## Conceal as a Verb

### Definitions of "Conceal" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “conceal” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Hold back; keep from being perceived by others.*
- *Prevent (something) from being known; keep secret.*
- *Prevent from being seen or discovered.*
- *Not allow to be seen; hide.*



## Synonyms of "Conceal" as a verb (16 Words)

<b>camouflaged</b>	Disguise by camouflaging; exploit the natural surroundings to disguise something.
<b>cover up</b>	Be responsible for reporting the details of, as in journalism.
<b><a href="#">disguise</a></b>	Make unrecognizable. <i>Brian was <b>disguised</b> as a priest.</i>
<b>dissemble</b>	Behave unnaturally or affectedly. <i>An honest sincere person with no need to <b>dissemble</b>.</i>
<b>hide</b>	Prevent (someone or something) from being seen. <i>Herbert could hardly <b>hide</b> his dislike.</i>
<b>hold back</b>	To close within bounds limit or hold back from movement.
<b>hold in</b>	Support or hold in a certain manner.
<b>keep hidden</b>	Conform one's action or practice to.
<b>keep out of sight</b>	Maintain in safety from injury, harm, or danger.
<b><a href="#">mask</a></b>	Cover the face with a mask. <i>The herb <b>masks</b> the garlic taste.</i>
<b>obscured</b>	Make less visible or unclear.

<b>out of sight</b>	Reveal (something) about somebody's identity or lifestyle.
<b>screened</b>	Test or examine for the presence of disease or infection.
<b>secrete</b>	Generate and separate from cells or bodily fluids. <i>The money was <b>secreted</b> from his children.</i>
<b>tuck away</b>	Draw together into folds or puckers.
<b>veil</b>	Cover with a veil. <i>Women in Afghanistan <b>veil</b> their faces.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Conceal" as a verb

- *She conceals her anger well.*
- *They were at great pains to conceal that information from the public.*
- *A line of sand dunes concealed the distant sea.*



## Associations of "Conceal" (30 Words)

- awning** A sheet of canvas or other material stretched on a frame and used to keep the sun or rain off a shop window, doorway, or ship's deck.
- burial** A grave or the remains found in it.  
*They will give him a proper **burial**.*
- bury** Hide (something) from sight.  
*I tried to **bury** these unpleasant memories.*
- camouflage** Hide or disguise the presence of a person animal or object by means of camouflage.  
*The whiteness of polar bears provides **camouflage**.*
- casket** Enclose in a casket.  
*A small brass **casket** containing four black opals.*
- cemetery** A tract of land used for burials.  
*A military **cemetery**.*

<b>coffin</b>	Place into a coffin. <i>Her body was <b>coffined</b>.</i>
<b>cover</b>	The protective covering on the front back and spine of a book. <i>The <b>cover</b> concealed their guns from enemy aircraft.</i>
<b>crypt</b>	An underground room or vault beneath a church, used as a chapel or burial place.
<b>disguise</b>	The concealing of one's true intentions or feelings. <i>We <b>disguised</b> our faces before robbing the bank.</i>
<b>entomb</b>	Bury or trap within something. <i>Mummified bodies were <b>entombed</b> in the pyramids of Egypt.</i>
<b>funeral</b>	A sermon delivered at a funeral. <i>The community would call him to preach the <b>funeral</b>.</i>
<b>grave</b>	A hole dug in the ground to receive a coffin or dead body, typically marked by a stone or mound. <i>The coffin was lowered into the <b>grave</b>.</i>
<b>hide</b>	Prevent from being seen or discovered. <i>Juliet's first instinct was to <b>hide</b> under the blankets.</i>
<b>inhume</b>	Place in a grave or tomb. <i>No hand his bones shall gather or <b>inhume</b>.</i>
<b>inter</b>	Place (a corpse) in a grave or tomb, typically with funeral rites. <i>He was <b>interred</b> with the military honours due to him.</i>
<b>interment</b>	The ritual placing of a corpse in a grave. <i><b>Interments</b> took place in the churchyard.</i>
<b>mask</b>	A party of guests wearing costumes and masks. <i>No <b>mask</b> could conceal his ignorance.</i>
<b>mausoleum</b>	A large burial chamber, usually above ground. <i>The cathedral was built in 1517 as a royal <b>mausoleum</b>.</i>
<b>mimicry</b>	The action or skill of imitating someone or something, especially in order to entertain or ridicule. <i>A playful <b>mimicry</b> of the techniques of realist writers.</i>
<b>mummification</b>	(pathology) gangrene that develops in the presence of arterial obstruction and is characterized by dryness of the dead tissue and a dark brown color. <i>Bureaucratic <b>mummification</b> in red tape.</i>
<b>necropolis</b>	A cemetery, especially a large one belonging to an ancient city.
<b>quietus</b>	Euphemisms for death (based on an analogy between lying in a bed and in a tomb).

<b>sarcophagus</b>	A stone coffin (usually bearing sculpture or inscriptions).
<b>secretly</b>	In a secret way; without others knowing. <i>The two were <b>secretly</b> married in 1751.</i>
<b>sepulcher</b>	A chamber that is used as a grave.
<b>shade</b>	Represent the effect of shade or shadow on. <i>A small lamp with a crimson <b>shade</b>.</i>
<b>subterfuge</b>	Deceit used in order to achieve one's goal. <i>I hated all the <b>subterfuges</b> I hated lying to you.</i>
<b>tarpaulin</b>	A sheet or covering of tarpaulin. <i>Large <b>tarpaulins</b> were pulled over the hold.</i>
<b>tomb</b>	A place for the burial of a corpse especially beneath the ground and marked by a tombstone. <i>The house was as quiet as a <b>tomb</b>.</i>
