Definitions of "Compliments" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “compliments” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A remark (or act) expressing praise and admiration.*
- *(usually plural) a polite expression of desire for someone's welfare.*



Synonyms of "Compliments" as a noun (2 Words)

regard The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded.
*She had a particular **regard** for Eliot.*

wish A thing that is or has been wished for.
*The Queen had sent her best **wishes** for a speedy recovery.*



Associations of "Compliments" (30 Words)

acclaim Enthusiastic and public praise.
*The conference was **acclaimed** as a considerable success.*

acclamation Loud and enthusiastic approval.
*The tackle brought the supporters to their feet in **acclamation**.*

admire	Feel admiration for. <i>I admire your courage.</i>
adulation	Servile flattery; exaggerated and hypocritical praise. <i>He found it difficult to cope with the adulation of the fans.</i>
adulatory	Excessively praising or admiring. <i>The tone here is adulatory and uncritical.</i>
applaud	Clap one's hands or shout after performances to indicate approval. <i>His speech was loudly applauded.</i>
commend	Present as suitable for approval or acceptance recommend. <i>His paintings commend him to the artistic world.</i>
commendable	Deserving praise. <i>He showed commendable restraint.</i>
creditable	(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful. <i>The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was creditable.</i>
encomium	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly.
eulogistic	Formally expressing praise.
eulogize	Praise formally and eloquently. <i>The dead woman was eulogized at the funeral.</i>
eulogy	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly, especially a tribute to someone who has just died. <i>A eulogy to the Queen Mother.</i>
euphonious	(of speech or dialect) pleasing in sound; not harsh or strident. <i>Her euphonious Southern speech.</i>
extol	Praise enthusiastically. <i>He extolled the virtues of the Russian peoples.</i>
flatter	Give an unrealistically favourable impression of. <i>She felt flattered that he was confiding in her.</i>
flattery	Excessive and insincere praise, given especially to further one's own interests. <i>She allowed no hint of flattery to enter her voice.</i>
glorify	Praise glorify or honor. <i>Glorify one s spouse s cooking.</i>
kudos	Praise and honour received for an achievement. <i>Kudos to everyone who put the event together.</i>
laud	Praise, glorify, or honor. <i>All glory laud and honour to Thee Redeemer King.</i>

laudable	(of an action, idea, or aim) deserving praise and commendation. <i>Applaudable efforts to save the environment.</i>
paean	A hymn of praise (especially one sung in ancient Greece to invoke or thank a deity). <i>He s created a filmic paean to his hero.</i>
panegyric	A public speech or published text in praise of someone or something. <i>A panegyric on the pleasures of malt whisky.</i>
praise	Express warm approval or admiration of. <i>The audience was full of praise for the whole production.</i>
praiseworthy	Worthy of high praise. <i>The government s praiseworthy efforts.</i>
rave	Electronic dance music of the kind played at a rave. <i>The album is an eleven track journey through rave and techno.</i>
tout	A person soliciting custom or business, typically in a direct or persistent manner. <i>She was touted as a potential Prime Minister.</i>
tribute	Payment extorted by gangsters on threat of violence. <i>The king had at his disposal plunder and tribute amassed through warfare.</i>
virtue	A particular moral excellence. <i>Paragons of virtue.</i>
worthy	Worthy of being chosen especially as a spouse. <i>A fact worthy of attention.</i>
