self-regard	The quality of being worthy of esteem or respect.
self-satisfaction	The feeling you have when you are satisfied with yourself.
smugness	Excessive pride in oneself or one's achievements. <i>The smugness of a man basking too long in critical ardour.</i>

- *His complacency was absolutely disgusting.*

bliss	A state of spiritual blessedness, typically that reached after death. <i>Josh is just blissed out always smiling.</i>
complacent	Contented to a fault with oneself or one's actions. <i>He had become complacent after years of success.</i>
content	Make content. <i>I am contented.</i>
contented	Satisfied or showing satisfaction with things as they are. <i>I felt warm and contented.</i>
contentment	Happiness with one's situation in life. <i>He found contentment in living a simple life in the country.</i>
delectation	A feeling of extreme pleasure or satisfaction. <i>They had all manner of rock n roll goodies for our delectation.</i>
enjoyable	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>The company was enjoyable.</i>
exult	Feel or show triumphant elation or jubilation. <i>Exulting in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
exultant	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i>
glad	Causing happiness. <i>He was glad that Phyllis was gone.</i>
gratification	The act or an instance of satisfying. <i>A thirst for sexual gratification.</i>
happiness	The state of being happy. <i>She struggled to find happiness in her life.</i>
happy	Willing to do something. <i>A happy outcome.</i>
idleness	The quality of lacking substance or value. <i>He was punished for his idleness at school.</i>
inactivity	The state of being inactive. <i>Don t suddenly take up violent exercise after years of inactivity.</i>
joviality	A jovial nature.
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing children.</i>
lull	Calm by deception. <i>Don t let yourself be lulled into a false state of security.</i>

<u>motionless</u>	Not moving; stationary. <i>An eagle hung almost motionless close to the ground.</i>
peace	A treaty agreeing peace between warring states. <i>Police action to restore peace.</i>
<u>pleased</u>	Proud of one's achievements, especially excessively so; self-satisfied. <i>Both girls were pleased with their new hairstyles.</i>
quiescence	Inactivity or dormancy. <i>This method has been shown to induce sleep like quiescence in adult animals.</i>
quiescent	Causing no symptoms. <i>The quiescent melancholy of the town.</i>
quietly	With little or no activity or no agitation quiet is a nonstandard variant for quietly. <i>The rock star was quietly led out the back door.</i>
satisfaction	State of being gratified or satisfied. <i>I demand the satisfaction of a gentleman.</i>
satisfactorily	In a way that fulfils expectations or needs; acceptably. <i>The plan has not worked satisfactorily.</i>
<u>satisfied</u>	Filled with satisfaction. <i>Satisfied customers.</i>
<u>stationary</u>	Standing still. <i>A car collided with a stationary vehicle.</i>
still	A plant and works where alcoholic drinks are made by distillation. <i>He couldn't hold still any longer.</i>
tranquilize	Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to.
