### Definitions of "Concoction" as a noun

- *A mixture of various ingredients or elements.*
- *An elaborate story, especially a fabricated one.*
- *The act of creating something (a medicine or drink or soup etc.) by compounding or mixing a variety of components.*
- *An elaborate or showy garment or hat.*
- *The invention of a scheme or story to suit some purpose.*
- *Any foodstuff made by combining different ingredients.*
- *An occurrence of an unusual mixture.*



## Synonyms of "Concoction" as a noun (16 Words)

<b>blend</b>	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>Nearly all Scotch whiskies are <b>blends</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>brew</u></a>	Drink made by steeping and boiling and fermenting rather than distilling. <i>She took a sip of the hot reviving <b>brew</b>.</i>
<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters used to open a combination lock. <i>Woollen <b>combinations</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>composite</u></a>	A composite constructional material. <i>The English legal system is a <b>composite</b> of legislation and judicial precedent.</i>
<a href="#"><u>compound</u></a>	An enclosure of residences and other building (especially in the Orient). <i>A <b>compound</b> of hydrogen and oxygen.</i>
<b>confection</b>	An elaborately constructed thing, especially a frivolous one. <i>A fruit <b>confection</b>.</i>

<b>contrivance</b>	The use of skill to create or bring about something, especially with a consequent effect of artificiality. <i>His testimony was just a <b>contrivance</b> to throw us off the track.</i>
<b>creation</b>	An artifact that has been brought into existence by someone. <i>She treats fictional <b>creations</b> as if they were real people.</i>
<b>fabrication</b>	The action or process of manufacturing or inventing something. <i>The story was a complete <b>fabrication</b>.</i>
<b>falsification</b>	The act of determining that something is false. <i>An investigation into fraud and the <b>falsification</b> of records.</i>
<b>intermixture</b>	The act of mixing together. <i>Delicate shadings result from the <b>intermixture</b> of dyes.</i>
<a href="#"><u>invention</u></a>	Something, typically a process or device, that has been invented. <i>You know my story is an <b>invention</b>.</i>
<b>mix</b>	The proportion of different people or other constituents that make up a mixture. <i>Arriving at the correct <b>mix</b> of full time to part time staff.</i>
<a href="#"><u>mixture</u></a>	An event that combines things in a mixture. <i>The old town is a <b>mixture</b> of narrow medieval streets and 18th century architecture.</i>
<b>piece of fiction</b>	A musical work that has been created.
<b>preparation</b>	A substance prepared according to a formula. <i>The project is in <b>preparation</b>.</i>
