Definitions of "Compile" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “compile” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Accumulate (a specified score).*
- *Put together out of existing material.*
- *Convert (a program) into a machine-code or lower-level form in which the program can be executed.*
- *Use a computer program to translate source code written in a particular programming language into computer-readable machine code that can be executed.*
- *Produce (a list or book) by assembling information collected from other sources.*
- *Get or gather together.*
- *Collect (information) in order to produce a list or book.*

categorize	Place in a particular class or group. <i>Silk is categorized as a luxury import.</i>
<u>chart</u>	Make a chart of. <i>Bush is charting a course to destroy Saddam Hussein.</i>
class	Arrange or order by classes or categories. <i>Conduct which is classed as criminal.</i>
<u>classify</u>	Assign to a class or kind. <i>How would you classify these pottery shards are they prehistoric.</i>
collate	Appoint (a member of the clergy) to a benefice. <i>Collate the papers.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>He collected the rent.</i>
<u>compose</u>	Calm or settle (oneself or one's features or thoughts). <i>In offices where close set text was composed both men and women pieceworkers were normally employed.</i>
dispose	Make receptive or willing towards an action or attitude or belief. <i>The Scottish champions were buoyant after they disposed of English champions Leeds.</i>
<u>file</u>	Smooth with a file. <i>The company had filed for bankruptcy.</i>
grade	Determine the grade of or assign a grade to. <i>Grade tests.</i>
group	Arrange into a group or groups. <i>Three chairs were grouped around a table.</i>
<u>hoard</u>	Get or gather together. <i>He hoarded the memory in his heart.</i>
<u>index</u>	List in an index. <i>Index the book.</i>
list	Include in a list. <i>The bottom of the line Mercedes lists for 52 050.</i>
<u>log</u>	Enter into a log as on ships and planes. <i>The incident has to be logged.</i>
make up	Represent fictitiously, as in a play, or pretend to be or act like.
marshal	Lead ceremoniously, as in a procession. <i>She is one of those people who can marshal their thoughts quickly and articulate them clearly.</i>

order	Issue commands or orders for. <i>She resented being ordered about.</i>
<u>organize</u>	Form (a number of people) into a trade union or other political group. <i>Can you help me organize my files.</i>
pile up	Arrange in stacks.
put together	Attribute or give.
range	Place or arrange in a row or rows or in a specified manner. <i>Estimates for the losses in the earthquake range as high as 2 billion.</i>
rate	Be regarded in a specified way. <i>This bond rates highly.</i>
roll up	Cause to move by turning over or in a circular manner of as if on an axis.
set out	Locate.
sort	Resolve the problems or difficulties of. <i>The mail was sorted.</i>
sort out	Examine in order to test suitability.
structure	Give a structure to. <i>Services must be structured so as to avoid pitfalls.</i>
systematize	Arrange according to an organized system; make systematic. <i>Systematize our scientific knowledge.</i>
systemize	Arrange according to a system or reduce to a system.
tabulate	Arrange or enter in tabular form. <i>The system is designed to enable users to extract analyse and tabulate data.</i>

- *The local authority must compile a list of the names and addresses of taxpayers.*
- *The world champion compiled a break of 101.*

<u>assemble</u>	Create by putting components or members together. <i>Assemble your colleagues.</i>
<u>bibliography</u>	The history or systematic description of books, their authorship, printing, publication, editions, etc. <i>A bibliography of his publications.</i>
<u>cluster</u>	Form a cluster or clusters. <i>There are several clusters in Cassiopeia.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>A collect call.</i>
<u>compose</u>	Produce a literary work. <i>The king with some difficulty composed this difference.</i>
confluent	Flowing together or merging. <i>These confluent tones helped to fuse and unite his landscapes.</i>
converge	(of lines) tend to meet at a point. <i>The lines converge at this point.</i>
<u>convergence</u>	The approach of an infinite series to a finite limit. <i>These bivalves have assumed similar characters by convergence.</i>
convergent	Coming closer together; converging. <i>A convergent boundary.</i>
cumulate	Attach two double bonds to the same carbon atom. <i>They appear to have formed from cumulates in the root of a magma chamber.</i>
<u>dossier</u>	A collection of documents about a particular person, event, or subject. <i>We have a dossier on him.</i>
<u>edit</u>	A version of written recorded or filmed material made as a result of editing. <i>The story was ruthlessly edited down to its allotted span.</i>
<u>file</u>	File a formal charge against. <i>You can save the file to your hard disk.</i>
focused	Directing a great deal of attention, interest, or activity towards a particular aim. <i>He seems to be very focused on the new challenge.</i>
<u>gather</u>	A part of a garment that is gathered. <i>The front is gathered at the waist.</i>
glossary	An alphabetical list of technical terms in some specialized field of knowledge; usually published as an appendix to a text on that field. <i>A glossary of Inuktitut words.</i>

heap	Form a heap. <i>She heaped scorn upon him.</i>
interlinear	(of a book) having the same text in different languages printed on alternate lines. <i>Interlinear glosses.</i>
locally	In a way that can be accessed without the use of a network. <i>I shop locally wherever possible.</i>
nucleate	Form a nucleus. <i>Ice crystals nucleate high in the atmosphere and grow as they fall.</i>
overlap	A part or amount which overlaps. <i>There was no overlap between their proposals.</i>
pile	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>We all piled in and headed off to our mysterious destination.</i>
superimpose	Place on top of. <i>The number will appear on the screen superimposed on a flashing button.</i>
tributary	(of a stream) flowing into a larger stream. <i>A tributary colony.</i>
united	Used in names of soccer and other sports teams formed by amalgamation. <i>Women acting together in a united way.</i>
