### Definitions of "Compile" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “compile” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Accumulate (a specified score.*
- *Put together out of existing material.*
- *Convert (a program) into a machine-code or lower-level form in which the program can be executed.*
- *Use a computer program to translate source code written in a particular programming language into computer-readable machine code that can be executed.*
- *Produce (a list or book) by assembling information collected from other sources.*
- *Get or gather together.*
- *Collect (information) in order to produce a list or book.*

<b>class</b>	Arrange or order by classes or categories. <i>Conduct which is <b>classed</b> as criminal.</i>
<b><u>classify</u></b>	Assign to a class or kind. <i>How would you <b>classify</b> these pottery shards are they prehistoric.</i>
<b>collate</b>	Appoint (a member of the clergy) to a benefice. <i><b>Collate</b> the papers.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>He <b>collected</b> the rent.</i>
<b><u>compose</u></b>	Calm or settle (oneself or one's features or thoughts). <i>In offices where close set text was <b>composed</b> both men and women pieceworkers were normally employed.</i>
<b>dispose</b>	Make receptive or willing towards an action or attitude or belief. <i>The Scottish champions were buoyant after they <b>disposed</b> of English champions Leeds.</i>
<b><u>file</u></b>	Smooth with a file. <i>The company had <b>filed</b> for bankruptcy.</i>
<b>grade</b>	Determine the grade of or assign a grade to. <i><b>Grade</b> tests.</i>
<b>group</b>	Arrange into a group or groups. <i>Three chairs were <b>grouped</b> around a table.</i>
<b><u>hoard</u></b>	Get or gather together. <i>He <b>hoarded</b> the memory in his heart.</i>
<b><u>index</u></b>	List in an index. <i><b>Index</b> the book.</i>
<b>list</b>	Include in a list. <i>The bottom of the line Mercedes <b>lists</b> for 52 050.</i>
<b><u>log</u></b>	Enter into a log as on ships and planes. <i>The incident has to be <b>logged</b>.</i>
<b>make up</b>	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
<b>marshal</b>	Lead ceremoniously, as in a procession. <i>She is one of those people who can <b>marshal</b> their thoughts quickly and articulate them clearly.</i>

<b>order</b>	Issue commands or orders for. <i>She resented being <b>ordered</b> about.</i>
<b><u>organize</u></b>	Form (a number of people) into a trade union or other political group. <i>Can you help me <b>organize</b> my files.</i>
<b>pile up</b>	Arrange in stacks.
<b>put together</b>	Attribute or give.
<b>range</b>	Place or arrange in a row or rows or in a specified manner. <i>Estimates for the losses in the earthquake <b>range</b> as high as 2 billion.</i>
<b>rate</b>	Be regarded in a specified way. <i>This bond <b>rates</b> highly.</i>
<b>roll up</b>	Cause to move by turning over or in a circular manner of as if on an axis.
<b>set out</b>	Locate.
<b>sort</b>	Resolve the problems or difficulties of. <i>The mail was <b>sorted</b>.</i>
<b>sort out</b>	Examine in order to test suitability.
<b>structure</b>	Give a structure to. <i>Services must be <b>structured</b> so as to avoid pitfalls.</i>
<b>systematize</b>	Arrange according to an organized system; make systematic. <i><b>Systematize</b> our scientific knowledge.</i>
<b>systemize</b>	Arrange according to a system or reduce to a system.
<b>tabulate</b>	Arrange or enter in tabular form. <i>The system is designed to enable users to extract analyse and <b>tabulate</b> data.</i>

<u>assemble</u>	Create by putting components or members together. <i><b>Assemble</b> your colleagues.</i>
<u>bibliography</u>	The history or systematic description of books, their authorship, printing, publication, editions, etc. <i>A <b>bibliography</b> of his publications.</i>
<u>cluster</u>	Form a cluster or clusters. <i>There are several <b>clusters</b> in Cassiopeia.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>A <b>collect</b> call.</i>
<u>compose</u>	Produce a literary work. <i>The king with some difficulty <b>composed</b> this difference.</i>
confluent	Flowing together or merging. <i>These <b>confluent</b> tones helped to fuse and unite his landscapes.</i>
converge	(of lines) tend to meet at a point. <i>The lines <b>converge</b> at this point.</i>
<u>convergence</u>	The approach of an infinite series to a finite limit. <i>These bivalves have assumed similar characters by <b>convergence</b>.</i>
convergent	Coming closer together; converging. <i>A <b>convergent</b> boundary.</i>
cumulate	Attach two double bonds to the same carbon atom. <i>They appear to have formed from <b>cumulates</b> in the root of a magma chamber.</i>
<u>dossier</u>	A collection of documents about a particular person, event, or subject. <i>We have a <b>dossier</b> on him.</i>

<b><u>heap</u></b>	Form a heap. <i>She <b>heaped</b> scorn upon him.</i>
<b>interlinear</b>	(of a book) having the same text in different languages printed on alternate lines. <i><b>Interlinear</b> glosses.</i>
<b>locally</b>	In a way that can be accessed without the use of a network. <i>I shop <b>locally</b> wherever possible.</i>
<b>nucleate</b>	Form a nucleus. <i>Ice crystals <b>nucleate</b> high in the atmosphere and grow as they fall.</i>
