Confide as a Verb

Definitions of "Confide" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “confide” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Confer a trust upon.*
- *Trust (someone) enough to tell them of a secret or private matter.*
- *Reveal in private; tell confidentially.*
- *Tell someone about a secret or private matter while trusting them not to repeat it to others.*
- *Entrust something to (someone) in order for them to look after it.*



Synonyms of "Confide" as a verb (30 Words)

announce	Announce publicly or officially. <i>He announced the winners of the spelling bee.</i>
betray	Disappoint, prove undependable to; abandon, forsake. <i>A double agent who betrayed some 400 British and French agents to the Germans.</i>
bring out into the open	Go or come after and bring or take back.
<u>commit</u>	Refer a parliamentary or legislative bill to a committee. <i>I commit my soul to God.</i>
commune with	Receive Communion, in the Catholic church.
confess to	Confess to a punishable or reprehensible deed usually under pressure.

<u>declare</u>	Declare to be. <i>He declared that he needed more money to carry out the task he was charged with.</i>
disclose	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>They disclosed her name to the press.</i>
<u>divulge</u>	Make known to the public information that was previously known only to a few people or that was meant to be kept a secret. <i>I do not want to divulge my plans at the moment.</i>
entrust	Assign the responsibility for doing something to (someone). <i>I ve been entrusted with the task of getting him safely back.</i>
<u>expose</u>	Expose to light of photographic film. <i>The situation exposed a conflict within the government.</i>
<u>impart</u>	Bestow a quality on. <i>Impart a new skill to the students.</i>
intimate	Give to understand.
intrust	Confer a trust upon.
lay bare	Prepare or position for action or operation.
leak	Be leaked. <i>The roof leaks badly.</i>
make known	Act in a certain way so as to acquire.
open one's heart to	Start to operate or function or cause to start operating or functioning.
pass on	Pass over, across, or through.
<u>proclaim</u>	Declare officially or publicly to be. <i>His high intelligent forehead proclaimed a strength of mind that was almost tangible.</i>
report	Cover an event or subject as a journalist or a reporter. <i>The Chairman shall report the Bill to the House.</i>
reveal	Disclose directly or through prophets. <i>The clouds were breaking up to reveal a clear blue sky.</i>
tell	Communicate information to someone in spoken or written words. <i>He was telling on all his former colleague.</i>
tell all to	Narrate or give a detailed account of.
tell one's all to	Inform positively and with certainty and confidence.
trust	Confer a trust upon. <i>We can trust in our government.</i>

uncover

Make visible.

*The newspaper **uncovered** the President's illegal dealings.*

unfold

Reveal or disclose (thoughts or information).

*The white flowers were just starting to **unfold**.*

unmask

Take the mask off.

*The trial **unmasked** him as a complete charlatan.*

vouchsafe

Give or grant (something) to (someone) in a gracious or condescending manner.

*It is a blessing **vouchsafed** him by heaven.*



Usage Examples of "Confide" as a verb

- *He confided his fears to his mother.*
- *He confided in friends that he and his wife planned to separate.*
- *'I have been afraid,' she confided.*
- *He confided that stress had caused him to lose a stone in weight.*
- *The property of others confided to their care was unjustifiably risked.*

accredit

Attribute an action, saying, or quality to.

*Institutions that do not meet the standards will not be **accredited** for teacher training.*

ascertain

Find out, learn, or determine with certainty, usually by making an inquiry or other effort.

*Management should **ascertain** whether adequate funding can be provided.*

authenticate	(of a user or process) have one's identity verified. <i>They were invited to authenticate artefacts from the Italian Renaissance.</i>
classified	(of information or documents) designated as officially secret and accessible only to authorized people. <i>Classified advertisements.</i>
conclave	The meeting place for a conclave.
confess	Confess to God in the presence of a priest as in the Catholic faith. <i>He confessed that he had attacked the old man.</i>
disclose	Disclose to view as by removing a cover. <i>They disclosed her name to the press.</i>
disclosed	Made known (especially something secret or concealed). <i>The disclosed purpose of their wicked plan.</i>
disclosure	A fact, especially a secret, that is made known. <i>A judge ordered the disclosure of the government documents.</i>
divulge	Make known (private or sensitive information). <i>I do not want to divulge my plans at the moment.</i>
evangelist	A zealous advocate of a particular cause. <i>He has become an evangelist for the European Union.</i>
evince	Give expression to. <i>The news stories evinced the usual mixture of sympathy and satisfaction.</i>
expose	Expose while ridiculing especially of pretentious or false claims and ideas. <i>The situation exposed a conflict within the government.</i>
giveaway	An unintentional disclosure. <i>Bread at giveaway prices.</i>
gratefully	In a thankful manner; with thanks. <i>Your financial support is gratefully acknowledged.</i>
leakage	Deliberate disclosure of confidential information. <i>Leakage currents.</i>
meditate	Think deeply about (something). <i>They had suffered severely and they began to meditate retreat.</i>
opine	Expect, believe, or suppose. <i>The headmistress opined that the outing would make a nice change for Flora.</i>
overexposure	Excessive exposure, especially to something harmful. <i>An overexposure to violence on television.</i>
penance	Impose a penance on. <i>He had done public penance for those hasty words.</i>

private	Concerning things deeply private and personal. <i>This research was carried out by private industry.</i>
recognize	Identify from knowledge of appearance or character. <i>The Regents officially recognized the new educational institution.</i>
reveal	Make (something) known to humans by divine or supernatural means. <i>The truth revealed at the Incarnation.</i>
revealing	Making interesting or significant information known, especially of a personal nature. <i>A revealing radio interview.</i>
revelation	The last book of the New Testament recounting a divine revelation of the future to St John. <i>A divine revelation.</i>
secret	Given in confidence or in secret. <i>The secret compartment in the desk.</i>
trust	A trustful relationship. <i>They don't like to trust their money to anyone outside the family.</i>
uncover	Reveal to view as by removing a cover. <i>He uncovered the face of the dead man.</i>
unveil	Remove a veil or covering from, in particular uncover (a new monument or work of art) as part of a public ceremony. <i>The Princess unveiled a plaque.</i>
unwrap	Remove the outer cover or wrapping of. <i>I began to unwrap my presents.</i>
