Associations of "Composes" (30 Words)

atonal	Not written in any key or mode. Atonal music may be written by obscuring tonal structures or by ignoring conventional harmonies altogether.
ballpoint	A pen that has a small metal ball as the point of transfer of ink to paper.
<u>bard</u>	A lyric poet. Our national bard Robert Burns.
<u>bibliography</u>	A list of writings with time and place of publication (such as the writings of a single author or the works referred to in preparing a document etc. <i>A bibliography of his publications.</i>
<u>compile</u>	Accumulate (a specified score. <i>Compile</i> a list.
<u>comprise</u>	Form or compose. This single breed comprise s 50 per cent of the Swiss cattle population.
<u>constitute</u>	Be (a part) of a whole. The superior courts were constitute d by the Judicature Acts 1873 5.



<u>dossier</u>	A collection of papers containing detailed information about a particular person or subject (usually a person's record. <i>We have a dossier on him.</i>
extempore	Without prior preparation. An extempore skit.
extemporize	Perform without preparation. He extemporize d a speech at the wedding.
harmonize	Write a harmony for. <i>The colors don t harmonize</i> .
immediate	Immediately before or after as in a chain of cause and effect. <i>His immediate superior in the department.</i>
<u>impromptu</u>	A short musical passage that seems to have been made spontaneously without advance preparation. A witty impromptu must not sound premeditated.
<u>improvise</u>	Perform without preparation. <i>He invited actors to improvise dialogue.</i>
improvised	Created and performed spontaneously or without preparation; impromptu. <i>An improvised short speech</i> .
indite	Produce a literary work. <i>He indites the wondrous tale of Our Lord</i> .
<u>instantly</u>	At once; immediately. <i>She fell asleep almost instantly.</i>
makeup	Cosmetics applied to the face to improve or change your appearance. <i>He missed the test and had to take a makeup.</i>
music	Music the sounds produced by singers or musical instruments or reproductions of such sounds. <i>Baroque music</i> .
notebook	A small book with blank or ruled pages for writing notes in. <i>He copied the number into his notebook.</i>
offhand	Without previous thought or preparation. We decided offhand to go to Canada.
opus	A musical work that has been created. <i>He was writing an opus on Mexico.</i>
oratory	Addressing an audience formally (usually a long and rhetorical address and often pompous. <i>He loved the sound of his own oratory.</i>



<u>orchestrate</u>	Plan and direct (a complex undertaking. The situation has been orchestrate d by a tiny minority.
<u>organize</u>	Arrange by systematic planning and united effort. The soul doth organize the body.
pen	An electronic device like a pen used in conjunction with a writing surface to enter commands or data into a computer. <i>She was forced to support herself by the pen.</i>
poet	A writer of poems the term is usually reserved for writers of good poetry. <i>He is more</i> poet <i>than academic because of his gift for language.</i>
priesthood	Priests in general. There was relief among the Anglican priesthood .
song	A musical composition suggestive of a song. The pilgrims broke into song .
spontaneously	Without advance preparation. <i>Mutations can occur spontaneously.</i>
