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Associations of "Conflicted" (30 Words)

argument	An independent variable associated with a function or proposition and determining its value For example in the expression $y = F(x)$ the arguments of the function F are x and x and the value is y . <i>There is a strong argument for submitting a formal appeal.</i>
clash	Disagree violently. <i>It is hoped that clashes of dates will be avoided.</i>
collide	Cause to collide. <i>The physicists collided the particles.</i>
contend	Assert something as a position in an argument. <i>He contended that Communism had no future.</i>
controversy	A contentious speech act; a dispute where there is strong disagreement. <i>The design of the building has caused controversy.</i>
counterattack	Make a counterattack.
crash	Move with or as if with a crashing noise. <i>Mother crashed the motorbike into the lamppost.</i>
disagree	Have or express a different opinion. <i>She disagrees with her husband on many questions.</i>
disagreement	Lack of consensus or approval. <i>There was some disagreement about the details.</i>
discord	A harsh mixture of sounds. <i>The music faded in discord.</i>
discordant	Not in agreement or harmony. <i>The singers continued their discordant chanting.</i>
discrepancy	A difference between conflicting facts or claims or opinions. <i>There s a discrepancy between your account and his.</i>

disputatious	Inclined or showing an inclination to dispute or disagree, even to engage in law suits. <i>A disputatious lawyer.</i>
dissension	Disagreement that leads to discord. <i>The mill was the cause of a dissension in 1620.</i>
dissonance	Lack of agreement or harmony between people or things. <i>A session full of jangling dissonances.</i>
dissonant	Characterized by musical dissonance; harmonically unresolved. <i>Jackson employs both harmonious and dissonant colour choices.</i>
factious	Dissenting (especially dissenting with the majority opinion). <i>A factious country.</i>
fight	The inclination or ability to fight or struggle. <i>A churchman who has dedicated his life to fighting racism.</i>
hostile	Showing or feeling opposition or dislike; unfriendly. <i>The brewery fought off a hostile takeover bid last year.</i>
incompatible	Used especially of solids or solutions; incapable of blending into a stable homogeneous mixture. <i>Incompatible personalities.</i>
irreconcilable	(of ideas or statements) so different from each other that they cannot be made compatible. <i>Irreconcilable differences.</i>
opposition	A body of people united in opposing something. <i>Despite opposition from the newspapers he went ahead.</i>
quarrel	An angry dispute. <i>Some people quarrel with this approach.</i>
quarrelsome	Given to or characterized by quarrelling. <i>A moody quarrelsome man.</i>
skirmish	Engage in a skirmish. <i>Protesters skirmished with a group of bystanders opposed to their march.</i>
strife	Trouble or difficulty of any kind. <i>Strife within the community.</i>
struggle	Engage in conflict. <i>There were signs of a struggle and there was a lot of blood around.</i>
vie	Compete for something; engage in a contest; measure oneself against others. <i>The athletes were vying for a place in the British team.</i>

wrangle

A dispute or argument, typically one that is long and complicated.
*An insurance **wrangle** is holding up compensation payments.*

wrestle

Struggle with a difficulty or problem.
*The security guards **wrestled** them to the ground.*
