### Definitions of "Concede" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “concede” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Admit (defeat) in a match or contest.*
- *Give over; surrender or relinquish to the physical control of another.*
- *Allow (a lead or advantage) to slip.*
- *Be willing to concede.*
- *Admit defeat in (a match or contest).*
- *Admit or agree that something is true after first denying or resisting it.*
- *Acknowledge defeat.*
- *Admit (to a wrongdoing).*
- *(in sport) fail to prevent an opponent scoring (a goal or point).*
- *Surrender or yield (a possession, right, or privilege).*
- *Grant (a right, privilege, or demand).*

<b>accept</b>	Make use of or accept for some purpose. <i>The cow <b>accepted</b> the bull.</i>
<b>acknowledge</b>	Report the receipt of. <i>He never <b>acknowledges</b> his colleagues when they run into him in the hallway.</i>
<b><u>admit</u></b>	Admit into a group or community. <i>This problem <b>admits</b> of no solution.</i>
<b>allow</b>	Allow the presence of or allow an activity without opposing or prohibiting. <i>I <b>allow</b> for this possibility.</i>
<b>capitulate</b>	Cease to resist an opponent or an unwelcome demand; yield. <i>The patriots had to <b>capitulate</b> to the enemy forces.</i>
<b>cave in</b>	Explore natural caves.
<b>cede</b>	Give over; surrender or relinquish to the physical control of another. <i>In 1874 the islands were <b>ceded</b> to Britain.</i>
<b>confess</b>	Confess to God in the presence of a priest as in the Catholic faith. <i>She <b>confessed</b> that she had taken the money.</i>
<b>deliver up</b>	Carry out or perform.
<b>give in</b>	Move in order to make room for someone for something.
<b>give up</b>	Convey or reveal information.
<b>give up the struggle</b>	Execute and deliver.
<b>grant</b>	Be willing to concede. <i><b>Grant</b> land.</i>
<b>hand over</b>	Guide or conduct or usher somewhere.
<b>lay down one's arms</b>	Put into a certain place or abstract location.
<b><u>own</u></b>	Have something as one's own possess. <i>Yeah right she totally <b>owned</b> you man.</i>
<b>part with</b>	Discontinue an association or relation; go different ways.
<b>profess</b>	Practice as a profession teach or claim to be knowledgeable about. <i>I don't <b>profess</b> to be an expert.</i>
<b>raise the white flag</b>	Cause to puff up with a leaven.
<b>recognize</b>	Show approval or appreciation of. <i>The Regents officially <b>recognized</b> the new educational institution.</i>

<b>relinquish</b>	Do without or cease to hold or adhere to. <i>I am <b>relinquishing</b> my bedroom to the long term house guest.</i>
<b>show the white flag</b>	Give an exhibition of to an interested audience.
<u><b>submit</b></u>	Yield to another's wish or opinion. <i>The original settlers were forced to <b>submit</b> to Bulgarian rule.</i>
<u><b>surrender</b></u>	(in sport) lose (a point, game, or advantage) to an opponent. <i>The last Taleban fighters finally <b>surrendered</b>.</i>
<b>turn over</b>	To break and turn over earth especially with a plow.
<b>yield</b>	Give in, as to influence or pressure. <i>They might <b>yield</b> up their secrets.</i>

- *They conceded the match to their opponents.*
- *He took an early lead which he never conceded.*
- *In 475 the emperor conceded the Auvergne to Euric.*
- *I had to concede that I'd overreacted.*
- *'All right then,' she conceded.*
- *Reluctantly, Ellen conceded defeat.*
- *The candidate conceded after enough votes had come in to show that he would lose.*
- *They have conceded only one goal in seven matches.*

<b>accepting</b>	Tolerating without protest. <i>Always more <b>accepting</b> of coaching suggestion than her teammates.</i>
<b>acknowledge</b>	Declare to be true or admit the existence or reality or truth of. <i>The program committee <b>acknowledged</b> the submission of the authors of the paper.</i>
<u><b>admissible</b></u>	Deserving to be admitted. <b>Admissible</b> evidence.
<u><b>admit</b></u>	Admit into a group or community. <i>Old age pensioners are <b>admitted</b> free to the museum.</i>

<b>admittedly</b>	As acknowledged. <i><b>Admittedly</b> the salary was not wonderful.</i>
<b>agree</b>	Be in accord be in agreement. <i>Everybody <b>agrees</b> that jobs will go.</i>
<b>agreed</b>	United by being of the same opinion. <i><b>Agreed</b> in their distrust of authority.</i>
<b>allow</b>	Allow the presence of or allow an activity without opposing or prohibiting. <i>Political advertising on television is not <b>allowed</b>.</i>
<b>allowable</b>	(of an amount of money) able to be earned or received free of tax. <i>The loan deal has been extended to the maximum <b>allowable</b> three months.</i>
<b>apologize</b>	Defend, explain, clear away, or make excuses for by reasoning. <i>I <b>apologized</b> for being late.</i>
<b>appreciatively</b>	With appreciation; in a grateful manner. <i>He accepted my offer <b>appreciatively</b>.</i>
<b>approbation</b>	Official recognition or approval. <i>A term of <b>approbation</b>.</i>
<b>approval</b>	The formal act of approving. <i>Words of <b>approval</b> seldom passed his lips.</i>
<b>approve</b>	Prove; show. <i>He <b>approved</b> himself ripe for military command.</i>
<b>authorization</b>	Official permission or approval. <i>Deputies are given <b>authorization</b> to make arrests.</i>
<b>concession</b>	A preferential allowance or rate given by an organization. <i>They won all the <b>concessions</b> they asked for.</i>
<b>confess</b>	Confess to God in the presence of a priest as in the Catholic faith. <i>150 people <b>confessed</b> faith in Christ.</i>
<b>grant</b>	The action of granting something. <i>A <b>grant</b> of probate.</i>
<b>gratefully</b>	In a thankful manner; with thanks. <i>Your financial support is <b>gratefully</b> acknowledged.</i>
<b>let</b>	Actively cause something to happen. <i>I had to wake up my flatmate Veronica to <b>let</b> me in.</i>
<b>necessarily</b>	As a highly likely consequence. <i>It is <b>necessarily</b> so.</i>
<b>ok</b>	An expression of agreement normally occurring at the beginning of a sentence. <i>Things are <b>okay</b>.</i>

<b>permissible</b>	Permitted; allowed. <i>A <b>permissible</b> tax deduction.</i>
<b>permission</b>	The action of officially allowing someone to do a particular thing; consent or authorization. <i>He received <b>permission</b> to go to Brussels.</i>
<b><u>permit</u></b>	Allow the presence of or allow (an activity) without opposing or prohibiting. <i>Weather <b>permitting</b> guests can dine outside on the veranda.</i>
<b>realization</b>	Something that is made real or concrete. <i>Verbal sequences were produced using segmental <b>realization</b>.</i>
<b>receive</b>	Receive a specified treatment abstract. <i>The community warmly <b>received</b> the refugees.</i>
<b>resignedly</b>	In a hopeless resigned manner.
<b><u>thankfully</u></b>	In a thankful manner. <i>He accepted <b>thankfully</b> my apologies.</i>
