- *Reach a conclusion after a discussion or deliberation.*
- *Say in conclusion.*
- *Come to a close.*

### agree

Be agreeable or suitable.

*White wine doesn't **agree** with me.*

### arrange

Arrange thoughts ideas temporal events.

*Accommodation can be **arranged** if required.*

### **be over**

Form or compose.

### **bring about**

Be sold for a certain price.

### **bring off**

Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.

### **bring to a close**

Take something or somebody with oneself somewhere.

### **bring to an end**

Go or come after and bring or take back.

<b>broker</b>	Act as a broker. <i>Fighting continued despite attempts to <b>broker</b> a ceasefire.</i>
<b><u>cease</u></b>	Put an end to a state or an activity. <i>The hostilities <b>ceased</b> and normal life was resumed.</i>
<b>clinch</b>	Fasten a rope or angling line with a clinch knot. <i>Johnson scored the goals which <b>clinched</b> victory.</i>
<b>close</b>	Change one's body stance so that the forward shoulder and foot are closer to the intended point of impact. <i>The concert <b>closed</b> with a nocturne by Chopin.</i>
<b>come to an end</b>	Come to one's mind; suggest itself.
<b>come to terms on</b>	Extend or reach.
<b>come to the conclusion</b>	Cover a certain distance.
<b>complete</b>	Complete or carry out. <i>Quarry tiles and faded rugs <b>complete</b> the look.</i>
<b>decide</b>	Cause to decide. <i>I've <b>decided</b> to stay on a bit.</i>
<b><u>deduce</u></b>	Conclude by reasoning; in logic. <i>He cannot <b>deduce</b> his descent wholly by heirs male.</i>
<b><u>dissolve</u></b>	Declare void. <i>The recipe says that we should <b>dissolve</b> a cup of sugar in two cups of water.</i>
<b>draw the inference</b>	Thread on or as if on a string.
<b>draw to a close</b>	Give a description of.
<b>effect</b>	Cause (something) to happen; bring about. <i>The prime minister <b>effected</b> many policy changes.</i>
<b>end</b>	Be the end of; be the last or concluding part of. <i>The symphony <b>ends</b> in a pianissimo.</i>
<b><u>engineer</u></b>	Design as an engineer. <i>The men who <b>engineered</b> the tunnel.</i>
<b>establish</b>	Establish the validity of something as by an example, explanation or experiment. <i>The trompe l'oeil illusion <b>establishes</b> depth.</i>
<b><u>finalize</u></b>	Make final; put the last touches on; put into final form. <i>Let's <b>finalize</b> the proposal.</i>
<b>finish</b>	Cause to finish a relationship with somebody. <i>They were straining to <b>finish</b> the job.</i>

<b><u>gather</u></b>	Collect or gather. <i>She paused to <b>gather</b> her breath and leaned against the wall puffing.</i>
<b>hammer out</b>	Beat with or as if with a hammer.
<b><u>infer</u></b>	Draw from specific cases for more general cases. <i>From these facts we can <b>infer</b> that crime has been increasing.</i>
<b><u>judge</u></b>	Judge tentatively or form an estimate of quantities or time. <i>A production can be <b>judged</b> according to the canons of aesthetic criticism.</i>
<b>negotiate</b>	Discuss the terms of an arrangement. <i>They refused to <b>negotiate</b> with the rebels.</i>
<b>pull off</b>	Rein in to keep from winning a race.
<b>reach an agreement on</b>	Reach a goal, e.g.
<b>reach terms on</b>	Move forward or upward in order to touch; also in a metaphorical sense.
<b>reason</b>	Present reasons and arguments. <i>We <b>reasoned</b> that it was cheaper to rent than to buy a house.</i>
<b>reason out</b>	Think logically.
<b>resolve</b>	(of something seen at a distance) turn into a different form when seen more clearly. <i>Alpha zein is often <b>resolved</b> into two major size components.</i>
<b>seal</b>	Affix a seal to. <i><b>Seal</b> the windows.</i>
<b>set the seal on</b>	Set in type.
<b>settle</b>	Give money or property to someone through a deed of settlement or a will. <i>They listened to the soft ticking and creaking as the house <b>settled</b>.</i>
<b>shake hands on</b>	Shake (a body part) to communicate a greeting, feeling, or cognitive state.
<b>stop</b>	Stop from happening or developing. <i>He <b>stopped</b> work for tea.</i>
<b>terminate</b>	Terminate the employment of discharge from an office or position. <i>The bronchioles <b>terminate</b> in a capillary bed.</i>
<b>thrash out</b>	Move data into and out of core rather than performing useful computation.

Fasten or secure with a rope, string, or cord.

**wind up**

To move or cause to move in a sinuous, spiral, or circular course.

**work out**

Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.

<b>finis</b>	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>The market was up at the <b>finis</b>.</i>
<b>finish</b>	Cause to finish a relationship with somebody. <i>The winner is the team with the most points at the <b>finish</b>.</i>
