alloy

A metal made by combining two or more metallic elements, especially to give greater strength or resistance to corrosion.
***Alloy** wheels.*

amalgam

An alloy of mercury with another metal usually silver used by dentists to fill cavities in teeth except for iron and platinum all metals dissolve in mercury and chemists refer to the resulting mercury mixtures as amalgams.
*His theory is an **amalgam** of earlier ideas.*

amalgamation

The action, process, or result of combining or uniting.
*An **amalgamation** of two separate companies.*

anatomy

A detailed analysis.
*Human **anatomy**.*

arrangement	An organized structure for arranging or classifying. <i>Mozart's symphonies in arrangements for cello and piano.</i>
<u>article</u>	The definite or indefinite article. <i>Small household articles.</i>
<u>authorship</u>	The state or fact of being the writer of a book, article, or document, or the creator of a work of art. <i>The single authorship of the book gives it a uniformity of style and a proper balance between chapters.</i>
blend	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>Smog is a blend of smoke and fog.</i>
coalescence	The joining or merging of elements to form one mass or whole. <i>A sophisticated coalescence of melodies and harmonies.</i>
<u>coalition</u>	The union of diverse things into one body or form or group; the growing together of parts. <i>They had a taste of government in coalition with the Social Democrats.</i>
compilation	The action or process of producing something, especially a list or book, by assembling information collected from other sources. <i>There are thirty three stories in this compilation.</i>
composing	Musical creation.
<u>composite</u>	A composite constructional material. <i>The next decade may well see the introduction of more designer polymers and composites.</i>
<u>compound</u>	An enclosure of residences and other building (especially in the Orient). <i>The air smelled like a compound of diesel and petrol fumes.</i>
<u>concoction</u>	Any foodstuff made by combining different ingredients. <i>She has no peer in the concoction of mystery stories.</i>
<u>configuration</u>	The fixed three-dimensional relationship of the atoms in a molecule, defined by the bonds between them. <i>The PC comes with a removable hard disk drive as part of the standard configuration.</i>
conformation	A symmetrical arrangement of the parts of a thing. <i>The judges run their hands over the dog's body and legs checking its conformation.</i>
<u>conjunction</u>	The grammatical relation between linguistic units words or phrases or clauses that are connected by a conjunction. <i>A conjunction of favourable political and economic circumstances.</i>

<u>constitution</u>	The constitution written at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia in 1787 and subsequently ratified by the original thirteen states. <i>The constitution of a police authority.</i>
construction	Drawing a figure satisfying certain conditions as part of solving a problem or proving a theorem. <i>During the construction we had to take a detour.</i>
creation	The human act of creating. <i>Creation of a coalition government.</i>
design	A decorative pattern. <i>Good design can help the reader understand complicated information.</i>
devising	A gift of real property by will. <i>The devising of plans.</i>
<u>disposition</u>	The action of arranging people or things in a particular way. <i>A swelling with a disposition to rupture.</i>
essay	A short piece of writing on a particular subject. <i>A misjudged essay in job preservation.</i>
<u>fabric</u>	Cloth or other material produced by weaving or knitting fibres. <i>Decay and neglect are slowly eating away at the building's fabric.</i>
fashioning	Characteristic or habitual practice. <i>The fashioning of pots and pans.</i>
form	An ability to perform well. <i>A form of words.</i>
<u>format</u>	The organization of information according to preset specifications usually for computer processing. <i>A data file in binary format.</i>
formation	A group of people or things in a particular arrangement or pattern. <i>The formation of pseudopods.</i>
<u>formulation</u>	A material or mixture prepared according to a formula. <i>Post shave formulations which keep skin soft.</i>
framework	A hypothetical description of a complex entity or process. <i>Providing a factual framework for future research.</i>
framing	The action of framing something. <i>The framing of judicial decrees.</i>
fusing	Any igniter that is used to initiate the burning of a propellant.

<u>fusion</u>	The process or result of joining two or more things together to form a single entity. <i>Fusion cuisine.</i>
incorporation	Including by incorporating. <i>A law allowing incorporation as a company.</i>
integration	The act of combining into an integral whole. <i>Mathematical integrations.</i>
<u>invention</u>	Used as a title for a short piece of music. <i>Medieval inventions included spectacles for reading and the spinning wheel.</i>
<u>layout</u>	A thing arranged or set out in a particular way. <i>The road layout.</i>
make-up	An event that is substituted for a previously cancelled event.
makeup	The way in which someone or something is composed. <i>He missed the test and had to take a makeup.</i>
making up	An attribute that must be met or complied with and that fits a person for something.
marriage	The state of being a married couple voluntarily joined for life (or until divorce). <i>Her music is a marriage of funk jazz and hip hop.</i>
<u>meld</u>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>A meld of many contributions.</i>
merger	The combination of two or more commercial companies. <i>Merger can be applied for when the freehold and leasehold estates become vested in the same person.</i>
mingling	The action of people mingling and coming into contact. <i>All the random mingling and idle talk made him hate literary parties.</i>
mix	A version of a recording in which the component tracks are mixed in a different way from the original. <i>The school has a good social mix.</i>
<u>mixture</u>	An event that combines things in a mixture. <i>He was a curious mixture an unpredictable man.</i>
musical composition	A play or film whose action and dialogue is interspersed with singing and dancing.
musical work	A play or film whose action and dialogue is interspersed with singing and dancing.

oeuvre	A work of art, music, or literature. <i>He studied the entire Wagnerian oeuvre.</i>
opus	A separate composition or set of compositions. <i>He was writing an opus on Mexico.</i>
organization	The way in which the elements of a whole are arranged. <i>His organization of the work force was very efficient.</i>
<u>origination</u>	The act of starting something for the first time; introducing something new. <i>There are a number of theories on the origination of the name.</i>
paper	The physical object that is the product of a newspaper publisher. <i>You need to test your students mark their papers and place them in the right class.</i>
penning	A correctional institution for those convicted of major crimes.
piece	A figure or token used to make moves in a board game. <i>Indicate which piece or pawn is taken.</i>
piece of music	An artistic or literary composition.
piece of writing	A work of art of some artistic value.
pooling	Something resembling a pool of liquid.
production	The overall sound of a musical recording, as determined by the way in which it is produced. <i>The record's production is gloriously relaxed.</i>
report	The act of informing by verbal report. <i>The report of his speech.</i>
structure	The quality of being organized. <i>Artists must study the structure of the human body.</i>
study	A room used for reading and writing and studying. <i>A study of a sample of 5 000 children.</i>
synthesis	Reasoning from the general to the particular (or from cause to effect). <i>The synthesis of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
<u>text</u>	A textbook. <i>The professor wrote the text that he assigned students to buy.</i>
theme	(linguistics) the form of a word after all affixes are removed. <i>The theme is announced in the first measures.</i>
thinking up	The process of using your mind to consider something carefully.
typography	The art or procedure of arranging type or processing data and printing from it.

union

A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff.

*A currency **union** between the two countries.*

weave

A hairstyle created by weaving pieces of real or artificial hair into a person's existing hair, typically in order to increase its length or thickness.

*Trailers show him with dyed blond hair and in one scene a flowing blond **weave**.*

work

A place where work is done.

*I was returning home from **work** on a packed subway.*

work of art

Applying the mind to learning and understanding a subject (especially by reading).

writing

The activity or skill of writing.

*The **writings** of Gertrude Stein.*

coordinate	Form a coordinate bond to an atom or molecule. <i>These activities coordinate well.</i>
design	Create the design for create or execute in an artistic or highly skilled manner. <i>The coach had a design on the doors.</i>
disguise	The act of concealing the identity of something by modifying its appearance. <i>I told them you were a policewoman in disguise.</i>
disguised	Concealed or obscured; made unrecognizable. <i>Are all of your novels disguised autobiography.</i>
element	Each of more than one hundred substances that cannot be chemically interconverted or broken down into simpler substances and are primary constituents of matter Each element is distinguished by its atomic number i e the number of protons in the nuclei of its atoms. <i>A component or constituent element of a system.</i>
factor	With numeral a sunscreen of the sun protection factor specified. <i>A quantum computer can factor the number 15.</i>
governmental	Relating to or denoting the government of a country or state. <i>A governmental agency.</i>
harmonize	Bring into consonance or accord. <i>The colors don t harmonize.</i>
lipstick	Form by tracing with lipstick. <i>The clown had lipsticked circles on his cheeks.</i>
makeup	Cosmetics applied to the face to improve or change your appearance. <i>The two teams played a makeup one week later.</i>
module	Each of a set of independent units of study or training that can be combined in a number of ways to form a course at a college or university. <i>Spacelab an extra module for the shuttle will quadruple the experimental facilities on board.</i>
orchestrate	Plan or coordinate the elements of (a situation) to produce a desired effect, especially surreptitiously. <i>The situation has been orchestrated by a tiny minority.</i>

organization	The persons (or committees or departments etc.) who make up a body for the purpose of administering something. <i>He was brought in to supervise the organization of a new department.</i>
organizational	Of or relating to an organization. <i>Organizational structure.</i>
<u>organize</u>	Arrange systematically; order. <i>Can you help me organize my files.</i>
<u>reconcile</u>	Make (one thing) compatible with (another). <i>It is not necessary to reconcile the cost accounts to the financial accounts.</i>
<u>redefine</u>	Give a new or different definition of (a word). <i>She redefined his duties.</i>
reorganize	Organize anew. <i>The company reorganized into fewer key areas.</i>
system	A method of choosing one's procedure in gambling. <i>He bought a new stereo system.</i>
systematize	Arrange according to a system or reduce to a system. <i>Systematize our scientific knowledge.</i>
typography	The style and appearance of printed matter.
