## Comrade as a Noun

### Definitions of "Comrade" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “comrade” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *(among men) a colleague or a fellow member of an organization.*
- *A fellow soldier or member of the armed forces.*
- *A fellow member of the Communist Party.*
- *A fellow socialist or communist (often as a form of address).*
- *(in South Africa) a young militant supporter of the African National Congress.*
- *A friend who is frequently in the company of another.*
- *Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement.*



## Synonyms of "Comrade" as a noun (10 Words)

**associate**

A person who joins with others in some activity or endeavor.  
*Associates in the law firm bill at a lower rate than do partners.*

**brother**

A male person who is a fellow member (of a fraternity or religion or other group).  
*There I was with one white boy and this other **brother**.*

**co-worker**

An associate that one works with.

<b>colleague</b>	An associate that one works with. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b><u>companion</u></b>	A friend who is frequently in the company of another. <i>Steve and his live in <b>companion</b>.</i>
<b>comrade-in-arms</b>	The official symbols of a family, state, etc.
<b><u>familiar</u></b>	A demon supposedly attending and obeying a witch, often said to assume the form of an animal. <i>Her <b>familiars</b> were her two little griffons that nested in her skirts.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	A member of a learned society. <i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his <b>fellows</b>.</i>
<b>friend</b>	A familiar or helpful thing. <i>He was my best <b>friend</b> at the university.</i>
<b><u>partner</u></b>	A person s partner in marriage. <i>She and her dance <b>partner</b> were on the show for seven weeks.</i>

## Associations of "Comrade" (30 Words)

<b><u>acquaintance</u></b>	Acquaintances considered collectively. <i>I have trouble remembering the names of all my <b>acquaintances</b>.</i>
<b><u>aunt</u></b>	The sister of one's father or mother or the wife of one's uncle. <i>She was brought up by her <b>aunt</b> and uncle.</i>
<b>beau</b>	A boyfriend or male admirer.
<b><u>brother</u></b>	A male person who is a fellow member (of a fraternity or religion or other group). <i>My <b>brother</b> still lives with our parents.</i>
<b><u>buddy</u></b>	Become friendly and spend time with someone. <i>I decided to <b>buddy</b> up to them.</i>
<b><u>camaraderie</u></b>	Mutual trust and friendship among people who spend a lot of time together. <i>The enforced <b>camaraderie</b> of office life.</i>
<b>colleague</b>	An associate that one works with. <i>The surgeon consulted his <b>colleagues</b>.</i>
<b><u>companion</u></b>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>He is <b>companioned</b> by a pageboy.</i>
<b>companionship</b>	A feeling of fellowship or friendship. <i>The love and <b>companionship</b> of marriage.</i>
<b>compatriot</b>	A person from your own country. <i>Stich defeated his <b>compatriot</b> Boris Becker in the quarter finals.</i>
<b>comradeship</b>	The company and friendship of others with common aims. <i>His greatest joy came from <b>comradeship</b> with others in the team.</i>
<b><u>consort</u></b>	Keep company. <i>Queen Victoria and her <b>consort</b> Prince Albert.</i>
<b>countryman</b>	A man who lives in the country and has country ways. <i>They trust a fellow <b>countryman</b>.</i>
<b>cousin</b>	A title formerly used by a sovereign in addressing another sovereign or a noble of their own country. <i>The new motorbikes are not proving as popular as their four wheel <b>cousins</b>.</i>
<b><u>crony</u></b>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>He went gambling with his <b>cronies</b>.</i>
<b><u>fellow</u></b>	A boy or man. <i>There s a <b>fellow</b> at the door.</i>

<b>folk</b>	Folk music. <i>A <b>folk</b> club.</i>
<b>fraternal</b>	Like or characteristic of or befitting a brother. <i><b>Fraternal</b> twins are biovular.</i>
<b>friend</b>	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>He settled for that old <b>friend</b> the compensation grant.</i>
<b>kinsfolk</b>	People descended from a common ancestor.
<b>lad</b>	A male child (a familiar term of address to a boy). <i>Come in <b>lad</b> and shut the door.</i>
<b>mate</b>	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>A sock without its <b>mate</b>.</i>
<b>pal</b>	Used as a form of address, especially to indicate anger or aggression. <i>She <b>palled</b> up with some English chaps.</i>
<b>partner</b>	Associate or work together as partners. <i>A junior <b>partner</b>.</i>
<b>peer</b>	A nobleman duke or marquis or earl or viscount or baron who is a member of the British peerage. <i>The towers <b>peer</b> over the roofs.</i>
<b>sibling</b>	Each of two or more children or offspring having one or both parents in common; a brother or sister.
<b>sister</b>	A senior female nurse, typically in charge of a ward. <i>The ward <b>sister</b> needs to be consulted.</i>
<b>sisterhood</b>	The feeling of kinship with and closeness to a group of women or all women. <i>Much of <b>sisterhood</b> is about sharing lipsticks.</i>
<b>uncle</b>	An unrelated older male friend, especially of a child. <i>He visited his <b>uncle</b>.</i>
<b>workmate</b>	A person with whom one works.
