<u>fantasy</u>	A genre of imaginative fiction involving magic and adventure, especially in a setting other than the real world. <i>It is a misleading fantasy to suggest that the bill can be implemented.</i>
faun	One of a class of lustful rural gods, represented as a man with a goat's horns, ears, legs, and tail.
idea	Melodic subject of a musical composition. <i>The accompanist picked up the idea and elaborated it.</i>
ideational	Being of the nature of a notion or concept. <i>Policy has been shaped by both material and ideational factors.</i>
<u>image</u>	Language used in a figurative or nonliteral sense. <i>He provided America with an image of the good father.</i>
<u>imagery</u>	The ability to form mental images of things or events. <i>Tennyson uses imagery to create a lyrical emotion.</i>
imaginable	Capable of being imagined. <i>The most spectacular views imaginable.</i>
<u>imagination</u>	The part of the mind that imagines things. <i>He could still hear her in his imagination.</i>

<u>imagine</u>	Form a mental image or concept of. <i>I couldn't imagine what she expected to tell them.</i>
improbably	Not easy to believe. <i>Everyone in the film is improbably gorgeous.</i>
picture	Represent in a photograph or picture. <i>The movie took five honours including best picture.</i>
presuppose	Require as a necessary antecedent or precondition. <i>Your argument presupposes that it does not matter who is in power.</i>
<u>supposedly</u>	Believed or reputed to be the case. <i>There were rumours of a rift between him and his colleagues supposedly because they were jealous of his relationship with the Duchess.</i>
<u>surreal</u>	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>A surreal mix of fact and fantasy.</i>
<u>virtually</u>	Nearly; almost. <i>The disease destroyed virtually all the vineyards in Orange County.</i>
<u>visionary</u>	A person with unusual powers of foresight. <i>A visionary leader.</i>
<u>visualize</u>	View the outline of by means of an X-ray. <i>The DNA was visualized by staining with ethidium bromide.</i>
