<b>allegation</b>	Statements affirming or denying certain matters of fact that you are prepared to prove. <i>An <b>allegation</b> of malpractice.</i>
<b>announcement</b>	The action of making an announcement. <i>A loudspeaker <b>announcement</b> echoed across the field.</i>
<b>assertion</b>	A confident and forceful statement of fact or belief. <i>The <b>assertion</b> of his legal rights.</i>
<b>avowal</b>	A statement asserting the existence or the truth of something.
<b>claim</b>	An established or recognized right. <i>A strong legal <b>claim</b> to the property.</i>
<u><b>declaration</b></u>	A formal public statement. <i>His <b>declaration</b> of innocence.</i>
<u><b>disclosure</b></u>	The speech act of making something evident. <i>A judge ordered the <b>disclosure</b> of the government documents.</i>
<b>divulgence</b>	The act of disclosing something that was secret or private. <i>Any <b>divulgence</b> of information about undercover activities could jeopardize police operations.</i>
<b>exposure</b>	Experience of something. <i>He used the wrong <b>exposure</b>.</i>
<b>news</b>	A broadcast or published report of news. <i>He was back in the <b>news</b> again.</i>
<u><b>proclamation</b></u>	A public or official announcement dealing with a matter of great importance. <i>The government restricted the use of water by <b>proclamation</b>.</i>
<u><b>profession</b></u>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. <i>A <b>profession</b> of faith in Jesus Christ.</i>
<b>protestation</b>	A formal and solemn declaration of objection. <i>Her <b>protestations</b> of innocence were in vain.</i>
<b>report</b>	An employee who reports to another employee. <i>Whatever things are lovely and of good <b>report</b>.</i>
<u><b>revelation</b></u>	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i><b>Revelations</b> about his personal life.</i>

**statement**

A document setting out items of debit and credit between a bank or other organization and a customer.

*The hope is that they will fill the stands and terraces to make a **statement** about the importance of this club.*

**VOW**

A solemn pledge (to oneself or to another or to a deity) to do something or to behave in a certain manner.

*The **vows** of celibacy.*

- apologize** Acknowledge faults or shortcomings or failing.

- atonement** The action of making amends for a wrong or injury.  
*An annual ceremony of confession and **atonement** for sin.*
- commit** Refer a parliamentary or legislative bill to a committee.

<b>compunction</b>	A feeling of guilt or moral scruple that prevents or follows the doing of something bad. <i>They used their tanks without <b>compunction</b>.</i>
<b>contrite</b>	Feeling or expressing remorse at the recognition that one has done wrong. <i>A <b>contrite</b> tone.</i>
<b>contrition</b>	(in the Roman Catholic Church) the repentance of past sins during or after confession. <i>Prayers of <b>contrition</b>.</i>
<b>expiate</b>	Make amends for. <i>Their sins must be <b>expiated</b> by sacrifice.</i>
<b>forgive</b>	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>I <b>forgive</b> you your debt.</i>
<b>guilty</b>	Responsible for or chargeable with a reprehensible act. <i>A <b>guilty</b> secret.</i>
<b>indiscretion</b>	Behaviour or speech that is indiscreet or displays a lack of good judgement. <i>Sexual <b>indiscretions</b>.</i>
<b><u>misdeed</u></b>	A wicked or illegal act. <i>His past <b>misdeeds</b> were forgiven.</i>
<b>penance</b>	Impose a penance on. <i>The Bishop <b>penanced</b> him severely for his conduct.</i>
<b>penitence</b>	Remorse for your past conduct. <i>A public display of <b>penitence</b>.</i>
<b>penitent</b>	(Roman Catholic Church) a person who repents for wrongdoing (a Roman Catholic may be admitted to penance under the direction of a confessor). <i>A <b>penitent</b> expression.</i>
<b>penitential</b>	Relating to or expressing penitence or penance. <i>Wrote a <b>penitential</b> letter apologizing for her hasty words.</i>
<b>regret</b>	Express with regret. <i>We <b>regret</b> that no tickets may be exchanged.</i>
<b>regretful</b>	Feeling or showing regret. <i>Felt <b>regretful</b> over his vanished youth.</i>
<b><u>remorse</u></b>	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed). <i>They were filled with <b>remorse</b> and shame.</i>
<b>remorseful</b>	Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. <i>The defendant was <b>remorseful</b> for what he had done.</i>
<b>repent</b>	Feel or express sincere regret or remorse about one's wrongdoing or sin. <i>He <b>repented</b> of his action.</i>

<b><u>repentance</u></b>	Remorse for your past conduct. <i>Each person who turns to God in genuine <b>repentance</b> and faith will be saved.</i>
<b>repentant</b>	Expressing or feeling sincere regret and remorse; remorseful. <i>He is truly <b>repentant</b> for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>
<b>rue</b>	European strong-scented perennial herb with grey-green bitter-tasting leaves; an irritant similar to poison ivy. <i>She might live to <b>rue</b> this impetuous decision.</i>
<b><u>rueful</u></b>	Expressing sorrow or regret, especially in a wry or humorous way. <i>She gave a <b>rueful</b> grin.</i>
<b>scruple</b>	Raise scruples. <i>She doesn't <b>scruple</b> to ask her parents for money.</i>
<b><u>sin</u></b>	Commit a sin violate a law of God or a moral law. <i>Lord we have <b>sinned</b> against you.</i>
<b><u>sinner</u></b>	A person who sins (without repenting). <i>God forgives repentant <b>sinner</b>s.</i>
<b><u>torture</u></b>	Subject to torture. <i>Most of the victims had been brutally <b>tortured</b>.</i>
