<b>decision</b>	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>Had little trouble in taking a unanimous <b>decision</b> over his opponent.</i>
<b><u>determination</u></b>	The controlling or deciding of the nature or outcome of something. <i>The <b>determination</b> of grammatical inflections.</i>
<b>end</b>	Football the person who plays at one end of the line of scrimmage. <i>The church at the <b>end</b> of the road.</i>
<b>ending</b>	The act of ending something. <i>The student has to choose the right plural <b>endings</b>.</i>
<b>finale</b>	The closing section of a musical composition. <i>A fireworks <b>finale</b>.</i>
<b>finis</b>	The end (printed at the end of a book or shown at the end of a film). <i>The market was up at the <b>finis</b>.</i>
<b>finish</b>	The act of finishing. <i>He surged into a winning lead 200 metres from the <b>finish</b>.</i>

<b>last</b>	The end or last moment especially death. <i>He was dead having refused morphia to the <b>last</b>.</i>
<b>ratiocination</b>	The proposition arrived at by logical reasoning (such as the proposition that must follow from the major and minor premises of a syllogism).
<b>stopping point</b>	The kind of playing that involves pressing the fingers on the strings of a stringed instrument to control the pitch.
<b>termination</b>	A place where something ends or is complete. <i>For many conditions a large proportion of people say they would not consider a <b>termination</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Conclusions" (30 Words)

<b>coda</b>	The concluding section of a dance, especially of a pas de deux or the finale of a ballet in which the dancers parade before the audience. <i>His new novel is a kind of <b>coda</b> to his previous books.</i>
<b>completion</b>	A successful forward pass in football. <i>Work on the new golf course is nearing <b>completion</b>.</i>
<b><u>conclude</u></b>	Arrive at a judgement or opinion by reasoning. <i>What do you <b>conclude</b> from all this.</i>
<b><u>concluded</u></b>	Having come or been brought to a conclusion.
<b>concluding</b>	Occurring at or forming an end or termination. <i>His <b>concluding</b> words came as a surprise.</i>
<b>consequent</b>	Following or accompanying as a consequence. <i>The period of tension and <b>consequent</b> need for military preparedness.</i>
<b>decide</b>	Cause to decide. <i>This business about the letter <b>decided</b> me.</i>
<b>decision</b>	The ability or tendency to make decisions quickly decisiveness. <i>I ll make the <b>decision</b> on my own.</i>

<b><u>decisive</u></b>	Settling an issue; producing a definite result. <i>He handled the situation in a calm <b>decisive</b> way.</i>
<b>definitive</b>	A definitive postage stamp. <i>Low value British <b>definitives</b> simply have a portrait of the reigning monarch.</i>
<b><u>determination</u></b>	The quality of being determined to do or achieve something; firmness of purpose. <i>The <b>determination</b> of grammatical inflections.</i>
<b>determine</b>	Find out learn or determine with certainty usually by making an inquiry or other effort. <i>Experience often <b>determines</b> ability.</i>
<b>deterministic</b>	An inevitable consequence of antecedent sufficient causes. <i>A <b>deterministic</b> theory.</i>
<b>ending</b>	The act of ending something. <i>A nerve <b>ending</b>.</i>
<b>epilogue</b>	A section or speech at the end of a book or play that serves as a comment on or a conclusion to what has happened. <i>The <b>epilogue</b> told what eventually happened to the main characters.</i>
<b><u>final</u></b>	A series of games constituting the final stage of a competition. <i>The World Cup <b>finals</b>.</i>
<b>finale</b>	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>A fireworks <b>finale</b>.</i>
<b>finis</b>	The temporal end; the concluding time. <i>The market was up at the <b>finish</b>.</i>
<b>finish</b>	The act of finishing. <i>The winner is the team with the most points at the <b>finish</b>.</i>
<b>finishing</b>	The act of finishing. <i>The speaker's <b>finishing</b> was greeted with applause.</i>
<b>ineluctable</b>	Impossible to avoid or evade. <i>The <b>ineluctable</b> facts of history.</i>
<b><u>inevitable</u></b>	Invariably occurring or appearing. <i>By the morning he had accepted the <b>inevitable</b>.</i>
<b>judgement</b>	An opinion formed by judging something. <i>An error of <b>judgement</b>.</i>
<b>outcome</b>	Something that results. <i>It is the <b>outcome</b> of the vote that counts.</i>

- peroration** The concluding part of a speech, typically intended to inspire enthusiasm in the audience.  
*He summarized his main points in his **peroration**.*
- resolve** Bring to an end; settle conclusively.  
*Dissonant notes **resolve** conventionally by rising or falling to form part of a new chord.*
- result** Produce as a result or residue.  
*The tower collapsed as a **result** of safety violations.*
- termination** An assassination.  
*The **termination** of the agreement.*
- unavoidable** Impossible to avoid or evade.  
*An **unavoidable** accident.*
- wrought** (of metals) beaten out or shaped by hammering.  
*Well **wrought** pop music.*
