- *Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others.*

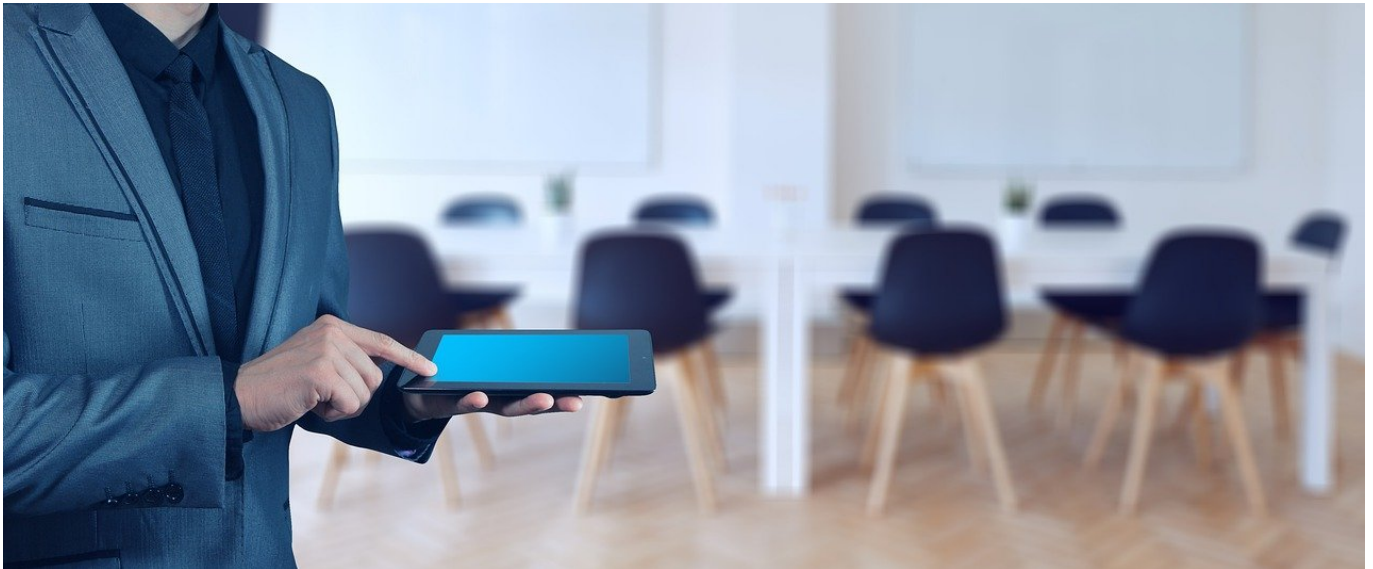


## Synonyms of "Compete" as a verb (39 Words)

<b>approach</b>	Come near or nearer to (someone or something) in distance or time. <i>His playing <b>approaches</b> that of Horowitz.</i>
<a href="#"><u>approximate</u></a>	Come close or be similar to something in quality, nature, or quantity. <i>Reality can be <b>approximated</b> by computational techniques.</i>
<a href="#"><u>battle</u></a>	Battle or contend against in or as if in a battle. <i>Firefighters <b>battled</b> a 9 800 acre brush fire.</i>
<b>be a competitor</b>	Happen, occur, take place.
<b>be a contestant</b>	To remain unmolested, undisturbed, or uninterrupted — used only in infinitive form.
<b>be in the same class as</b>	Be identical to; be someone or something.
<b>be in the same league as</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.
<b>be involved</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be on a par with</b>	Represent, as of a character on stage.
<b>be the equal of</b>	Have the quality of being; (copula, used with an adjective or a predicate noun.

<b>challenge</b>	Issue a challenge to. <i>A new way of life that would <b>challenge</b> them.</i>
<b>clash</b>	(of colours) appear discordant or ugly when placed close to each other. <i>The yellow shirt <b>clashed</b> with her purple skirt.</i>
<b>come close to</b>	Reach or enter a state, relation, condition, use, or position.
<b>come near to</b>	Exist or occur in a certain point in a series.
<b>compare with</b>	Consider or describe as similar, equal, or analogous.
<b><u>contend</u></b>	Come to terms with. <i>He <b>contends</b> that the judge was wrong.</i>
<b>cross swords</b>	Hinder or prevent (the efforts, plans, or desires) of.
<b><u>emulate</u></b>	Compete with successfully; approach or reach equality with. <i>This artist's drawings cannot <b>emulate</b> his water colors.</i>
<b><u>engage</u></b>	Engage or hire for work. <i><b>Engage</b> aid help services or support.</i>
<b>fight</b>	Fight against or resist strongly. <i>General Hill <b>fight</b>s his troops well.</i>
<b>get involved</b>	Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition.
<b>go head to head</b>	Be ranked or compare.
<b>grapple</b>	Succeed in doing, achieving, or producing (something) with the limited or inadequate means available. <i>He <b>grappled</b> the young man around the throat.</i>
<b>jockey</b>	Ride a racehorse as a professional jockey. <i>Both men will be <b>jockeying</b> for the two top jobs.</i>
<b>keep pace with</b>	Keep in a certain state, position, or activity.
<b>keep up with</b>	Keep under control; keep in check.
<b>lock horns</b>	Build locks in order to facilitate the navigation of vessels.
<b>match</b>	Make equal uniform corresponding or matching. <i>Try to <b>match</b> the colour scheme and graphics of your site to your business culture.</i>
<b>match up to</b>	Make correspond or harmonize.
<b>participate</b>	Have or possess (a particular quality). <i>Thousands <b>participated</b> in a nationwide strike.</i>
<b>play</b>	Make a disc music player or other device produce sounds or recorded images. <i>He <b>plays</b> the flute.</i>

<b>rival</b>	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>Nothing can <b>rival</b> cotton for durability.</i>
<b>take part</b>	Require as useful, just, or proper.
<b>touch</b>	Be relevant to. <i>He <b>ouched</b> his toes to the horse s flanks.</i>
<b>tussle</b>	Make messy or untidy. <i>The demonstrators <b>tussled</b> with police.</i>
<b>vie</b>	Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
<b>wage war</b>	Carry on (wars, battles, or campaigns).
<b>wrangle</b>	To quarrel noisily, angrily or disruptively. <i>The horses were <b>wrangled</b> early.</i>
<b>wrestle</b>	Combat to overcome an opposing tendency or force. <i>I <b>wrestled</b> with this decision for years.</i>

<b><u>contender</u></b>	The contestant you hope to defeat. <i>A presidential <b>contender</b>.</i>
<b><u>contention</u></b>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>The teams were in fierce <b>contention</b> for first place.</i>
<b><u>contest</u></b>	An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. <i>She declared her intention to <b>contest</b> the presidency.</i>
<b><u>counterpart</u></b>	One of two copies of a legal document. <i>The minister held talks with his French <b>counterpart</b>.</i>
<b>emasculate</b>	Remove the testicles of a male animal. <i>In his mind her success <b>emasculated</b> him.</i>
<b>encounter</b>	Come together. <i>His close <b>encounter</b> with death.</i>
<b><u>enemy</u></b>	A personal enemy. <i><b>Enemy</b> aircraft.</i>
<b>marathoner</b>	Someone who participates in long-distance races (especially in marathons).
<b><u>nemesis</u></b>	The inescapable agent of someone's or something's downfall. <i>One risks <b>nemesis</b> by uttering such words.</i>
<b>objector</b>	A person who expresses opposition to or disagreement with something. <i><b>Objectors</b> to the housing plans.</i>
<b>opponent</b>	Someone who competes with or opposes another in a contest, game, or argument. <i>Against superior <b>opponents</b> they fell two goals behind.</i>
<b>oppose</b>	Contrast with equal weight or force. <i>A workers movement <b>opposed</b> the regime.</i>
<b>opposing</b>	Characterized by active hostility. <i>On the <b>opposing</b> page there were two addresses.</i>
<b>outmaneuver</b>	Defeat by more skillful maneuvering. <i>The English troops <b>outmaneuvered</b> the Germans.</i>
<b>outwit</b>	Beat through cleverness and wit. <i>Ray had <b>outwitted</b> many an opponent.</i>
<b><u>overtake</u></b>	Catch up with and possibly overtake. <i>Disaster <b>overtook</b> the town in 1296.</i>
<b>rival</b>	Be the rival of be in competition with. <i>Nothing can <b>rival</b> cotton for durability.</i>
<b><u>rivalry</u></b>	The act of competing as for profit or a prize. <i>There always has been intense <b>rivalry</b> between the clubs.</i>

<b>scourge</b>	Punish severely; excoriate. <i>Our people did <b>scourge</b> him severely.</i>
<b>strive</b>	Attempt by employing effort. <i>Scholars must <b>strive</b> against bias.</i>
<b>struggle</b>	To exert strenuous effort against opposition. <i>The centre is the result of the scientists <b>struggle</b> to realize their dream.</i>
<b>unseat</b>	Remove from political office. <i>The Republicans are trying to <b>unseat</b> the liberal Democrat.</i>
<b>vie</b>	Compete eagerly with someone in order to do or achieve something. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>
