gestate	Be pregnant with. <i>Rabbits gestate for approximately twenty eight days.</i>

see

Go to see a place as for entertainment.

*I must **see** your passport before you can enter the country.*

think

Decide by pondering, reasoning, or reflecting.

***Think** thin.*

think of

Bring into a given condition by mental preoccupation.

think up

Bring into a given condition by mental preoccupation.

visualize

View the outline of by means of an X-ray.

*With this machine ultrasound can be **visualized**.*

conception	Ability to imagine; understanding. <i>An unfertilized egg before conception.</i>

imaginable	Possible to be thought of or believed. <i>The most spectacular views imaginable.</i>
<u>imagination</u>	The faculty or action of forming new ideas, or images or concepts of external objects not present to the senses. <i>She d never been blessed with a vivid imagination.</i>
<u>imagine</u>	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>I couldn t imagine what she expected to tell them.</i>
innovation	A creation (a new device or process) resulting from study and experimentation. <i>Technological innovations designed to save energy.</i>
<u>invention</u>	Used as a title for a short piece of music. <i>Medieval inventions included spectacles for reading and the spinning wheel.</i>
<u>inventive</u>	Marked by independence and creativity in thought or action- Lewis Mumford. <i>Had an inventive turn of mind.</i>
mindset	The established set of attitudes held by someone. <i>The region seems stuck in a medieval mindset.</i>
notice	Notice or perceive. <i>The play received good notices.</i>
<u>originality</u>	The ability to think independently and creatively. <i>She s a writer of great originality.</i>
sight	Adjust the sight of a firearm or optical instrument. <i>Tell me when you sight London Bridge.</i>
thinking	The process of using your mind to consider something carefully. <i>The selectors have some thinking to do before the match.</i>
understand	Be understanding of. <i>He couldn t understand why we burst out laughing.</i>
<u>visual</u>	Visible- Shakespeare. <i>The music should fit the visuals.</i>
visualization	A chart or other image that is created as a visual representation of an object, situation, or set of information. <i>Visualization is a helpful technique for relieving stress.</i>
