<b>pat on the back</b>	The sound made by a gentle blow.
<b>praise</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i>The audience was full of <b>praise</b> for the whole production.</i>
<b>regards</b>	A detail or point. <i>Give him my kind <b>regards</b>.</i>
<b>respects</b>	The condition of being honored (esteemed or respected or well regarded). <i>He paid his <b>respects</b> to the mayor.</i>
<b>salutations</b>	(usually plural) an acknowledgment or expression of good will (especially on meeting).
<b>tribute</b>	Payment made periodically by one state or ruler to another, especially as a sign of dependence. <i>A symposium organized to pay <b>tribute</b> to Darwin.</i>

<b>honour</b>	Accept (a bill) or pay (a cheque) when due. <i>Make sure the franchisees <b>honour</b> the terms of the contract.</i>
<b>make much of</b>	Act in a certain way so as to acquire.
<b>pat on the back</b>	Pat or squeeze fondly or playfully, especially under the chin.
<b>pay tribute to</b>	Make a compensation for.
<b>praise</b>	Express one's respect and gratitude towards (a deity), especially in song. <i>We <b>praise</b> God for past blessings.</i>
<b>salute</b>	Make a formal salute to. <i>Don't you usually <b>salute</b> a superior officer.</i>

<b>eulogize</b>	Praise highly in speech or writing. <i>He was <b>eulogized</b> as a rock star.</i>
<b>eulogy</b>	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly, especially a tribute to someone who has just died. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<b>euphonious</b>	(of speech or dialect) pleasing in sound; not harsh or strident. <i>A stream of fine <b>euphonious</b> phrases.</i>

<b>extol</b>	Praise enthusiastically. <i><b>Extol</b> the virtues of one's children.</i>
<b>flatter</b>	Lavish praise and compliments on (someone), often insincerely and with the aim of furthering one's own interests. <i>The beauty of the stone <b>flattered</b> the clergyman's eyes.</i>
<b>flattery</b>	Excessive and insincere praise, given especially to further one's own interests. <i>She allowed no hint of <b>flattery</b> to enter her voice.</i>
<b>glorify</b>	Praise glorify or honor. <i><b>Glorify</b> one's spouse's cooking.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	Compliments or congratulations. <i>She was looking for <b>kudos</b> rather than profit.</i>
<b>laud</b>	Praise. <i>The obituary <b>lauded</b> him as a great statesman and soldier.</i>
<b>laudable</b>	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i><b>Laudable</b> though the aim might be the results have been criticized.</i>
<b>paeon</b>	A song of praise or triumph. <i>He's created a filmic <b>paeon</b> to his hero.</i>
<b>panegyric</b>	A public speech or published text in praise of someone or something. <i>A <b>panegyric</b> on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
<b>praise</b>	Express approval of. <i>The parents <b>praised</b> their children for their academic performance.</i>
<b>praiseworthy</b>	Deserving approval and admiration. <i>A significant and <b>praiseworthy</b> increase in computer intelligence.</i>
<b>rave</b>	Attend a rave party. <i>New York's critics <b>raved</b> about the acting.</i>
<b>tout</b>	Someone who advertises for customers in an especially brazen way. <i>He made his fortune <b>touting</b> tickets.</i>
<b>tribute</b>	Payment extorted by gangsters on threat of violence. <i>A symposium organized to pay <b>tribute</b> to Darwin.</i>
<b>virtue</b>	A quality considered morally good or desirable in a person. <i>Mike was extolling the <b>virtues</b> of the car.</i>
<b>worthy</b>	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i><b>Worthy</b> but tedious advice.</i>
