## **Composes as a Verb**

### **Definitions of "Composes" as a verb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “composes” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Make up plans or basic details for.*
- *Produce a literary work.*
- *Calm (someone, especially oneself); make quiet.*
- *Form the substance of.*
- *Write music.*
- *Put together out of existing material.*



## Synonyms of "Composes" as a verb (6 Words)

**compile** Produce (a list or book) by assembling information collected from other sources.  
*Compile a list.*

**draw up** Reduce the diameter of (a wire or metal rod) by pulling it through a die.

**frame** Enclose in or as if in a frame.  
*A short style cut to **frame** the face.*

**indite** Produce a literary work.  
*He **indites** the wondrous tale of Our Lord.*

**pen** Write or compose.  
*Olivia **penned** award winning poetry.*

**write** Write or name the letters that comprise the conventionally accepted form of a word or part of a word.  
*Thank you and goodbye I ll **write** soon.*



## Usage Examples of "Composes" as a verb

- *Greed and ambition composed his personality.*
- *She composed a poem.*
- *Beethoven composed nine symphonies.*
- *She had to compose herself before she could reply to this terrible insult.*





## Associations of "Composes" (30 Words)

<b>atonal</b>	Not written in any key or mode. <i><b>Atonal</b> music may be written by obscuring tonal structures or by ignoring conventional harmonies altogether.</i>
<b>ballpoint</b>	A pen that has a small metal ball as the point of transfer of ink to paper.
<b>bard</b>	A lyric poet. <i>Our national <b>bard</b> Robert Burns.</i>
<b>bibliography</b>	A list of writings with time and place of publication (such as the writings of a single author or the works referred to in preparing a document etc. <i>A <b>bibliography</b> of his publications.</i>
<b>compile</b>	Accumulate (a specified score). <i><b>Compile</b> a list.</i>
<b>comprise</b>	Form or compose. <i>This single breed <b>comprises</b> 50 per cent of the Swiss cattle population.</i>
<b>constitute</b>	Be (a part) of a whole. <i>The superior courts were <b>constituted</b> by the Judicature Acts 1873 5.</i>

<b>dossier</b>	A collection of papers containing detailed information about a particular person or subject (usually a person's record). <i>We have a <b>dossier</b> on him.</i>
<b>extempore</b>	Without prior preparation. <i>An <b>extempore</b> skit.</i>
<b>extemporize</b>	Perform without preparation. <i>He <b>extemporized</b> a speech at the wedding.</i>
<b>harmonize</b>	Write a harmony for. <i>The colors don't <b>harmonize</b>.</i>
<b>immediate</b>	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>His <b>immediate</b> superior in the department.</i>
<b>impromptu</b>	A short musical passage that seems to have been made spontaneously without advance preparation. <i>A witty <b>impromptu</b> must not sound premeditated.</i>
<b>improvise</b>	Perform without preparation. <i>He invited actors to <b>improvise</b> dialogue.</i>
<b>improvised</b>	Created and performed spontaneously or without preparation; impromptu. <i>An <b>improvised</b> short speech.</i>
<b>indite</b>	Produce a literary work. <i>He <b>indites</b> the wondrous tale of Our Lord.</i>
<b>instantly</b>	At once; immediately. <i>She fell asleep almost <b>instantly</b>.</i>
<b>makeup</b>	Cosmetics applied to the face to improve or change your appearance. <i>He missed the test and had to take a <b>makeup</b>.</i>
<b>music</b>	Music the sounds produced by singers or musical instruments or reproductions of such sounds. <i>Baroque <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>notebook</b>	A small book with blank or ruled pages for writing notes in. <i>He copied the number into his <b>notebook</b>.</i>
<b>offhand</b>	Without previous thought or preparation. <i>We decided <b>offhand</b> to go to Canada.</i>
<b>opus</b>	A musical work that has been created. <i>He was writing an <b>opus</b> on Mexico.</i>
<b>oratory</b>	Addressing an audience formally (usually a long and rhetorical address and often pompous). <i>He loved the sound of his own <b>oratory</b>.</i>

- orchestrate** Plan and direct (a complex undertaking).  
*The situation has been **orchestrated** by a tiny minority.*
- organize** Arrange by systematic planning and united effort.  
*The soul doth **organize** the body.*
- pen** An electronic device like a pen used in conjunction with a writing surface to enter commands or data into a computer.  
*She was forced to support herself by the **pen**.*
- poet** A writer of poems the term is usually reserved for writers of good poetry.  
*He is more **poet** than academic because of his gift for language.*
- priesthood** Priests in general.  
*There was relief among the Anglican **priesthood**.*
- song** A musical composition suggestive of a song.  
*The pilgrims broke into **song**.*
- spontaneously** Without advance preparation.  
*Mutations can occur **spontaneously**.*
