### **Definitions of "Concluded" as an adjective**

- *Having come or been brought to a conclusion.*



## Synonyms of "Concluded" as an adjective (5 Words)

- all over** Quantifier; used with either mass or count nouns to indicate the whole number or amount of or every one of a class.
- complete** Perfect and complete in every respect having all necessary qualities.  
*The harvesting was **complete**.*
- ended** Having come or been brought to a conclusion.  
*The affair is over **ended** finished.*
- over** Having come or been brought to a conclusion.  
*The affair is **over** ended finished.*
- terminated** (of e.g. a contract or term of office) having come to an end.  
*The abruptly **terminated** interview.*



## Associations of "Concluded" (30 Words)

- agreement** Harmony or accordance in opinion or feeling.  
*The two parties were in **agreement**.*
- completed** Successfully completed or brought to an end.  
*A **completed** forward pass.*
- conclude** Come to a close.  
*The talk **concluded** with slides.*
- conclusion** The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism).  
*In **conclusion** I want to say.*
- conclusive** (of evidence or argument) having or likely to have the effect of proving a case; decisive.  
***Conclusive** proof.*

<b>decide</b>	Cause to decide. <i>This new development finally <b>decided</b> me.</i>
<b>decision</b>	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>A <b>decision</b> unfavorable to the opposition.</i>
<b><u>decisive</u></b>	Forming or having the nature of a turning point or crisis. <i>Cast the <b>decisive</b> vote.</i>
<b>definitive</b>	A definitive postage stamp. <i>Low value British <b>definitives</b> simply have a portrait of the reigning monarch.</i>
<b><u>determination</u></b>	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something; firmness of purpose. <i>Expert <b>determination</b>.</i>
<b>determinative</b>	A determining or causal element or factor. <i>The employer's view is not <b>determinative</b> of the issue.</i>
<b>determine</b>	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>Experience often <b>determines</b> ability.</i>
<b>deterministic</b>	An inevitable consequence of antecedent sufficient causes. <i>A <b>deterministic</b> theory.</i>
<b>done</b>	No longer happening or existing. <i>Therapy was not the <b>done</b> thing then.</i>
<b>end</b>	Put an end to. <i>The <b>end</b> of the year.</i>
<b>ending</b>	The end of a word a suffix or inflectional ending or final morpheme. <i>The student has to choose the right plural <b>endings</b>.</i>
<b><u>exceedingly</u></b>	To an extreme degree. <i>The supply multiplied <b>exceedingly</b>.</i>
<b>finis</b>	The end (printed at the end of a book or shown at the end of a film). <i>The market was up at the <b>finis</b>.</i>
<b>finish</b>	The act of finishing. <i>He surged into a winning lead 200 metres from the <b>finish</b>.</i>
<b>finished</b>	(of a task or activity) brought to an end; completed. <i>A <b>finished</b> violinist.</i>
<b><u>furthermore</u></b>	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument). <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time <b>furthermore</b> their quality is improving.</i>

<b>ineluctable</b>	Unable to be resisted or avoided; inescapable. <i>An <b>ineluctable</b> destiny.</i>
<b>insolvency</b>	The lack of financial resources. <i>The club was facing <b>insolvency</b>.</i>
<b>over</b>	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>The car flipped <b>over</b>.</i>
<b>resolve</b>	Reduce a subject, statement, etc. by mental analysis into (separate elements or a more elementary form). <i>The ability to <b>resolve</b> facts into their legal categories.</i>
<b>result</b>	Something that results. <i>The tower collapsed as a <b>result</b> of safety violations.</i>
<b>settle</b>	End a legal dispute by arriving at a settlement. <i>One day I will <b>settle</b> down and raise a family.</i>
<b>solution</b>	The action of separating or breaking down dissolution. <i>The <b>solution</b> of British supremacy in South Africa.</i>
<b>solve</b>	Find an answer to, explanation for, or means of effectively dealing with (a problem or mystery). <i><b>Solve</b> for <math>x</math>.</i>
<b>termination</b>	The act of ending something. <i>The <b>termination</b> of the agreement.</i>
