## Associations of "Condolences" (30 Words)

<b>affliction</b>	A cause of pain or harm. <i>A crippling <b>affliction</b> of the nervous system.</i>
<b>compassionate</b>	Share the suffering of. <i>I allowed him to go home on <b>compassionate</b> grounds.</i>
<b>deplorable</b>	Bad; unfortunate. <i>My finances were in a <b>deplorable</b> state.</i>
<b>despair</b>	A state in which all hope is lost or absent. <i>One harsh word would send her into the depths of <b>despair</b>.</i>
<b><u>desperately</u></b>	Used to emphasize the extreme degree of something. <i>The soil <b>desperately</b> needed potash.</i>
<b>dirge</b>	A mournful song, piece of music, or sound. <i>The wind howled <b>dirges</b> around the chimney.</i>

<b><u>disappointment</u></b>	A person or thing that causes disappointment. <i>To her <b>disappointment</b> there was no chance to talk privately with Luke.</i>
<b>distress</b>	Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship. <i>Her fingers flew to her throat in <b>distress</b>.</i>
<b>express</b>	By express. <i>Many of the laboratory animals <b>express</b> the trait.</i>
<b><u>grief</u></b>	Intense sorrow, especially caused by someone's death. <i>Her death was a great <b>grief</b> to John.</i>
<b>grieve</b>	Cause great distress to (someone). <i>It <b>grieves</b> me to think of you in that house alone.</i>
<b>heaviness</b>	A state of being greater in amount, force, or intensity than usual. <i>The total <b>heaviness</b> of much of this record.</i>
<b>lamentable</b>	(of an event, action, or attitude) unfortunate; regrettable. <i>Her open prejudice showed <b>lamentable</b> immaturity.</i>
<b>lamentation</b>	The passionate expression of grief or sorrow; weeping. <i>Scenes of <b>lamentation</b>.</i>
<b><u>melancholy</u></b>	A humor that was once believed to be secreted by the kidneys or spleen and to cause sadness and melancholy. <i>We acquainted him with the <b>melancholy</b> truth.</i>
<b><u>pathetic</u></b>	Arousing pity, especially through vulnerability or sadness. <i>She looked so <b>pathetic</b> that I bent down to comfort her.</i>
<b><u>pathos</u></b>	A feeling of sympathy and sorrow for the misfortunes of others. <i>The actor injects his customary humour and <b>pathos</b> into the role.</i>
<b><u>pitiful</u></b>	Inspiring mixed contempt and pity. <i>A <b>pitiful</b> attempt to impress her.</i>
<b><u>pity</u></b>	An unfortunate development. <i>Her voice was full of <b>pity</b>.</i>
<b>regretful</b>	Feeling or expressing regret or sorrow or a sense of loss over something done or undone. <i>He sounded <b>regretful</b> but pointed out that he had committed himself.</i>
<b>regrettable</b>	(of conduct or an event) giving rise to regret; undesirable; unwelcome. <i>The loss of this number of jobs is <b>regrettable</b>.</i>
<b>rue</b>	Sadness associated with some wrong done or some disappointment. <i>She might live to <b>rue</b> this impetuous decision.</i>
<b>ruth</b>	United States professional baseball player famous for hitting home runs (1895-1948).

<b>sadness</b>	The quality of excessive mournfulness and uncheerfulness. <i>A source of great <b>sadness</b>.</i>
<b>sorrow</b>	An event or circumstance that causes sorrow. <i>It was a great <b>sorrow</b> to her when they separated.</i>
<b>sorry</b>	Feeling sad or distressed through sympathy with someone else's misfortune. <i>He looks a <b>sorry</b> sight with his broken jaw.</i>
<b>sympathy</b>	The state or fact of responding in a way similar or corresponding to an action elsewhere. <i>The two of them were in close <b>sympathy</b>.</i>
<b>tribulation</b>	A state of great trouble or suffering. <i>His time of <b>tribulation</b> was just beginning.</i>
<b>widow</b>	A widowbird. <i>The war <b>widowed</b> many women in the former Yugoslavia.</i>
<b>woe</b>	Intense mournfulness. <i>To add to his <b>woes</b> customers have been spending less.</i>
