| ensuing | Occurring afterwards or as a result. <i>She lost track of one of her children during the ensuing chaos.</i> |
| hereafter | In a future life or state. <i>He'd promised that Rachel would be the idol of his heart hereafter.</i> |
| later | Comparative of the adverb `late. <i>Later medical science could have saved the child.</i> |
| next | The next person or thing. <i>The next chapter.</i> |

| period | A set of elements occupying a horizontal row in the periodic table. <i>An attractive and beautifully modernized period house.</i> |
| postmodern | Of or relating to postmodernism. <i>Postmodern deconstructionist theories.</i> |
| recent | The Holocene epoch. <i>Recent graduates.</i> |
| recently | At a recent time; not long ago. <i>He was in Paris recently.</i> |
| sequent | In regular succession without gaps. <i>Some of the inferences are not sequent on the premises.</i> |
| <u>shortly</u> | At a short distance. <i>He said shortly that he didn't like it.</i> |
| <u>simultaneous</u> | Occurring, operating, or done at the same time. <i>Simultaneous translation.</i> |
| <u>soon</u> | In the near future. <i>I'd just as soon Tim did it.</i> |
| <u>subsequent</u> | Following in time or order. <i>The theory was developed subsequent to the earthquake of 1906.</i> |
| subsequently | Happening at a time subsequent to a reference time. <i>He apologized subsequently.</i> |
| successor | A thing or person that immediately replaces something or someone. <i>He was President Lincoln's successor.</i> |
| <u>synchronize</u> | Operate simultaneously. <i>You can synchronize your calendar with your GPS device and be alerted when you need to leave for an appointment.</i> |
| synchronous | Occurring or existing at the same time or having the same period or phase. <i>Recovery was synchronous with therapy.</i> |
| time | Assign a time for an activity or event. <i>He called four times.</i> |
| timing | The time when something happens. <i>The introduction of new signal timings.</i> |
| <u>year</u> | A period similar to a year used for reckoning time according to other calendars. <i>A school year.</i> |
