- *Joint action, especially in the committing of a crime.*
- *Relating to or denoting the performance of music written for opera, ballet, or theatre on its own without the accompanying dramatic action.*
- *Agreement or harmony.*

### accordance

Conformity or agreement.  
*The **accordance** to Canada of rights of access.*

### alliance

The act of forming an alliance or confederation.  
*Divisions within the **alliance**.*

### association

The process of bringing ideas or events together in memory or imagination.  
*A bog **association** containing ericaceous plants.*

### coalition

The state of being combined into one body.  
*They had a taste of government in **coalition** with the Social Democrats.*

### collaboration

Something produced in collaboration with someone.  
*His recent opera was a **collaboration** with Lessing.*

<b><u>concord</u></b>	The first battle of the American Revolution (April 19, 1775). <i>A pact of peace and <b>concord</b>.</i>
<b>concurrency</b>	The temporal property of two things happening at the same time. <i>The incidental <b>concurrency</b> of two separate tumours.</i>
<b><u>consensus</u></b>	Agreement in the judgment or opinion reached by a group as a whole. <i>The lack of <b>consensus</b> reflected differences in theoretical positions.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	The practice of cooperating. <i>They worked in close <b>cooperation</b> with the British Tourist Authority.</i>
<b><u>harmony</u></b>	An agreeable sound property. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b><u>league</u></b>	The contest for the championship of a league. <i>The two men were not in the same <b>league</b>.</i>
<b>musical entertainment</b>	A play or film whose action and dialogue is interspersed with singing and dancing.
<b>musical performance</b>	A play or film whose action and dialogue is interspersed with singing and dancing.
<b>partnership</b>	A business or firm owned and run by two or more partners. <i>Effective language learning is a <b>partnership</b> between school teacher and student.</i>
<b>presentation</b>	A visual representation of something. <i>The <b>presentation</b> of foods is designed to stimulate your appetite.</i>
<b>production</b>	The provision of something for consideration, inspection, or use. <i>Non intensive methods of food <b>production</b>.</i>
<b>rapprochement</b>	A close and harmonious relationship in which the people or groups concerned understand each other's feelings or ideas and communicate well. <i>There was little <b>rapprochement</b> between them.</i>
<b>show</b>	An opportunity for doing something; a chance. <i>Now don't make a <b>show</b> of yourself in front of him.</i>
<b><u>sympathy</u></b>	The formal expression of pity or sorrow for someone else's misfortune. <i>They had great <b>sympathy</b> for the flood victims.</i>

synergy

The interaction or cooperation of two or more organizations, substances, or other agents to produce a combined effect greater than the sum of their separate effects.

*The **synergy** between artist and record company.*

union

A part of a flag with an emblem symbolizing national union typically occupying the upper corner next to the staff.

*Let C be the **union** of the sets A and B.*

unison

A combination of notes, voices, or instruments at the same pitch or (especially when singing) in octaves.

*Singing in **unison**.*

unity

Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action.

*The slope of each dotted line is less than **unity**.*



## Usage Examples of "Concert" as a noun

## Associations of "Concert" (30 Words)

- aria** A long accompanied song for a solo voice, typically one in an opera or oratorio.
- cantata** A medium-length narrative piece of music for voices with instrumental accompaniment, typically with solos, chorus, and orchestra.
- choir** Sing in a choir.  
*It has tall twin western towers and spires and a long nave and **choir**.*

<b>choral</b>	Composed for or sung by a choir or chorus. <i>A <b>choral</b> work.</i>
<b>chorale</b>	A musical composition consisting of or resembling a harmonized version of a chorale.
<b>chorus</b>	A section of text spoken by the chorus in drama. <i>Good morning we replied in <b>chorus</b>.</i>
<b>concerto</b>	A composition for orchestra and a soloist.
<b>contralto</b>	A part written for a contralto voice. <i>She sang in a high <b>contralto</b>.</i>
<b>ensemble</b>	The coordination between performers executing an ensemble passage. <i>The buildings in the square present a charming provincial <b>ensemble</b>.</i>
<b>hymn</b>	Sing hymns. <i>A Hellenistic <b>hymn</b> to Apollo.</i>
<b>jazz</b>	A style of dance music popular in the 1920s similar to New Orleans jazz but played by large bands. <i>Don't give me any of that <b>jazz</b>.</i>
<b>madrigal</b>	Sing madrigals. <i>The group was <b>madrigaling</b> beautifully.</i>
<b>music</b>	The art or science of composing or performing music. <i>Baroque <b>music</b>.</i>
<b>musical</b>	Fond of or skilled in music. <i>They burst out into rich <b>musical</b> laughter.</i>
<b>oratorio</b>	A large-scale, usually narrative musical work for orchestra and voices, typically on a sacred theme, performed without costume, scenery, or action. Well-known examples include Bach's Christmas Oratorio, Handel's Messiah, and Haydn's The Creation.
<b>orchestra</b>	The part of a theatre where the orchestra plays typically in front of the stage and on a lower level.
<b>orchestration</b>	An arrangement of events that attempts to achieve a maximum effect. <i>Prokofiev's mastery of <b>orchestration</b>.</i>
<b>overture</b>	An orchestral piece at the beginning of an opera, play, etc. <i>Drinks were the <b>overture</b> to dinner.</i>
<b>performance</b>	An act of performing a dramatic role, song, or piece of music. <i>It was a tremendous all round <b>performance</b> by Wigan.</i>
<b>philharmonic</b>	A large orchestra; can perform symphonies. <i>The most <b>philharmonic</b> ear is at times deeply affected by a simple air.</i>
<b>pianist</b>	A person who plays the piano.

<b>piano</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music. <i>The <b>piano</b> passages in the composition.</i>
<b>playing</b>	The act of playing a musical instrument.
<b>rehearsal</b>	A practice or trial performance of a play or other work for later public performance. <i>I ve had a fortnight in <b>rehearsal</b>.</i>
<b>rondo</b>	A musical form that is often the last movement of a sonata.
<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>His <b>singing</b> is rich toned.</i>
<b>sonata</b>	A composition for an instrumental soloist often with a piano accompaniment typically in several movements with one or more in sonata form.
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>A successful musical must have at least three good <b>songs</b>.</i>
<b><u>symphony</u></b>	A long and complex sonata for symphony orchestra. <i>We heard the Vienna <b>symphony</b>.</i>
<b>violin</b>	Bowed stringed instrument that is the highest member of the violin family this instrument has four strings and a hollow body and an unfretted fingerboard and is played with a bow.
