<b>entente</b>	The understanding between Britain and France reached in 1904, forming the basis of Anglo-French cooperation in the First World War. <i>The unsuccessful scheme to lure Greece into the war on the side of the <b>entente</b>.</i>
<a href="#">harmony</a>	The structure of music with respect to the composition and progression of chords. <i>Delightful cities where old and new blend in <b>harmony</b>.</i>
<b>lexington</b>	The first battle of the American Revolution (April 19, 1775).

<b>oneness</b>	The state of being in harmony with someone or something. <i>The <b>oneness</b> of all suffering people.</i>
<b><u>pact</u></b>	A formal agreement between individuals or parties. <i>The country negotiated a trade <b>pact</b> with the US.</i>
<b>protocol</b>	The accepted or established code of procedure or behaviour in any group, organization, or situation. <i><b>Protocol</b> forbids the prince from making any public statement in his defence.</i>
<b>settlement</b>	The process of establishing a settlement or settlements. <i>One of the oldest Viking <b>settlements</b> in western Europe.</i>
<b><u>treaty</u></b>	A formally concluded and ratified agreement between states. <i>The two Presidents signed a ten year <b>treaty</b> of solidarity.</i>
<b>unanimity</b>	Agreement by all people involved; consensus. <i>There is almost complete <b>unanimity</b> on this issue.</i>
<b><u>unison</u></b>	Two or more sounds or tones at the same pitch or in octaves. <i>The flutes play in <b>unison</b> with the violas.</i>
<b><u>unity</u></b>	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. <i>Ways of preserving family <b>unity</b>.</i>
