with police.</i>
vie	Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
wage war	Carry on (wars, battles, or campaigns).
wrangle	To quarrel noisily, angrily or disruptively. <i>The horses were wrangled early.</i>
wrestle	Combat to overcome an opposing tendency or force. <i>I wrestled with this decision for years.</i>

antagonist	A substance which interferes with or inhibits the physiological action of another. <i>He turned to confront his antagonist.</i>
athlete	A person who takes part in competitive track and field events (athletics). <i>He had the broad shouldered build of a natural athlete.</i>
battle	Battle or contend against in or as if in a battle. <i>They battled over the budget.</i>
challenger	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>A potential challenger for the party leadership.</i>
competition	The activity or condition of striving to gain or win something by defeating or establishing superiority over others. <i>He wanted to know what the competition was doing.</i>
competitor	An organization or country engaged in commercial or economic competition with others. <i>Two competitors were banned for taking drugs.</i>
contend	Succeed in doing, achieving, or producing (something) with the limited or inadequate means available. <i>She had to contend with his uncertain temper.</i>

<u>contender</u>	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>A presidential contender.</i>
<u>contention</u>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>The teams were in fierce contention for first place.</i>
<u>contest</u>	An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. <i>She declared her intention to contest the presidency.</i>
<u>counterpart</u>	One of two copies of a legal document. <i>The minister held talks with his French counterpart.</i>
emasculate	Remove the testicles of a male animal. <i>In his mind her success emasculated him.</i>
encounter	Come together. <i>His close encounter with death.</i>
<u>enemy</u>	A personal enemy. <i>Enemy aircraft.</i>
marathoner	Someone who participates in long-distance races (especially in marathons).
<u>nemesis</u>	The inescapable agent of someone's or something's downfall. <i>One risks nemesis by uttering such words.</i>
objector	A person who expresses opposition to or disagreement with something. <i>Objectors to the housing plans.</i>
opponent	Someone who competes with or opposes another in a contest, game, or argument. <i>Against superior opponents they fell two goals behind.</i>
oppose	Contrast with equal weight or force. <i>A workers movement opposed the regime.</i>
opposing	Characterized by active hostility. <i>On the opposing page there were two addresses.</i>
outmaneuver	Defeat by more skillful maneuvering. <i>The English troops outmaneuvered the Germans.</i>
outwit	Beat through cleverness and wit. <i>Ray had outwitted many an opponent.</i>
<u>overtake</u>	Catch up with and possibly overtake. <i>Disaster overtook the town in 1296.</i>
rival	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>Nothing can rival cotton for durability.</i>
<u>rivalry</u>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>There always has been intense rivalry between the clubs.</i>

scourge	Punish severely; excoriate. <i>Our people did scourge him severely.</i>
strive	Attempt by employing effort. <i>Scholars must strive against bias.</i>
struggle	To exert strenuous effort against opposition. <i>The centre is the result of the scientists struggle to realize their dream.</i>
unseat	Remove from political office. <i>The Republicans are trying to unseat the liberal Democrat.</i>
vie	Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
