Definitions of "Conclusions" as a noun

- *The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism).*
- *A final settlement.*
- *Event whose occurrence ends something.*
- *The act of ending something.*
- *The act of making up your mind about something.*
- *The last section of a communication.*



Synonyms of "Conclusions" as a noun (13 Words)

close	The precinct surrounding a cathedral. <i>They were playing better at the close of the season.</i>
<u>closing</u>	The act of closing something. <i>The ship's rapid rate of closing gave them little time to avoid a collision.</i>
decision	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>Had little trouble in taking a unanimous decision over his opponent.</i>
<u>determination</u>	The controlling or deciding of the nature or outcome of something. <i>The determination of grammatical inflections.</i>
end	Football the person who plays at one end of the line of scrimmage. <i>The church at the end of the road.</i>
ending	The act of ending something. <i>The student has to choose the right plural endings.</i>
finale	The closing section of a musical composition. <i>A fireworks finale.</i>
finis	The end (printed at the end of a book or shown at the end of a film). <i>The market was up at the finis.</i>
finish	The act of finishing. <i>He surged into a winning lead 200 metres from the finish.</i>

last	The end or last moment especially death. <i>He was dead having refused morphia to the last.</i>
ratiocination	The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism).
stopping point	The kind of playing that involves pressing the fingers on the strings of a stringed instrument to control the pitch.
termination	A place where something ends or is complete. <i>For many conditions a large proportion of people say they would not consider a termination.</i>

- *Jump to a conclusion.*
- *The conclusion of the peace treaty.*

Associations of "Conclusions" (30 Words)

coda	The concluding section of a dance, especially of a pas de deux or the finale of a ballet in which the dancers parade before the audience. <i>His new novel is a kind of coda to his previous books.</i>
completion	A successful forward pass in football. <i>Work on the new golf course is nearing completion.</i>
<u>conclude</u>	Arrive at a judgement or opinion by reasoning. <i>What do you conclude from all this.</i>
<u>concluded</u>	Having come or been brought to a conclusion.
concluding	Occurring at or forming an end or termination. <i>His concluding words came as a surprise.</i>
consequent	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>The period of tension and consequent need for military preparedness.</i>
decide	Cause to decide. <i>This business about the letter decided me.</i>
decision	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>I ll make the decision on my own.</i>

<u>decisive</u>	Settling an issue; producing a definite result. <i>He handled the situation in a calm decisive way.</i>
definitive	A definitive postage stamp. <i>Low value British definitives simply have a portrait of the reigning monarch.</i>
<u>determination</u>	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something; firmness of purpose. <i>The determination of grammatical inflections.</i>
determine	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>Experience often determines ability.</i>
deterministic	An inevitable consequence of antecedent sufficient causes. <i>A deterministic theory.</i>
ending	The act of ending something. <i>A nerve ending.</i>
epilogue	A section or speech at the end of a book or play that serves as a comment on or a conclusion to what has happened. <i>The epilogue told what eventually happened to the main characters.</i>
<u>final</u>	A series of games constituting the final stage of a competition. <i>The World Cup finals.</i>
finale	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>A fireworks finale.</i>
finis	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>The market was up at the finish.</i>
finish	The act of finishing. <i>The winner is the team with the most points at the finish.</i>
finishing	The act of finishing. <i>The speaker's finishing was greeted with applause.</i>
ineluctable	Impossible to avoid or evade. <i>The ineluctable facts of history.</i>
<u>inevitable</u>	Invariably occurring or appearing. <i>By the morning he had accepted the inevitable.</i>
judgement	An opinion formed by judging something. <i>An error of judgement.</i>
outcome	Something that results. <i>It is the outcome of the vote that counts.</i>

- peroration** The concluding part of a speech, typically intended to inspire enthusiasm in the audience.
*He summarized his main points in his **peroration**.*
- resolve** Bring to an end; settle conclusively.
*Dissonant notes **resolve** conventionally by rising or falling to form part of a new chord.*
- result** Produce as a result or residue.
*The tower collapsed as a **result** of safety violations.*
- termination** An assassination.
*The **termination** of the agreement.*
- unavoidable** Impossible to avoid or evade.
*An **unavoidable** accident.*
- wrought** (of metals) beaten out or shaped by hammering.
*Well **wrought** pop music.*
