- A public declaration of your faith.

declaration	A formal public statement. His <b>declaration</b> of innocence.
<u>disclosure</u>	The speech act of making something evident. A judge ordered the <b>disclosure</b> of the government documents.
divulgence	The act of disclosing something that was secret or private. Any <b>divulgence</b> of information about undercover activities could jeopardize police operations.
exposure	Experience of something. <i>He used the wrong <b>exposure</b></i> .
news	A broadcast or published report of news. He was back in the <b>news</b> again.
proclamation	A public or official announcement dealing with a matter of great importance. The government restricted the use of water by <b>proclamation</b> .
<u>profession</u>	A body of people engaged in a particular profession. A <b>profession</b> of faith in Jesus Christ.
protestation	A formal and solemn declaration of objection. <i>Her <b>protestation</b>s of innocence were in vain.</i>
report	An employee who reports to another employee. Whatsoever things are lovely and of good <b>report</b> .
<u>revelation</u>	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i>Revelations about his personal life.</i>



statement

A document setting out items of debit and credit between a bank or other organization and a customer. The hope is that they will fill the stands and terraces to make a **statement** about the importance of this club.

**<u>vow</u>** 

A solemn pledge (to oneself or to another or to a deity) to do something or to behave in a certain manner. *The vows of celibacy.*

# Associations of "Confession" (30 Words)

apologetic	Constituting a formal defence or justification of a theory or doctrine. <i>An</i> <b>apologetic</b> manner.
apologize	Acknowledge faults or shortcomings or failing. I <b>apologize</b> d for being late.
<u>atone</u>	Make amends or reparation. A human sacrifice to <b>atone</b> for the sin.
atonement	The action of making amends for a wrong or injury. An annual ceremony of confession and <b>atonement</b> for sin.
<u>commit</u>	Refer a parliamentary or legislative bill to a committee. They were reluctant to <b>commit</b> themselves to an opinion.



compunction	A feeling of guilt or moral scruple that prevents or follows the doing of something bad. They used their tanks without <b>compunction</b> .
contrite	Feeling or expressing remorse at the recognition that one has done wrong. A <b>contrite</b> tone.
contrition	(in the Roman Catholic Church) the repentance of past sins during or after confession. <i>Prayers of contrition</i> .
expiate	Make amends for. Their sins must be <b>expiate</b> d by sacrifice.
forgive	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. I <b>forgive</b> you your debt.
guilty	Responsible for or chargeable with a reprehensible act. A <b>guilty</b> secret.
indiscretion	Behaviour or speech that is indiscreet or displays a lack of good judgement. <i>Sexual indiscretions.</i>
<u>misdeed</u>	A wicked or illegal act. His past <b>misdeed</b> s were forgiven.
penance	Impose a penance on. The Bishop <b>penance</b> d him severely for his conduct.
penitence	Remorse for your past conduct. A public display of <b>penitence</b> .
penitent	(Roman Catholic Church) a person who repents for wrongdoing (a Roman Catholic may be admitted to penance under the direction of a confessor. <i>A penitent</i> expression.
penitential	Relating to or expressing penitence or penance. Wrote a <b>penitential</b> letter apologizing for her hasty words.
regret	Express with regret. We <b>regret</b> that no tickets may be exchanged.
regretful	Feeling or showing regret. Felt <b>regretful</b> over his vanished youth.
<u>remorse</u>	A feeling of deep regret (usually for some misdeed. They were filled with <b>remorse</b> and shame.
remorseful	Feeling or expressing pain or sorrow for sins or offenses. The defendant was <b>remorseful</b> for what he had done.
repent	Feel or express sincere regret or remorse about one's wrongdoing or sin. <i>He</i> <b>repent</b> ed of his action.



<u>repentance</u>	Remorse for your past conduct. Each person who turns to God in genuine <b>repentance</b> and faith will be saved.
repentant	Expressing or feeling sincere regret and remorse; remorseful. <i>He is truly <b>repentant</b> for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>
rue	European strong-scented perennial herb with grey-green bitter-tasting leaves; an irritant similar to poison ivy. She might live to <b>rue</b> this impetuous decision.
<u>rueful</u>	Expressing sorrow or regret, especially in a wry or humorous way. She gave a <b>rueful</b> grin.
scruple	Raise scruples. She doesn t <b>scruple</b> to ask her parents for money.
<u>sin</u>	Commit a sin violate a law of God or a moral law. Lord we have <b>sin</b> ned against you.
<u>sinner</u>	A person who sins (without repenting. <i>God forgives repentant <b>sinner</b>s.</i>
<u>torture</u>	Subject to torture. Most of the victims had been brutally <b>torture</b> d.
