### Definitions of "Conflate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “conflate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Mix together different elements.*
- *Combine (two or more sets of information, texts, ideas, etc.) into one.*

### Synonyms of "Conflate" as a verb (21 Words)

<b>abbreviate</b>	Shorten (a word, phrase, or text). <i>Network is often <b>abbreviated</b> to net.</i>
<b>abridge</b>	Shorten (a piece of writing) without losing the sense. <i>Even the right to free speech can be <b>abridged</b>.</i>
<b>abstract</b>	Consider a concept without thinking of a specific example consider abstractly or theoretically. <i>As our relationship deepened you seemed to <b>abstract</b> yourself.</i>
<b>blend</b>	Blend or harmonize. <i><b>Blend</b> and smudge the darker colours under the bottom lashes.</i>
<b>boil down</b>	Bring to, or maintain at, the boiling point.

<b><u>coalesce</u></b>	Combine (elements) in a mass or whole. <i>His idea served to <b>coalesce</b> all that happened into one connected whole.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Oxygen <b>combines</b> with haemoglobin.</i>
<b>commingle</b>	Mix; blend. <i>His humanitarian stance was <b>commingled</b> with a desire for survival.</i>
<b><u>condense</u></b>	Make more concise. <i>Water <b>condenses</b>.</i>
<b><u>encapsulate</u></b>	Enclose (an organ or structure of the body) in a tough sheath or membrane. <i>Data requested is <b>encapsulated</b> and can be manipulated.</i>
<b><u>flux</u></b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting.
<b><u>fuse</u></b>	Cause an electrical appliance to stop working when a fuse melts. <i>When fired in a special kiln the metals <b>fused</b> on to the pot.</i>
<b>immix</b>	Mix together different elements.
<b><u>meld</u></b>	Blend; combine. <i>The nylon bristles shrivel and <b>meld</b> together.</i>
<b><u>merge</u></b>	Absorb (a title or estate) in another. <i>The cells <b>merge</b>.</i>
<b>mix</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>It was everyone's dream to <b>mix</b> their album in their front room.</i>
<b>precis</b>	Make a precis of a text or speech.
<b>reduce</b>	Reduce in size reduce physically. <i>The cook <b>reduced</b> the sauce by boiling it for a long time.</i>
<b><u>shorten</u></b>	Reduce in scope while retaining essential elements. <i>The preceding vowels are <b>shortened</b>.</i>
<b><u>shrink</u></b>	Become withdrawn. <i>I don't <b>shrink</b> from my responsibilities.</i>
<b><u>summarize</u></b>	Give a summary (of). <i>I will now <b>summarize</b>.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Conflate" as a verb

- *The urban crisis conflates a number of different economic, political, and social issues.*

## Associations of "Conflate" (30 Words)

<b>ally</b>	Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage. <i>He was forced to dismiss his closest political <b>ally</b>.</i>
<b>amalgam</b>	An alloy of mercury with another metal usually silver used by dentists to fill cavities in teeth except for iron and platinum all metals dissolve in mercury and chemists refer to the resulting mercury mixtures as amalgams. <i>A curious <b>amalgam</b> of the traditional and the modern.</i>
<b>amalgamate</b>	Alloy (a metal) with mercury. <i>Numerous small British railway companies <b>amalgamated</b>.</i>
<b>associate</b>	Connect (something) with something else because they occur together or one produces the other. <i>He <b>associates</b> with strange people.</i>
<b>blend</b>	The act of blending components together thoroughly. <i>The tea is <b>blended</b> using leaves from estates in Sri Lanka Kenya India and Indonesia.</i>
<b>coalesce</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>The puddles had <b>coalesced</b> into shallow streams.</i>
<b>coalesced</b>	Joined together into a whole.
<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b>combination</b>	A sequence of numbers or letters that opens a combination lock. <i>This colour <b>combination</b> is stunningly effective.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>Oxygen and hydrogen do not <b>combine</b> at room temperatures.</i>
<b>commingle</b>	Mix together different elements. <i>His book <b>commingles</b> sarcasm and sadness.</i>
<b>conjoin</b>	Take in marriage. <i>An approach which <b>conjoins</b> theory and method.</i>
<b>eclectic</b>	Someone who selects according to the eclectic method. <i>Universities offering an <b>eclectic</b> mix of courses.</i>
<b>flux</b>	Treat a metal object with a flux to promote melting. <i>The newness and <b>flux</b> of the computer industry.</i>
<b>incorporate</b>	Formed or united into a whole. <i>Through an <b>incorporate</b> resilience slighted confidence restores itself.</i>
<b>incorporation</b>	The inclusion of something as part of a whole. <i>The software facilitates the <b>incorporation</b> of active learning in the course.</i>

<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>Transport planning should be <b>integrated</b> with energy policy.</i>
<b>intermingle</b>	Combine into one. <i>Daisies <b>intermingled</b> with huge expanses of gorse and foxgloves.</i>
<b>intermix</b>	Combine into one. <i>Along its southern edge low trees <b>intermix</b> with the shrubs.</i>
<b>join</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>It was soldered so well that you couldn't see the <b>join</b>.</i>
<b><u>meld</u></b>	A thing formed by melding a combination. <i>Australia's winemakers have <b>melded</b> modern science with traditional art.</i>
<b><u>merge</u></b>	Combine or cause to combine to form a single entity. <i>He agreed to <b>merge</b> his broadcasting company with a multinational concern.</i>
<b><u>mingle</u></b>	Be all mixed up or jumbled together. <i>A chance to <b>mingle</b> with celebs.</i>
<b>mix</b>	A commercially prepared mixture of dry ingredients. <i>Arriving at the correct <b>mix</b> of full time to part time staff.</i>
<b>solder</b>	Join with solder. <i><b>Solder</b> these two pipes together.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	The combination of components or elements to form a connected whole. <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
<b><u>unify</u></b>	Join or combine. <i>Opposition groups struggling to <b>unify</b> around the goal of replacing the regime.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Act in concert or unite in a common purpose or belief. <i>Lady Midlothian <b>united</b> herself to a man of bad character.</i>
<b><u>united</u></b>	Used in names of soccer and other sports teams formed by amalgamation. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>
<b>weld</b>	A welded joint. <i>Her gratitude <b>welded</b> her to him.</i>
